Goes To Jail In Default Of \$200 Bail.

Duel And Killing At Colored Church Described In Court.

Henry Davie, who killed Jerry Wilon on November 10sh., near Good Hope church, colored, in the Bimo vicinity, was arraigned before County Judge Cansier for examining trial Thursday. After hearing the evidence, bail was fixed at \$200, in default of which Davie

was remanded to jail. The story of the killing as detailed by the witnesses was substantially as followe: Davie and Abe Allen had renewed a quarrel on the Sunday afternoon that the tragedy occurred and both shot several times of one another. Davie, after shooting Allen in the sto-nach, approached Good Hope church where a religious "raily" was to progress. The duel had caused much excitement and when the crowd oaw Davie there were ories of "Catch him, !" ",Get a rcpe,"

"Lypon him !" Davie called to the crewd, "You know who I am. You can't arrest me." They started towards him, and he ran. "Son" Rogers shot at him and the bullet entered the fleeing man's hip. The ursuers pressed on with Jerry Willion in the lead. Owing to his wound, Dayle ran with difficulty, and realized he would soon be overtaken. He turned and thrusting his pistol within a few inches of Wilson's breest, fired. The bullet pierced the negro's beart and death quickly followed. After the killing the pursuit was abandoned. Davie claimed that before he fired, Wilson had stabbed him several times with pocket-knife. Davie, about a week was placed in jail. Abe Allen, the first men shot by Davie, was able to be pres ent and testify.


