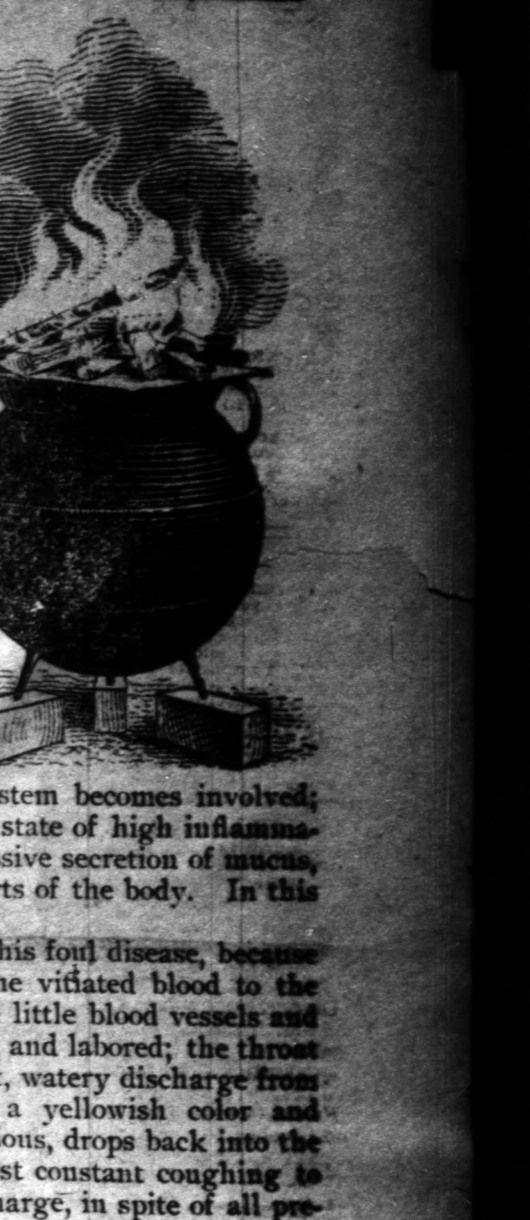

CONCERNING STATE CROPS.

Commissioner Makes Closing Report Of Year.
Wheat Yield Short-Tobacco Not Up To The Average.

The New Era late receipt of the final crop report of the season, which has just been issued by the state agricultural department. It is made up by Commissioner Nell from the reports of correspondents in about 100 counties, and is devoted mostly to the condition of the growing crop of wheat, which does not appear to be in any better condition than the early time indicate that it will be a record breaker. The cattle to be fed during the winter are only 67 per cent of the stock of last winter, and many of them in different sections are reported to be suffering from a disease resembling "black leg."

The report reads in part as follows:
Wheat sowing was continued until quite late, some being sown as late as November 15. The ground in many parts of the State has been too dry for good preparation, and the conditions as a whole can not be said to be the best. The late sown wheat is not all up yet and the continued dry weather is very unfortunate for it. There is some complaint of fly having appeared, but this is not so generally observed as was the case last year at this time, and the probability of escape from disastrous ravages from the pest are flattering. From indications, the crop will not be record-breaking, even with the best conditions from now until harvest. The prospect for winter oats falls off from the same cause, and rye losses two points also, though there was no effort made by the farmer to increase the breadth of sowing of this grain while pretty well up to an average in quality in the western part of the State, falls below in the central and eastern sections. Barley is reported very poor in quality in most of the Bluegrass counties and in the mountain sections, and brings the percentage down to 76, 68 and 64 respectively for divisions 2, 3 and 5. It is coming up with green spots or blotches, which injures the quality and makes buyers more critical. The weather has been unfavorable for strapping, and the new crop is not being marketed as soon as usual.
The general condition of live stock is below the average, due mostly to diseases among cattle following their being turned into the stock fields, where it is supposed they eat the corn smut, and that is a poison causing a disease resembling "black leg." Some investigations have been undertaken to prove this, but it is claimed, failed to trace the trouble to corn smut. However, the disease develops when the cattle are turned in the stock fields, and ceases when they are removed, though often the losses may be due to impaction of the stomach from greedily swallowing too much immature fodder, which this year was dated up on the early corn and much of it frosted on the late corn.

