## VALENCIA COUNTY TEACHERS ASSOCIATION HOLDS MEETING AT LOS LUNAS

The Valencia County Teachers Association met at Los Lunas, Saturday, Sept. 15, with a good attendance. The meeting was presided over by County Superintendent Baca, who is also President of the association. Miss Ruth Fay acted as Secretary. In the afternoon Vice President Luis Zamora took the chair.

The program as given was quite interesting although three of the speakers were unable to be present. In the absence of Miss Burke, Principal of the Los Lunas schools, the address of welcome was made by Mrs. DeGraffenreid. Mrs. F. A. Delgado, who was to have responded, was unavoidably delayed en route and Mr. Baca requested Mr. Heslet to take her place.

Mr. Chas. E. McClure spoke on the relation of the High School to the County. Under the new law, High Schools are no longer county units, but may admit students from all parts of the county so long as they have room.

Music was furnished by the high school quartette from Belen, and by Misses Delgado, Melendez, Gonzalez, Mr. Heslet and Miss Katherine Dunkle. Mr. E. W. House, manual training teacher at the High School, gave as a reading Riley's well-known poem, "Me and Jim".

Mr. Timoteo C. Luna, Asst. State Supt. of Public Instruction made a very interesting address, the keynote of which was, "One God, One Language, One Country."

Mr. R. R. Larkin, representing Ginn and Co. demonstrated the new reading charts and gave a practical talk on silent reading.

Supt. Baca spoke on the things that make a good teacher. Mr. Heslet on "A Teacher's Preparation", brought out the thought that teachers should not be satisfied with merely "getting a certificate", but should continue their study towards higher work, for their own good, as well as for that of their pupils.

A short business session completed the day's work. The next meeting will be held at Grants.

## BLUEWATER NOTES

Mr. Amos Tietjen is again drilling on the well at the Homer Cantrall place.

The George and Nash saw mill has been shut down for some time owing to the heavy rains that made it impossible to get a sufficient number of logs into the mill to justify running.

That portion of the State Highway which was covered by the recent flood, is being worked over. The work is under the direction of Mr. H. J. Haverkamp.

Considerable interest is being manifest over the organization of the BLUEWATER-TOLTEC IRRIGATION DISTRICT. The date for the election of Directors is set for Sept. 20th.

For many years, people who have been familiar with this section of the country, have looked forward to the establishment of some adequate system of storage and distribution of water for irrigation; and now that it looks like a reality a number of people have already come to look over the prospects and many inquiries are being made.

The District will include 10,633 acres of irrigable land and borders on the McKinley County line, but is situated in Valencia County. The main reservoir site has been pronounced by expert engineers as "one of the best in the west."

# Carlotta of Mexico

## Romance and Tragedy of the Mad Empress, Now at Life's End . . .

**MAXIMILIAN-CARLOTTA CHRONOLOGY**

1857—Maximilian (1832-67) appointed governor Lombardo-Venetian kingdom. Married Carlotta (1846).

1858—Benito Pablo Juarez (1806-72) elected president of Mexico; civil war.

1859-62—Maximilian resigned governorship; literary work at Miramar (Trieste).

1860—Mexico suspended payments; France, Great Britain and Spain intervened.

1862—French troops entered Mexico City; Juarez retreated to mountains.

1864—Maximilian entered Mexico City as emperor of Mexico, supported by French army.

1866—Napoleon III told by United States to get out of Mexico and take Maximilian away. Carlotta fled to Europe, vainly asked aid of Napoleon and pope; became insane.

1867—French troops left Mexico. Maximilian captured by Juarez, tried and executed. Juarez resumed presidency.

**T**HIS year of 1923 is the centennial of the Monroe Doctrine. And Carlotta of Mexico is reported dying in her old chateau in Bouchout in Brabant, Belgium, at the age of eighty-four, after fifty-seven years of madness. Therefore the story of the attempt of Napoleon III to establish a French empire in Mexico in defiance of the Monroe Doctrine makes timely reading.

Benito Pablo Juarez, an Indian, was elected president of Mexico in 1858, after eleven years of public service. Juarez, in defeating Miramon in the civil war that followed, exhausted the Mexican treasury. Suspension of payments in 1860 caused England, France and Spain to intervene.

Napoleon III saw here a chance to establish in Mexico the French empire that had failed of establishment in Canada (1763) and in Louisiana (1803). The United States government was too busy with the Civil war to make forcible resistance to violation of the Monroe Doctrine. As the British and Spanish withdrew, he sent over large French forces. These made war on Juarez, drove him into the mountains and in 1863 entered Mexico City.

Napoleon III selected Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian Joseph, second son of Archduke Francis Charles of Austria and brother of Emperor Francis Joseph I, as emperor of this French empire in Mexico. Maximilian, then thirty-one, was handsome and soldier-like, with a fine education and a taste for the fine arts. He was living with Carlotta at Miramar, near Trieste, a palace that he had built for residence. Carlotta—Marie Charlotte Amelie—the only daughter of Leopold I of Belgium, was twenty-three and a royal beauty, "tall, beautiful, graceful, with a gentleness that won all who met her and of courtesy and gracious manner." She spoke fluently in tongues of England, France, Germany, Italy and Spain. She was popular in every court of Europe.

Through French wire-pulling in Mexico, in September of 1863, a deputation of Mexican notables arrived at Miramar to ask Maximilian to become emperor of Mexico. Maximilian, history says, was reluctant to accept. But Carlotta was ambitious as she was able. Francis Joseph was presumably glad to see his popular brother go. Maximilian, after the form of a popular election in Mexico had been gone through with and Napoleon had made a secret agreement with him to support him with French troops, accepted the throne April 10, 1864, and arrived June 12 in Mexico City to establish his empire.

Maximilian attempted to establish a mild reign. Some of the Mexican leaders accepted him. But a large proportion of the Mexicans did not. Juarez, to whom Maximilian made friendly overtures, would have none of him. A hitherto unpublished letter, from Juarez to Maximilian, recently brought to light, reads:

"I admire your generosity in leaving the fatherland in coming to Mexico. But I tell you it isn't true we ask you on your own free will to accept the throne. On their own responsibility some traitors went to Miramar, only eight or ten of our cities approving.

"You came here without any knowledge of the country's needs or conditions and your advisers are the most dangerous people in Mexican society. You promise the security, but I don't trust a man who deals with traitors. You say that by an understanding we could work together for the benefit of Mexico if I would give more of my talents and political assistance.

