## Some Aspects of the Farmers' Problems

Some farmers favored by regional compactness and contiguity, such as the citrus fruit-risers of California, already have found a way legally to merge and sell their products integrally and in accordance with seasonal and local demand, thus improving their position and rendering the consumer a reliable service of assured quality, certain supply, and reasonable and relatively steady prices. They have not found it necessary to resort to any special privilege, or to claim any exemption under the anti-trust legislation of the state or nation. Without removing local control, they have built up a very efficient marketing agency. The grain, cotton, and tobacco farmers, and the producers of hides and wool, because of their numbers and the vastness of their regions, and for other reasons, have found integration a more difficult task; though there are now some thousands of farmer's co-operative elevators, warehouses, creameries, and other enterprises of one sort and another, with a turn-over of a billion dollars a year. They are giving the farmers business experience and training, and so far as they go, they meet the need of honest weighing and fair grading; but they do not meet the requirements of rationally adjusted marketing in any large and fundamental way.

The next step, which will be a pattern for other groups, is now being prepared by the grain-risers through the establishment of sales media which shall handle grain separately or collectively, as the individual farmer may elect. It is this step—the plan of the Committee of Seventeen—which has created so much opposition and is thought by some to be in conflict with the anti-trust laws. Though these laws now before congress a measure designed to clear up doubt on this point, the grain-producers are not asking for any immunity from anti-trust legislation. They desire, and they are entitled to co-ordinate their efforts just as effectively as the large business interests of the country have done. In connection with the selling organizations the United States Grain Growers Incorporated is drafting a scheme of financing instrumentalities and auxiliary agencies which are indispensable to the successful utilization of modern business methods.

It is essential that the farmers should proceed gradually with these plans, and aim to avoid the error of scrapping the existing marketing machinery, which has been so laboriously built up by long experience, before they have a tried and proved substitute of supplementary mechanism. They must be careful not to become embroiled in their own reforms and lose the perspective of their place in the national system. They must guard against fanatical devotion to new devices, and should seek articulation with the general economic system rather than its reckless destruction as it relates to them.

To take a tolerant and sympathetic view of the farmers' strivings for better things is not to give a blanket endorsement to any specific plan, and still less to applaud the vagaries of some of their leaders and groups. Neither should we, on the other hand, allow the froth or bitter acrimony, false economics, and mistaken radicalism to conceal the facts of the farmers' disadvantages, and the practicability of eliminating them by well-considered measures. It may be that the farmers will not show the business sagacity and develop the wise leadership to carry through sound plans; but that possibility does not justify the obstruction of their upward efforts, which city people see in high and speculatively manipulated prices, spoilage, waste, scarcity, the results of defective distribution of farm products. Should it not occur to us that we have a common interest with the farmer in his attempts to attain a degree of efficiency in distribution corresponding to his efficiency in production? Do not the recent fluctuations in the May wheat option, apparently unrelated to normal interaction of supply and demand, offer a timely proof of the need of some such stable

ing agency as ... grain growers have in contemplation?

It is contended that, if these proposed organizations be perfected and operated, the farmers will have in their hands an instrument that will be capable of dangerous abuse. We are told that it will be possible to prevent it to arbitrary and oppressive price-fixing from its legitimate use of ordering and stabilizing the flow of farm products to the market to the mutual benefit of producer and consumer. I have no apprehensions on this point.

In the first place, a loose organization such as any union of farmers must be at least cannot be so arbitrarily and promptly controlled as a great corporation. The one is a lumbering democracy and the other an agile autocracy. In the second place, with all possible power of organization, the farmers cannot succeed to any great extent or for any considerable length of time in fixing prices. The great law of supply and demand works in various and surprising ways, to the making of the best laid plans that attempt to suit it. In the third place, their power will avail the farmers nothing if it is abused. In our time and country power is of value to its possessor only so long as it is not abused. It is safe to say that I have seen no signs in responsible quarters of a disposition to dictate prices. There seems, on the contrary, to be a commonly beneficial purpose to create a stability that will give an orderly and abundant flow of farm products to the consumer and ensure reasonable and dependable returns to the producer.