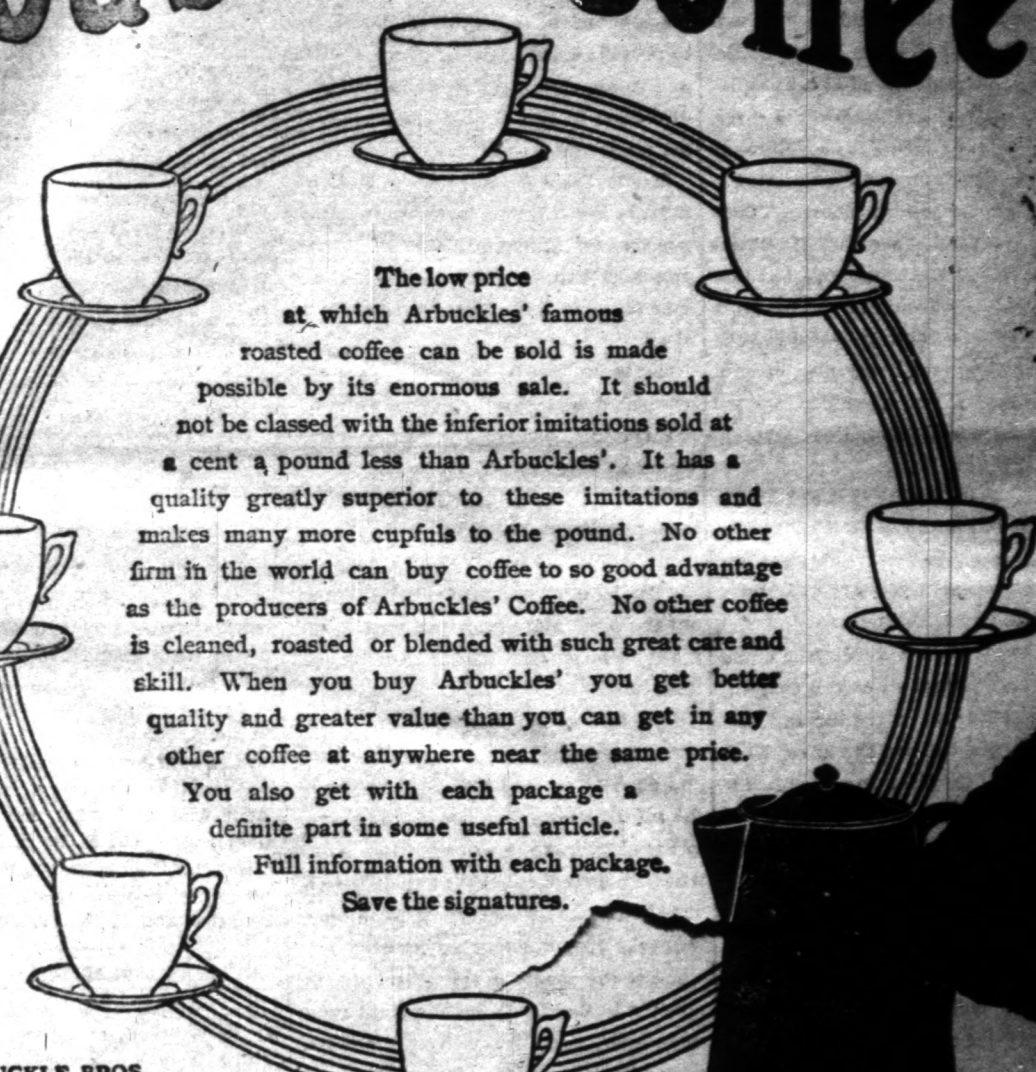
