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OUR CITY. A REVIEW OF 1893.

The year which has just closed, 1893, was one of commercial disaster throughout the world, but probably more keenly felt in the United States than in any other country.

Against these and other disadvantages, Hopkinsville, a city which never has been "boomed," has steadily advanced in its commercial and industrial progress.

THE BRECKENRIDGE CASE. It is Likely to Come Up in a Week or Two.

The Early Trial Due to a New Court Calendar System. Miss Pollard's Counsel Promises a Trial Before the Kentucky Nominating Convention is Held.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Contrary to expectation, it is now probable that the case of Madison V. Pollard against Representative Breckinridge, of Kentucky, instituted in August last, and in which the plaintiff sues for damages to the amount of \$50,000, because of alleged seduction and breach of promise, will come up for trial in a few weeks' time, possibly before the first of next month.

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TERMINAL PRIZES
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BENAM ACTED RIGHT.
The general commendation of the action of Rear Admiral Benham, of the United States navy, in firing the shot which sank the Brazilian ironclad in the harbor at Rio de Janeiro which had for some time been shooting at random to the great damage of several American vessels, is being sought entrance to the harbor. Rear Admiral Benham had notified Admiral de Gama, the commander of the insurgent fleet, that the shooting must cease and that any further shots would sink American vessels that he would turn loose his guns upon the insurgent fleet. De Gama paid no attention to this warning and not only continued the firing but deliberately fired into United States warships. Benham then fired a number of shots across the bows of the insurgent fleet, which brought De Gama to the senses and the firing was stopped. Benham did exactly right, and it was strange that he deferred action as long as he did. The irritating and insulting character of the American ships entering the Rio de Janeiro harbor by the officers of the insurgent navy anchored in the bay was exceedingly hard to stand. Benham administered a sound lesson to the proper moment, and showed the insurgents that the United States flag must be treated with profound respect. Our navy is intended for the protection of the United States flag, and it is much to be hoped that the proper respect will be accorded to it in the future.

THE HOUSE COMMITTEE'S appropriation of \$15,000,000 for pensions for the ensuing fiscal year is about \$15,000,000 less than the appropriation for the present fiscal year. The reduction in the disbursement through this dreadfully burdensome department of the Government may be accepted as an indication that much to be hoped for in pension appropriations has at last been reached.

Mr. Ryan's defense of Mr. Cleveland's Hawaiian policy was able and highly creditable. He showed clearly how outrageous, tyrannical, illegal was the action of the corrupt United States Minister Stevens in siding with the conspirators and subverting the American treaty and the legitimate government of Hawaii.

The Kentucky Legislature has passed its thirty second working day, and has therefore consumed more than one half of the sixty days allowed it by the Constitution. In less than 32 days 122 bills were introduced in the Senate 20 in the House of Representatives. The bills introduced in both Houses, making a total of 442 bills introduced and eleven finally disposed of. Only two or three of the bills that have been passed were of much importance.

At the close of last year the State of California had a population of 1,500,000 and since 1880 the assessed value of property has just doubled. She has the largest per capita wealth of any State in the Union, and her savings banks now have over \$100,000,000. She ranks first among the States in the production of gold, wine, honey, oranges, almonds and walnuts and is raising cotton for tie goods and wool. Last year her mines yielded gold to the value of \$10,000,000 and other precious metals to the value of \$7,000,000. San Francisco is now the leading whaling port of the world.

The repeal of the Federal election laws is one of the most important of the reforms called for by the Democratic platform. It touches a fundamental principle of popular government, the right of the people to choose their officers intelligently and as they see fit. The present laws are a gross violation of this principle and the repeal of these laws would be a great step toward the restoration of the people's election by Federal officials.