"It is a true history of our time that glorifies in the principles and traditions

only to serve their personal passions, ambitions and imperiousness. But I, who hold the office of president of the republic, and who came up from the lowly classes, will only succumb if Providence decrees.

"I shall hold out until the end and fulfill the hopes of my countrymen.

"Sometimes it occurs, it is true, that people are allowed by faith to attack the holy rights of others and threaten the rights of those who defend their nationality. But I believe in the judgment of history, which stands apart from wrong and evil. This will give its verdict on us. 'Justitia regnum fundamentum.'"

Juarez soon took up arms and civil war followed. In 1865 Maximilian proclaimed all those in arms to be outlaws—a fact that probably sealed his fate when tried for his life.

In the meantime, the United States, in the throes of the Civil war, had refused to recognize Maximilian. With the close of the Civil war the United States government found itself in possession of the strongest military force that the world had ever seen. Thereupon Gen. Philip H. Sheridan appeared at the Mexican border with an impressive force and the United States government said in effect to Napoleon III of France:

"You are violating the Monroe Doctrine. Get your French troops out of Mexico forthwith and take Maximilian with them!"

Napoleon had no choice but to do exactly as the United States government commanded. He warned Maximilian that he must withdraw the French troops from Mexico. Maximilian declined to abdicate. Carlotta saw that they were lost without French support and fled to Europe to appeal to Napoleon.

The last of the French troops withdrew from Mexico in 1867. Juarez promptly besieged Maximilian in Queretaro. May 14 Maximilian was captured, the night before he had fixed upon for escape. He was tried by a council of war, condemned to death and June 19 faced a firing squad on the Hill of the Bells. He gave each of the five soldiers a gold piece and asked them to aim well. He died like a brave man and a gentleman.

Juarez, an able man of few words and honest purpose, resumed the presidency and held it till his death, five years later.

Carlotta's vain attempts to secure aid in Europe were as dramatic as tragic. Napoleon III feared to face her and evaded a meeting until she forced an interview. The meeting was without witness. Napoleon refused to aid her. He may have wanted to keep his pledged word to Maximilian, but he did not dare to defy the United States. Just what was said behind those closed doors is not known, but Carlotta was heard to shriek at its close:

"I ought never to have forgotten what I am and what you are. I ought not to have forgotten that there is Bourbon blood in my veins, and should not have disgraced my descent by lowering myself before a Bonaparte and being led away by an adventurer!"

Attendants, entering, found her unconscious on the floor.

Carlotta next saw Pope Pius IX, who received her at a reception in the throne room at the Vatican and accorded her the honors of a reigning monarch. She suspected that this was a ruse to prevent the discussion of her affairs. Later, the pope returned the visit, as etiquette demanded. An ample escort accompanied him, and again Carlotta could not find opportunity. But she made another effort. Dressed in mourning, with one woman attendant she had an audience. At his side

she was so overwrought that the pope's physician declared it unwise to remove her. So, contrary to all precedent, she passed the night at the Vatican. She awoke the next morning bereft of reason. She was placed in the care of her family.

During the invasion of Belgium in the World War a German commander passed Bouchout at the head of his troops. He halted in astonishment at the sight of the Austrian flag flying over the chateau. He demanded to know who had the insolence to display it.

"Her majesty the Empress Carlotta of Mexico, widow of Archduke Maximilian of Austria, emperor of Mexico," was the answer.

"Who are you?" asked the German.

"Baron Godinet, her majesty's major domo."

"Take me to her!"

"It is forbidden. Her majesty is an invalid and sees no one."

To the German in Belgium nothing was forbidden and the major domo took him to an upper window, from which he saw a very old woman dressed in black and leaning on the arm of an attendant, walking in the garden. The German went back to his troops and affixed to the gate this placard:

"This property, belonging to the crown of Belgium, is occupied by the widow of Archduke Maximilian of Austria. I instruct German soldiers not to disturb the household, not to ring the bell and not to sing in passing." And Carlotta's home remained untouched through the devastation.

Many stories about Carlotta have been circulated during her long seclusion in Bouchout. It is known that at first she was violently insane, her main obsession being that everyone was trying to poison her. Later she became more rational—so rational that her actual insanity was questioned. Her royal family never took any steps to have her declared legally incompetent, and it is said she has never spoken or written anything that settled definitely whether she was sane or insane, or realized that she had lost her place.

Although she managed for a long while the most minute details of her lavish establishment. Every day she wrote out her orders in one of the grand salons, and these commands were executed by the servants. With her toilet she was scrupulously careful, and attired herself with the same taste and distinction that she used when moving in the court circles of Europe. Her painting and drawing occupied hours each day, and she passed much of her time playing the piano.

It has also been broadly hinted that Leopold II kept her sequestered as insane, though she was not so, to conceal the fact that he had taken and squandered her fortune.

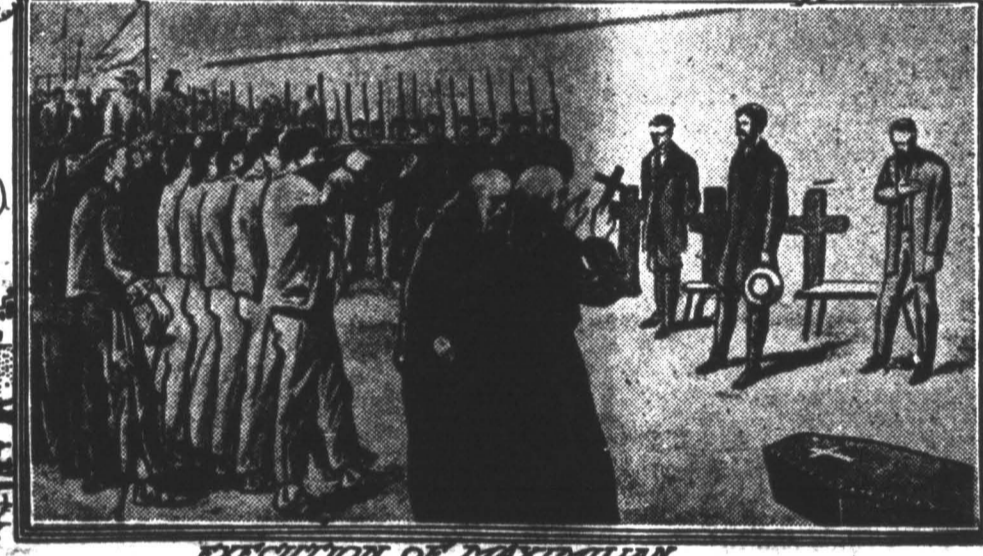
One question is still unanswered: Has Carlotta read this final letter from Maximilian which he penned shortly before his execution?

