IS THE HOPKINSVILLE TO-BACCO MARKET.

Reports of Warehousemen and Inspectors—Loose Sales Are Quiet.

Reports received from the board of inspectors and warehousemen of this city show the tobacco market to have been in better shape for May than in usual at this season of the year.

The tobacco market is somewhat quiet just now, as most of the old crop has been delivered, and the few small lots still in the barns is waiting for seasonable weather to be moved.

The new crop promises to be above the average in yield, and taken all in all the prospects are good for one of the most prosperous and successful years in the history of this market.

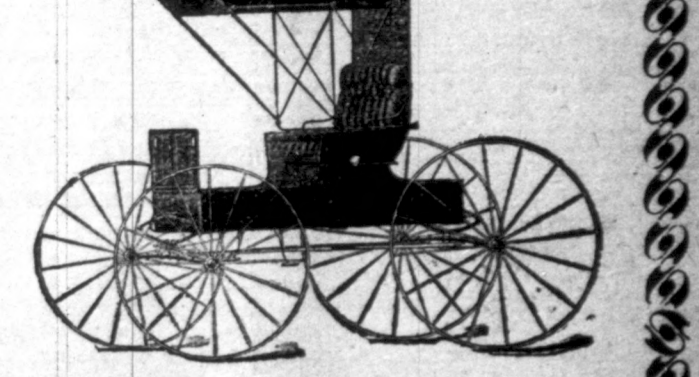
The monthly report of the inspectors shows the receipts for April to have been 1,360 hogheads, as compared with 7,500 hogheads last year.

While the association has a membership of nearly 7,000 men and is the largest in the world, the extent of its service is not to its members only, but to the young men of the city and country.

The Chicago association is conducting work at twenty-six points in the city, including sixteen student departments.

Water is Subsiding—About Fifty People Lost Their Lives in Kansas City—20,000 Homeless.

ABOUT TWENTY-FIVE ARE DEAD AT TOPEKA.

(Special to New Era.)

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 2.—Flood conditions are improving both at Kansas City and Topeka.

The estimated loss of life in Kansas City as a result of the flood is in the neighborhood of fifty.

At Topeka, Kas., Des Moines and most of the other flood-visited points the situation last night showed improvement with water receding, and the worst believed to be over.

First reports of fatalities in North Topeka were enormously exaggerated, and the number of dead there is now placed at from twenty to twenty-five.