## J. W. Fordney Shows Need For United States Valuation

Congressman Fights Out Necessity for New System Incorporated in Tariff Bill

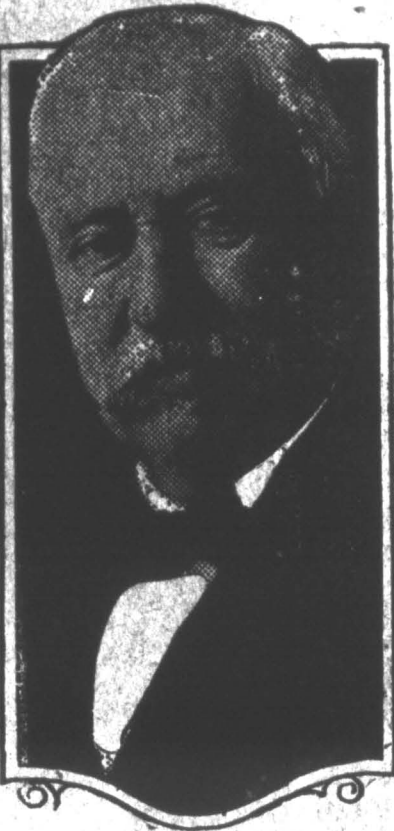
"We are importing at the rate of about \$300,000,000 worth of foreign goods per month into the United States," declares Congressman J. W. Fordney, Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. "Most of those goods could be made here. There is not a manufactured article produced in the United States in which the labor cost is less than 50 per cent. of the total cost—I mean, following the raw material from start to finish. Now, if that is true, of the \$300,000,000 that we are sending abroad each month to buy foreign-made goods, \$250,000,000 is going out from the people of the United States to employ German, French, English, Japanese and Chinese labor, while our laborers are walking the streets in idleness."

"Under free trade we must come to a common level somewhere, if we compete with all the countries of the world. Today German labor is getting from 60 to 65 cents per day in gold for ten or twelve hours' work. Japanese and Chinese labor today is from 12 to 18 cents per day in gold for twelve hours' work. If we had to be placed on a par with the imports from those countries, do you believe we could lift those foreign countries up to our standard of living? Not at all. We have got to come down to a common level somewhere, but we are not ready to do that, and we are not going to do it."

### Revisions Demanded

"The people of the country are demanding tariff revision. Some people say that Canada will retaliate. Canada is the best customer we have in the world, on the basis of population. There is no place in the world where our balance of trade is stronger than in Canada. Canada has no reason to complain about the rates fixed in the new tariff bill; none whatever. I shall tell you why."

"Last year Canada collected \$19.50 in import duties for every man, woman and child in Canada. Great Britain, the great free trade country of the world, as said to be collected \$100 per capita, or \$725,000,000 we collected \$115. Little Japan is collecting at the rate of 20 per cent. of valorem upon all her imports, dutiable and free. We have the lowest duty of any principal country on the face of the earth right now, and have had since 1913."

"Some people are opposing American valuation, some of the great importers of the country. Some of them have sent out circulars appealing to the merchants of the country, the manufacturers, to appeal to their congressmen and their senators to oppose American valuation. Why? I shall tell you why. Last year in the customs office of New York alone there were fifty-four hundred cases of under valuation, and this year they are running at the rate of five hundred cases a month."

"If you do not believe who import to this country or people of this country, who import from foreign countries under value? Because they pay less duty. Profit is made in the duty if they can import at fifty cents on the dollar of the real value of the goods."

### REGULAR SESSION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS HELD JAN. 3, 1922.

The board of County Commissioners of Valencia County met in a regular session the 3rd day of January, 1922. There were present, Hon. Daniel Lucero chairman of the board, Hon. Narciso Frances and Hon. Selo Lobato, members, Hon. Joseph F. Ton dre, sheriff and A. A. Gutierrez county clerk.

The board being in order of business, the chairman announced to all those present to present their business before the board.

Mr. Charles N. Roark representing the Guaranty Title and Trust Company appeared before the board in regard to making a contract for preparing an abstract of the records of Valencia County, and the board after giving due deliberation to the matter decided not to act on this matter until the next regular meeting.

Mr. Felipe Armijo and other citizens of precinct No. 2, Belen, presented a petition signed by a number of citizens from the southern part of said precinct praying for a division of said precinct, and creating a new precinct out of the southern part of the Belen precinct. The board after hearing arguments in favor and against the creation or division of said precinct decided not to act on this matter until the next meeting in February, in order to give a full consideration to the matter and to give an opportunity to all the people concerned that they may be well acquainted as to the division of said precinct.