"My Beloved Carlotta: If God permit that your health be restored and you should read these few lines you will learn the cruelty with which fate has stricken me since your departure for Europe. You took with you not only my heart, but my good fortune. Why did I not give heed to your voice? So many untoward events! Alas! So many sudden blows have shattered all my hopes; so that death is but a happy deliverance, not an agony, to me. I shall die gloriously like a soldier, like a monarch, vanquished but not dishonored. If your sufferings are too great, and God shall call you soon to join me, I shall bless His divine hand which has weighed so heavily upon us. Adieu, adieu.

### Farmers' Opinions on Stock Feeding

#### Obtaining Feed Economically Is Most Troublesome Problem of Breeders.

Producers or otherwise obtaining their feed economically is the most troublesome feeding problem of farmers who keep live stock. This was brought out emphatically through a questionnaire sent out by the United States Department of Agriculture which was answered by nearly 500 farmers scattered over the country. The replies showed that general economy of rations, the cost of grain, and the cost of protein represent about 60 per cent of the difficulties in feeding.

These men classed balancing of rations next in importance. Other problems, such as labor, increasing production, difficulties in wintering stock, short pastures, and variety and palatability of feeds apparently were thought of only in connection with the principal difficulties. That these opinions are worth considering is borne out by the fact that all of the men questioned were progressive farmers and breeders, and the average period of their experience was 20 years.

**Adopt Balanced Rations.**

During the two decades these stock raisers have been working to get ahead, many changes have taken place in the ways of feeding animals. The outstanding progressive step taken has been the wide adopting of the balanced ration. Other improvements in the order given by most of the five hundred farmers are more liberal feeding, feeding more legumes, better water supply, providing minerals, feeding according to production, feeding more protein, and more regular feeding. At the same time they list the common errors in feeding which are responsible for poor results, poor combinations of feeds being the one most frequently mentioned, followed by underfeeding as the next most effective educator of profits. Following these in regular order, based on the number of lines mentioned in the answers, come lack of protein, lack of water, lack of legumes, sudden changes of feed, poisoning parasites, lack of salt, waste of feed, poor equipment, and overfeeding. Practically all of these troubles are easily preventable.

Almost all of these 500 farmers had raised at one time or another scrubs, grades, and pure breeds, and almost to a man they joined in a paean of praise of the pure bred. Only 1 per cent of them reported that they had failed with improved stock. Most replies contained specific estimates showing the superiority of well-bred over run-of-the-mill animals, and when averaged it was brought out that these men consider that pure breeds make about 40 per cent better returns on feed used than common stock. It is interesting to note here that another questionnaire sent out by the department a year ago and answered by several hundred farmers showed that in their opinion pure breeds have a general utility value a little more than 40 per cent greater than common stock.

**Many Use Self-Feeders.**

The report prepared by the department on the results of this feeding investigation contains many more interesting details on feeding and corroborates a number of tendencies that good observers must have suspected. For instance, of 400 who answered questions regarding the use of self-feeders, 41.5 per cent had used three-fifths yet to take up this economy. At present the self-feeder seems to be used mostly in hog raising districts and for poultry. In the Middle West more than half the farmers reporting used it. The general sentiment seems to be that this piece of equipment is especially suited to hogs and chickens, but a few farmers used it for feeding calves and sheep.

Nearly all of those who supplied made comment on the feeding ofilage, and practically 50 per cent of them use this feed. In the northeastern states, where dairying is very generally followed, two-thirds of the farmers in the list have silage. Although most of the silage is fed to dairy cows, the list of animals to which it is fed, according to the questionnaire, includes also steers, brooding ewes, and brood sows. A few men reported feeding it in limited quantities to horses, hogs, and lambs.

It is worth while to note that more than 22 per cent of these farmers who answered the government questionnaire credited farm papers as the principal source of their knowledge of feeding problems. Other important sources mentioned were: Experience on home farm, general observation, bulletins, and books and records.

### Darken Cols's Stall to Lessen Fly Irritation

Leave the colts in the barn while their mother is working in the field. Darken the colts' stalls to lessen the irritation from flies and give them access to clean feed at all times. This will give them a chance to develop and grow into much better individuals.

### Worm Causes Heavy Losses Than Cholera

#### Biggest Part of the Damage Comes From Wasted Feed

Swine raisers suffer greater losses from round worms than from cholera, according to the department of animal husbandry of the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station, but they do not attract so much attention because few hogs actually die from worms. The damage comes from the amount of feed wasted in feeding the worms and the loss of vitality of the animals. Many lung diseases, especially pneumonia, occur as direct result of worms.

To combat the round worm, fully its life cycle should be thoroughly understood. Six to eight million eggs a year are laid by the female worm in the hog's intestines. The eggs come out with the manure, infecting every particle of food on the surface of the hog lot. They survive most conditions for at least a year.

The eggs are swallowed by the pig in feeding and hatch in the intestines. The young worms then work their way through the walls of the intestines, and into the liver and blood stream, by which they are carried to the lungs. While in the lungs they cause "chumps" or heavy breathing. Here they become active, crawl up the windpipe and cause coughing. Some are expelled from the mouth at this time, but most are swallowed and remain permanently in the intestines.

Several treatments for worms may be followed:

Withhold feed from the hog for 24 hours and give a capsule containing two grains of santonin, three grains of aloin and eight grains of sodium bicarbonate. Do not feed for eight or ten hours after treatment, and then give one to two tablespoonsful of epsom salts or glauber salts in the feed for every 100 pounds live weight of the hog. One capsule is sufficient for a pig weighing up to 75 pounds.

If santonin cannot be procured, oil chenopodium, also known as "oil of worm seed" may be used. Four teaspoonfuls mixed with one ounce of castor oil is the usual dosage. The results will be most satisfactory if the oil is given alone rather than with the feed. Each pig should be fasted 24 hours before treatment.

If necessary, repeat the treatment in four to six weeks.

