The Blue and The Gray Grundman

"The Blue and The Gray" is a saga of songs that were popular during the Civil War. Two of the songs were representative of the North: "The Battle Cry of Freedom" and "Marching Through Georgia," the latter written late in the war. Other songs were definitely southern, such as "Dixie," "The Bonnie Blue Flag," and "The Yellow Rose of Texas." The other songs were played, sung and loved by both sides: "Kingdom Coming," "Tenting Tonight," and "Aura Lee."

The ballet, "Fancy Free," premiered in 1944 by the American Ballet Theatre, is the first ballet of importance to be written and set entirely in the contemporary American idiom. The scene is New York City. Three sailors on shore leave meet two girls. A dancing contest is staged by the sailors to see who gets the dates. "Danzon" is the background music for the third sailor's dance.