The clerk was instructed to publish the following notice in the Belen News and El Hispano Americano of Belen for two consecutive issues. Notice is hereby given to all the people of Precinct No. 2, Belen, that

a petition of several residents of said precinct has been presented to the board of county commissioners of Valencia county, praying for a division or creation of a new precinct out of the southern part of precinct No. 2. The boundaries set forth in said petition are as follows:

On the north side Becker Avenue, towards the east parallel line to the railroad station, from there towards the Public road, from there towards the State Bridge that crosses the Rio Grande.

All persons concerned are hereby notified that action on this matter will be taken on the 13th day of February 1922 and to appear that day and present their views on this matter.

Mr. Saturino Baca appeared before the board in regard to a petition filed sometime ago by residents of the vicinity of Tinajas, said petition having been rejected by the board on account that said petition did not set forth the boundaries of the proposed new precinct. The board advised Mr. Baca to notify the people within the limits of this proposed new precinct to file a new petition.

Claim for the support of the county agricultural agent was approved and ordered paid.

A petition of the residents of Grants asking for cooperation financially to build a jail in said precinct was set aside to be acted upon at the next regular meeting in April.

Mr. Julian Martinez, Constable of Precinct No. 13, Luna presented his resignation as constable of said precinct, and the same was accepted. Mr. Cruz Sabedra was appointed in his place, to act until his successor shall

be elected at the next election of Justices of the peace and constables.

Complying with the provisions of Chapter 135, section 1 of the laws of 1921, the board of County Commissioners of Valencia county passed the following resolution:

Whereas the board of County Commissioners of Valencia County is authorized and directed by the provision of Chapter 135 laws of 1921 to employ a County Road Supt. to have charge of all the road work within the county and Whereas said board has found a competent person in the Hon. Emiliano Castillo to have charge of all the road work within the county. Therefore Be It Resolved by the board of county commissioners of Valencia County that the said Emiliano Castillo be appointed County Road Superintendent for the ensuing year of 1922.

Be it further resolved that the said county Road Supt. is hereby required to furnish a bond in the sum of \$5,000 with two good and sufficient sureties or issued by a surety company authorized to transact business in the state of New Mexico, for the faithful performance of his duties.

Be It Furthermore resolved that said county Road Superintendent shall receive a salary of \$100.00 per month, and all actual and necessary expenses, both salary and expenses however shall not exceed the amount permitted under the terms of the above mentioned act.

Be it furthermore resolved that said county road Supt. is strictly prohibited from doing any work outside of emergency not included in the road budget adopted by the board of county commissioners of said county at their meeting held September 26th, 1921.

The County Clerk and chairman of the board of County Commissioners are hereby authorized respectively to draw and sign warrants in payment of services and material expended up on roads. Provided that the same are supported by vouchers and attested by the county road superintendent. Each said voucher shall bear the budget number showing where the funds have been expended.

Hon. H. P. Owen appeared before the board in regard to building a small bridge near Swanee across San Jose creek. This matter was referred to the County Road Supt. and he is hereby requested to investigate all matters in connection to the building of said bridge, and to report his investigation on this matter to the board at its next meeting.

In conformity with the provisions of Chapter 135, section 203, the board passed the following resolution: Resolved by the board of County Commissioners of Valencia County that the assessor of Valencia County is hereby instructed and directed to communicate with the Surveyor General and United States Land Office for the purpose of securing copies of all patents issued for taxation purposes. And he is hereby authorized to find out what the charges will be for such a work and to enter with the above mentioned parties into a reasonable agreement to do such work.

Claim of Saturino Baca as County school Supt. for quarter ending December 31st 1921 was approved and ordered paid.

Report of County Health Officer for quarter ending December was approved. Report of County Treasurer, County Clerk, Sheriff and County Road Supt. for months of September, October and November, 1921 were approved. As also annual report of County Road Supt. was approved.

Quarterly report of Narciso Orona Justice of the Peace of Precinct No. 10 was approved and also quarterly reports of Federico Chavira, Juan de Dios Sanchez y Garcia and Miguel Silva, Justices of the Peace of precincts No. 28, 8 and 11 respectively were approved.

Butchers bond of Bernalillo Merc. Co., of Grants, was approved.

Being no other business before the board it adjourned subject to call of the chairman.