### Late Built Houses May Cause Colds and Roup

Many poultrymen are finding that poultry houses built too late in the fall are apt to result in colds and roup. Before the birds, especially pullets, are put in a new poultry house the floor as well as the lumber used in construction must be thoroughly dry. The essentials of a good poultry house are, dryness, as this prevents colds and roup; fresh air, which keeps the birds in good health; sunlight, natural food disinfectant, and floor space so that during confinement the birds will have room to exercise.

For the best results a poultry house should be built for units of 200 birds. This requires a house 20 by 40 feet. It should face southward and should be located on high dry ground, and where it gets some shelter. Glass windows on the east and west sides with certain windows in the front will allow the sunlight and fresh air that the birds require.

Protection of the flock against dry and seasonal changes of weather and climate is the purpose of a poultry house.

### High Feeding Value of Buttermilk and Products

The feeding value of buttermilk and buttermilk products, such as condensed or dried buttermilk, is not generally appreciated. At any rate, generally are unable to get as much out of their buttermilk as its feeding value indicates they should be able to realize. Farmers who live close to the creamery at which they sell their cream sometimes take their own share of the buttermilk back home as a feed for hogs and chickens. They derive much value from the product, provided it is fed in an economical manner. Buttermilk is relatively rich in protein and its protein has a high feeding value because of its animal origin. For that reason, if it is supplied more liberally than it is needed for balancing the grain ration fed, part of it is wasted and, as a result, its full feeding value is not realized.

### Pure Strain Selections of Tubers Are Superior

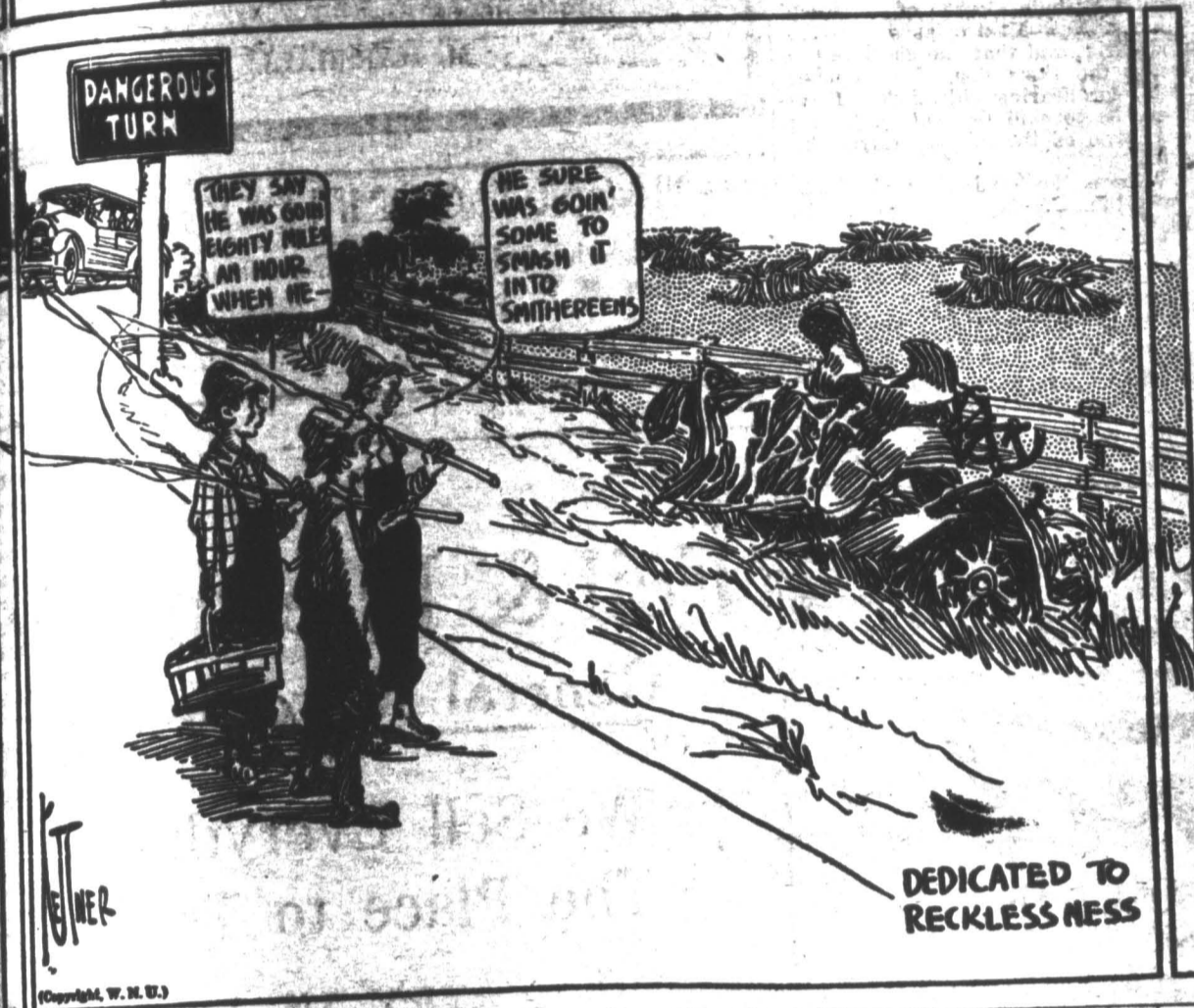
Cornell university plant breeders have found that pure strain selections of potatoes are much superior to those ordinarily grown by farmers in New York. Plants of the pure strain, developed from a single tuber, produced 40 more bushels to the acre than good potatoes selected by farmers in a two-year commercial test.

### Disposing of Produce to Commission Merchants

Selling to commission merchants is the simplest method of disposing of the produce, as it does away with the expense and trouble involved in a private sale, but the returns are usually not so great, except when dealing with certain commission houses that have built up a fine trade along certain lines.

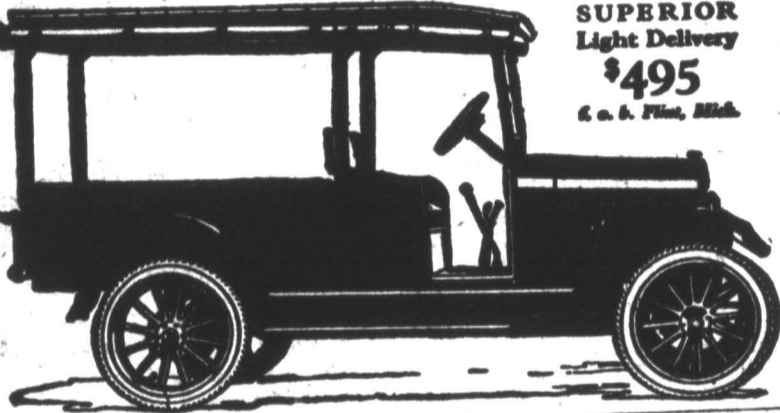

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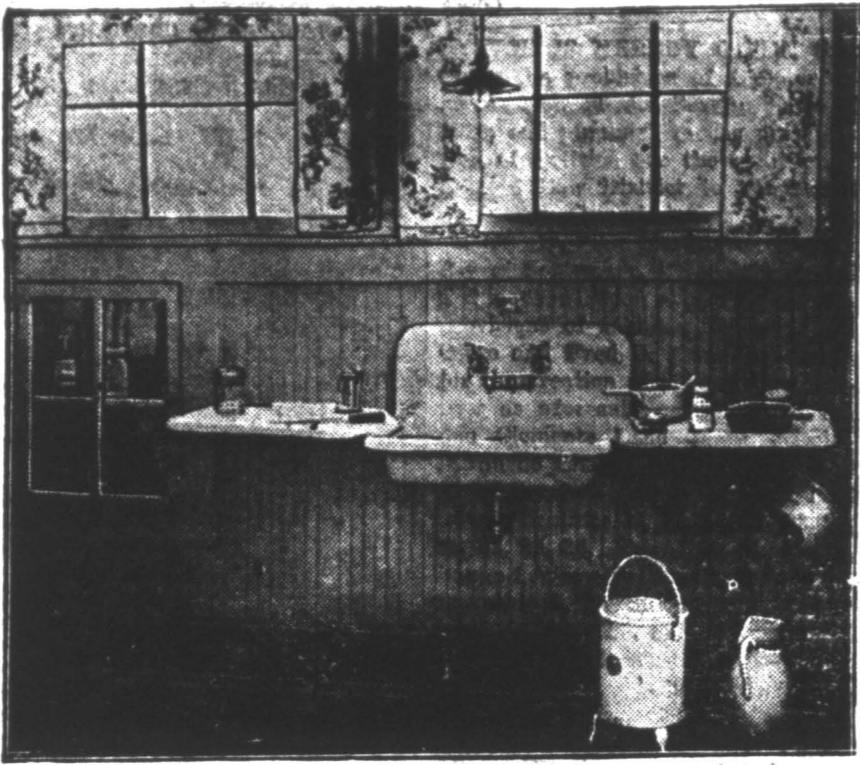

MAKE-FRUIT BUTTERS WHEN YIELD IS GOOD

Recipes Given Have Been Tested by Specialists.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

There is no better way to use good apples and the sound parts of windfalls and wormy and bruised apples than to make them into butter.

Apple Butter With Grape Juice.

To each gallon of peeled and sliced apples, cooked into a thin apple sauce and strained, add one pint of grape juice, one cupful of brown sugar and one-quarter teaspoonful of salt.

Apple Butter With Lemons.

Slice four lemons, cover with water and let stand over night. Next morning put them in a preserving kettle with eight pounds of apples, pared, cored and sliced. Cook for one hour; add three pounds of sugar and cook slowly, with frequent stirring, one and one-half hours longer, or until of the proper thickness.

Apple Butter With Plums.

An exceedingly rich and snappy butter is made with apples and plums. Use one measure of plums to two measures of peeled and sliced apples. Wash and cook the plums and rub through a strainer or colander to get out the pits. Cook the apples into sauce, add the stewed plums and continue cooking an hour or two until of the right consistency.

Pear Butter.

Pear butter is made like apple butter without the cider. Use pears ripe enough to cook up well. Peel, core and slice them; put in a preserving kettle with a little water and cook slowly until soft. Then add the sugar, one cupful to one quart of sliced pears, and continue cooking very slowly, with frequent stirring, for one and a half to two hours.

Peach Butter.

Put the peaches in a wire basket and dip them in boiling water a few seconds, or until the skin slips. Dip them in cold water, peel them and pit them. Wash them, freestone varieties are best. Wash the pulp and cook it in its own juice, without adding water. If it is a clingstone it may be put through a sieve. To each measure of pulp add a half-measure of sugar.

sired. The meats of several pits may be cooked, either whole or sliced, in each gallon of butter. While still hot, pack in sterilized jars or glasses and process 20 minutes in a hot water bath or cover with hot paraffin.

METHOD OF CLARIFYING FAT

Melt With at Least an Equal Volume of Water and Heat for Short Time.

An old-fashioned method of clarifying fat from the soup kettle or from cooked meats such as bacon, ham, chicken, beef, sausage, and other sources, is recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture. Melt the fat with at least an equal volume of water and heat for a short time at a moderate temperature, stirring the mixture occasionally. When cold, remove the cake of fat and scrape off any small particles of meat and skin that adhere.

OF INTEREST TO THE HOUSEWIFE

An oldcloth apron is an excellent thing to wear when washing dishes.

It is best to roast a pan chicken with the breast down. It will be more juicy.

The lining of the eggshells will clear the coffee, without using the white of the egg.

A cloth-covered broom will readily wipe the dust from papered walls and ceilings.

A cake of paraffin added to the water in which clothes are boiled will make them white and clean. The paraffin should first be placed in the cold water and allowed to melt as the water heats.

New Mexico State Items

At the close of the meeting of the State Golf Association held at the Duke City, Raton was selected as the place for the 1924 championship tourney.

Another robbery occurred in Deming when thieves entered the store of the Clark Clothing Company and made their getaway with over \$200 worth of clothing.

W. H. McBean, assistant superintendent of the Southern Pacific, was badly injured when the motor car in which he was riding on the rails jumped the track. He was taken to the hospital in Tucson.

Dr. Earl N. Bullock of the Cottage Sanatorium was elected temporary president of the Silver City Rotary Club which is now in the process of formation and for which the application for a charter has been made.

The Normal University at Las Vegas will have two gridiron teams this fall, the university and the high school teams. Both the teams will be made up of good material and it is believed that they will be able to meet anything in the state.

The big red ant has played havoc with many gardens and fields in Santa Fe city and county, and the biological survey is ready to put on a campaign to exterminate the pest.

The first carload of head lettuce to be made from New Mexico will leave Las Vegas about the middle of the month, according to reports of the members of the Irrigation project.

About twenty-five acres under the Storrie dam have been planted to head lettuce by the farmers of the community in tracts of from one to five acres. While the planting of lettuce has been more or less of an experiment it is believed that it will soon become one of the principal industries under the project.

Gumicindo Trujillo is held in jail at Las Vegas without bail to await the action of the grand jury, and his two brothers were admitted to \$10,000 bail after a hearing before Judge Leahy. The Trujillo brothers appeared before Judge Leahy after having been denied bail by the Justice of the Peace Court at Mora.

New Mexico and Arizona have suffered a blow from which it will take them five years to come back, says Aldo Leopold of the forest service, who has just completed a trip through several of the national forests. The perennial grasses have been grazed trampled and dried out, he says, and the rank growth that has sprung up since the recent rains is what is known as "six weeks grass."

According to Gallup men in close touch with the situation, the McKinley county bank, which was closed some time ago, may be taken over by the railroad brotherhoods. Chairman Crayne of the engineers brotherhood, was in Gallup in the interest of the bank and believes that the institution will soon be opened.

William Beatty, aged 44 years, a rancher living near Gran Quivira; Torrance county, shot and killed his half brother, Bruce Beatty, aged 19. Beatty surrendered to a justice of the peace, saying he had killed his half brother, who had come to his ranch to "clean-up on him." They lived on adjoining ranches and had quarreled over trespassing cattle.

Great interest was shown when the first bale of cotton produced in the Mesilla valley this year was auctioned off at Las Cruces. The cotton, grown by H. W. Dillon on the Paul Reich farm near Dona Ana, was ginned at the Mesilla Valley Cotton Products Company's gin. L. L. Mayfield, who acted as the auctioneer, sold the cotton to Ivey and Porter, Las Cruces cotton merchants, for 31 cents a pound.

According to a report received from the American Herdbook Breeders' Association by the secretary of the New Mexico organization, William Stillings-law, there are now 120 breeders of high grade Herefords in the state. Through the efforts of the Hereford men of the state some of the best herds in the country have been developed and many big sales have been made outside the state.

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BASEBALL PLAYED IN ALL PARTS OF WORLD

Chinese Have Developed Remarkable Proficiency.

Baseball is fast spreading to all four corners of the earth. France, Germany, Italy, Japan, China, Mexico, Cuba, Canada, several South American countries, Australia—these are only a few of the places which have taken up the great national pastime of the United States.

Strange as it may appear, the Chinese have developed remarkable proficiency in baseball, ranking even better than the Japanese.

During the tour of the big leaguers in the East last winter some stiff opposition was encountered in China. A team of all-Chinese players has been coming to this country for the last five years. Their record against the best college teams is 80 per cent on the credit side.

"Buck" Lal, a Chinese living near Philadelphia, was a member of the first team to come over. He was offered a berth with the Philadelphia Nationals but was unable to stick. He played for two years in the Eastern league, however.

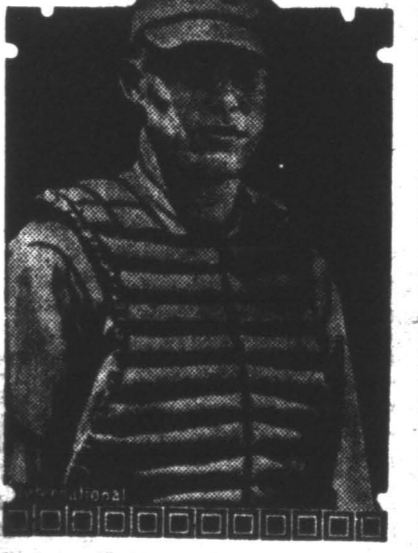

TROOPS PATROL OKLAHOMA CITY

MILITARY CHIEFS FORBID MEETING OF GRAND JURY

DRASTIC ACTION TAKEN

GOVERNOR DECLARES MARTIAL LAW IN FIGHT AGAINST KU KLUX KLAN

Okla. City.—Martial law for the entire state of Oklahoma has been proclaimed by Gov. J. C. Walton.

Calling the full force of approximately 6,000 troops in the Oklahoma National Guard to his command, the governor climaxed his spectacular fight against the Ku Klux Klan by declaring that any person who aids the organization in carrying out its "purposes" are enemies of the sovereign state of Oklahoma and shall be dealt with by military force.

Due to the existence of a self-styled "invisible empire," Governor Walton declared a state of insurrection and rebellion in its effect against the constitution and authorities of Oklahoma and that a general state of "public alarm and fear and jeopardy of life, peace and personal safety" has resulted.

The first disorder growing out of the imposition of martial law here occurred when Campbell Russell, former chairman of the State Corporation Commission and a bitter political opponent was knocked down in front of a downtown hotel by Leo Clark, son of W. J. Clark, former Oklahoma City chief of police under the governor's administration as mayor of the city.

Russell, who circulated a petition which resulted in the calling of a special grand jury to investigate alleged misuse of state funds by the governor, was distributing pamphlets attacking the executive's decree of statewide martial law when he became engaged in a controversy with Clark.

Both men were taken to the police station by regular police and released. Russell preferred charges of assault against Clark. Several score persons witnessed the clash.

The grand jury, which Russell succeeded in having called, was forbidden by military authorities.

The question of a special session of the Legislature has been vexing administration leaders several months. Several members of the Legislature have declared their belief that the body has authority to convene itself provided business other than lawmaking is considered.

When the agitation became more pronounced last week, Governor Walton issued a warning to members of the Legislature not to attempt to hold an extra session and threatened legislators with jail "for the remainder of his term" if they ignored his orders.

Streets and highways of Oklahoma county, in which Oklahoma City is located, must be cleared between midnight and 5 a. m., according to the orders.

Approximately 300 troops are under arms here.

Ray Frazier, chief of police, and Ed Snelson, assistant chief, were deposited by order of Lieutenant Colonel Keys, in charge of the National Guard.

Currents Blamed for Wrecking Ship Santa Barbara, Calif.—Strange currents floating around Point Hondo, where seven naval destroyers were stranded the night of Sept. 3, will be talked of among the crews of fishing boats and small coastwise vessels which put in and out of Santa Barbara daily.

Tokio Photographs Bring Record From Seattle, Wash.—Newspaper men of the Pacific coast did their share of relieving the financial difficulties of some of the destitute survivors of the Japanese earthquake on their arrival here. Photographs of scenes connected with the disaster told at a high price and eye-witness stories of survivors some times brought as high as \$100. Photographs were in the greatest demand. It was said that one transaction for less than two complete rolls of undeveloped films involved a money transfer of \$5,000.

Fiume Government Resigns Rome.—The government of the independent state of Fiume has resigned. The Italian government has received from Signor De Poli, vice president of the assembly of Fiume, a letter complaining of the delay in settling the Fiume question. He said the situation had caused much discontent. The populace was suffering greatly through unemployment, and he had repeatedly called the attention of the Italian government to the dangerous effect of delay in settling the question at issue.

King Alfonso Dissolves Parliament Madrid.—King Alfonso has signed a decree dissolving parliament. No disturbances and little excitement have been caused by the establishment of the new military regime and the publication of the decree by the new government. For the present, Gen. Primo Rivera is the only responsible minister. He has the power to publish decrees, which thereby become laws. The economic life of the country has not been disturbed by the military coup d'etat.

COLORADO BEAN CROP THIS YEAR LARGER THAN LAST YEAR.

Denver.—Colorado's bean crop is three times as large as last year's, according to a report of the Colorado Agricultural Experiment Station.

The bean crop is 91 per cent of normal, according to the report, and 470,000 bushels are expected to be harvested. Last year the total was 400,000 bushels, when it was 91 per cent of normal.

The fruit crop is good and above the year average, says the report. Apples are expected to yield 3,000,000 bushels, compared with 4,000,000 last year; peaches 900,000 as against 1,100,000 last year, and pears, 1,000,000 compared with 500,000 last year.

Sugar beet production this year is expected to reach 1,800,000 tons, compared with 1,400,000 tons last year. The report places the production of this year at 2,700,000 tons compared with 2,700,000 tons a year ago.

Colorado farmers will harvest about 100,000 acres of potatoes this year, compared with more than 100,000 acres planted for harvest last year, according to reports of county agents to the State Immigration Department. Complete reports from all counties but Rio Grande and one from that county show that the crop reported as planted this year is about 95,000, which is "percentage" more than five per cent above the average actually planted in the state with this heavy decrease in acreage present indications are that the crop will receive more for the 1923 put than for that of last year.

**SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS**

Now is the time to put away goodies for the winter, while the markets are flooded with all kinds of fruits.  
**India Chutney.**  
—Take 15 large, sour apples, two green peppers, one cupful of seeded raisins, two good-sized onions, one quart of vinegar, two tablespoonfuls of mustard seed, the same of ground ginger and salt, and two cupfuls of brown sugar. Pare, core and chop the apples together with the peppers, from which the seeds and membrane have been removed, and the onions. Add the raisins and vinegar and put into a kettle and simmer for two hours. Add the sugar and seasoning and cook slowly another hour. Seal in glass jars while hot. This recipe makes about five pints.

**Peach Chutney.**—Take two and one-half pounds of fresh peaches, one and one-quarter pounds of evaporated peaches, one-half pound of seeded raisins, two tablespoonfuls of red chili powder, one small onion, one-half cupful of mustard seed, one-half pound of green ginger, one and one-quarter pounds of brown sugar, one quart of vinegar and one-third of a cupful of salt. Soak the evaporated peaches several hours in water to cover, then cut into small pieces. Peel and cut the fresh peaches. Put the onion and ginger root through the food chopper. Boil the peaches in a pint of vinegar for one-half hour. Make a sirup of the sugar and a pint of vinegar and cook all the ingredients in it for an hour, stirring frequently until thick. Seal while hot in preserve jars. This makes eleven cupfuls.

**Pickled, Spiced Onions.**—Peel small onions and cover with hot water and salt, making a strong brine. Let them stand twenty-four hours, drain, cover with another hot brine. Next day drain, make a fresh brine, heat to the boiling point; add the onions and boil three minutes. Drain and put the onions into jars with bits of mace, bay leaf, cloves and slices of red pepper. Fill the jars with hot vinegar and sugar. Allow one cupful of sugar to four quarts of vinegar. Seal at once.

**Celery Sticks.**—Take tender white celery, wash and crisp it in cold water. Drain and dry and fill the groove in each with a mixture of cream cheese, chopped walnut meats, minced green pepper, cream to season. Smooth the edges and cut the sticks into inch lengths. Arrange on lettuce and serve with French dressing. The proportions are six large stalks of celery, two tablespoonfuls of chopped walnuts, two tablespoonfuls minced green pepper, a teaspoonful of cream and one small cream cheese.

**FROZEN DISHES**

There is no more delicious dish, if one is fond of peaches, than:

**Peach Cream Sherbet.**  
—Take two cupfuls of fresh, ripe peaches, mashed with a cupful of sugar, and let stand for three hours. Fold in a cupful of cream, whipped until stiff, and freeze. A few drops of almond extract added to the cream will improve the flavor. Garnish with chopped maraschino cherries.

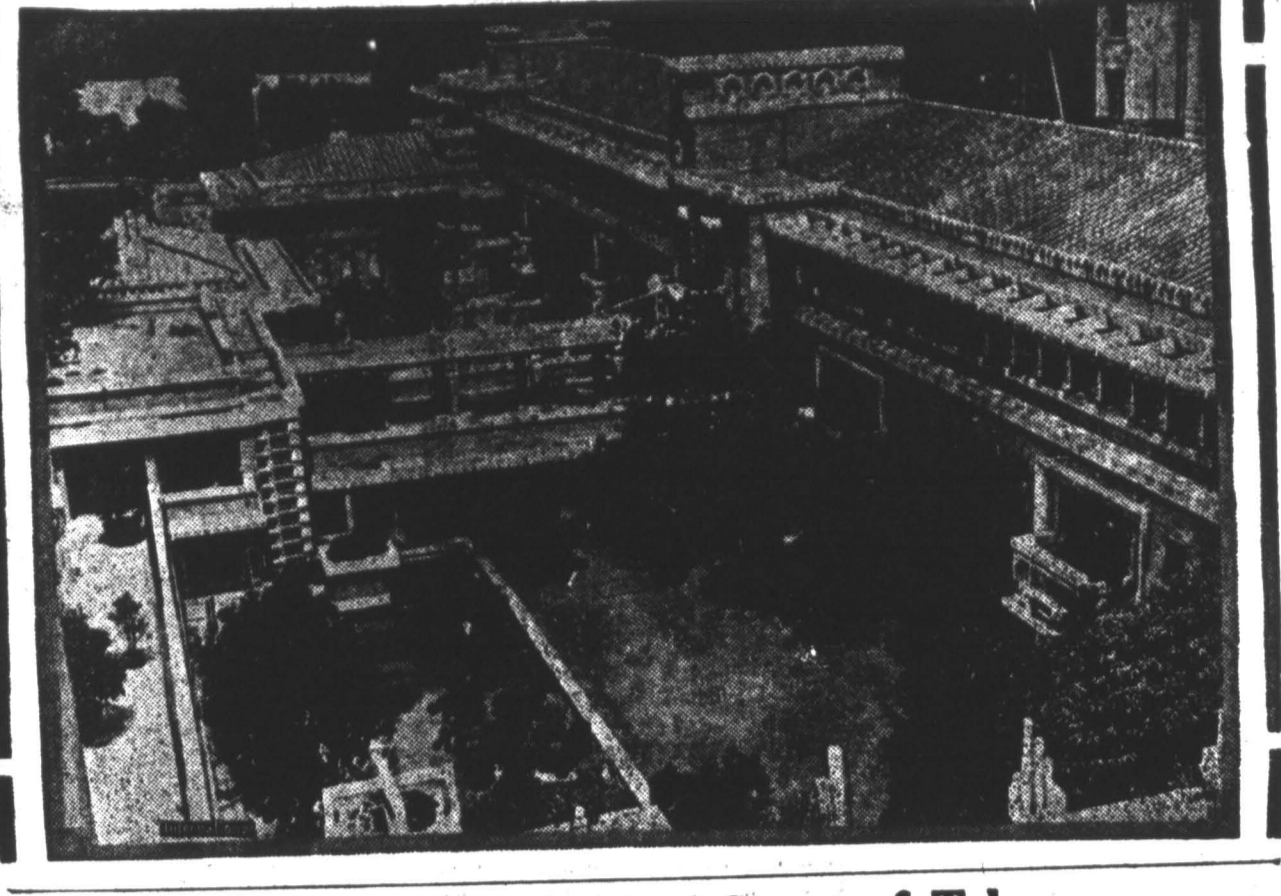
**Golden Cream.**—Boil together for five minutes two cupfuls of sugar and one cupful of hot water. Add one cupful of grated pineapple, a quart can of apricots, cut fine, with juice, and the juice and pulp of two oranges. Scald two quarts of milk, add a tablespoonful of flour, mixed with two tablespoonfuls of the cold milk. Cook together for five minutes. Blend the milk and the fruit mixture, cool and freeze. This amount makes a gallon of cream.

**Prune Ice Cream.**—Wash and soak over night one pound of prunes, then cook slowly in the same water in which they were soaked until tender. Add the juice of a lemon, one and one-half cupfuls of sugar; simmer ten minutes, then strain the juice. Remove the pits from the prunes and put the pulp through a ricer. Add three cupfuls of rich milk, one cupful of cream and one-half teaspoonful of salt; cool and freeze.

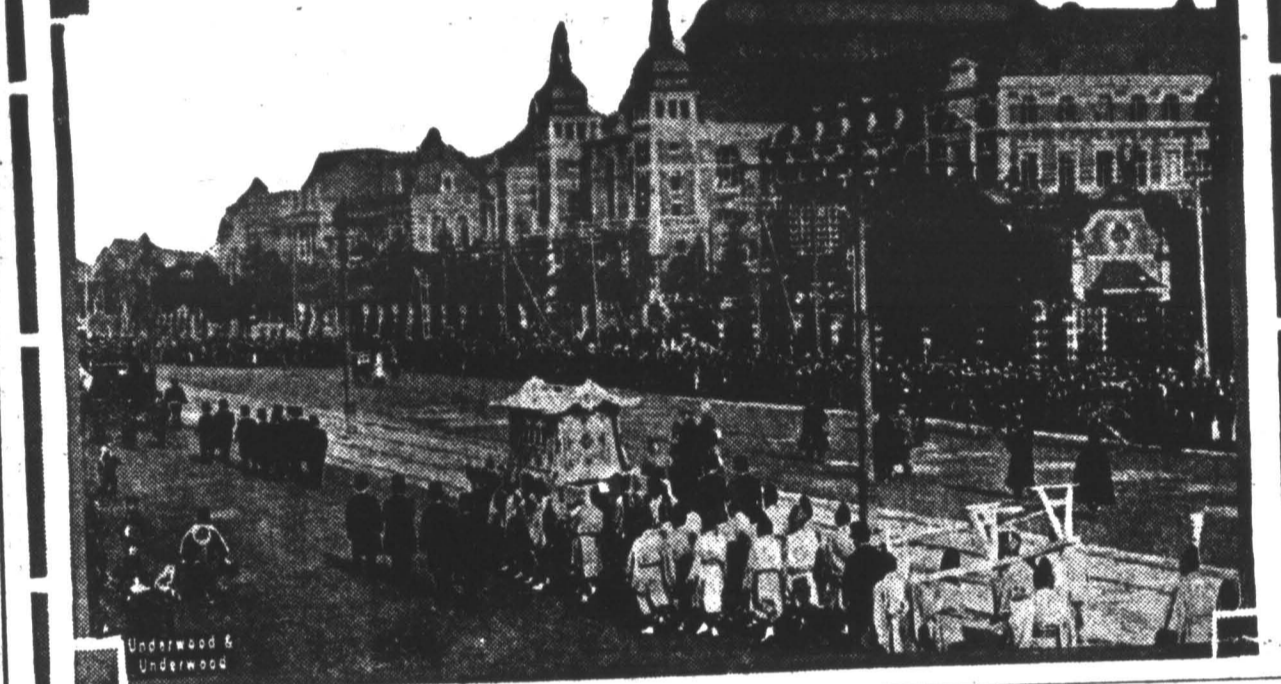
**Cranberry Milk Sherbet.**—Cook two cupfuls of cranberries, put through a sieve while hot; add two cupfuls of sugar, three tablespoonfuls of lemon juice and three cupfuls of rich milk. Stir until the sugar is dissolved, adding all the ingredients. It will curdle, but when frozen will be smooth and velvety. Freeze as usual.

**Frozen Custard.**—Scald a quart of milk in a double boiler; add one-half cupful of sugar and one-quarter of a teaspoonful of salt. Pour this over two well-beaten eggs, return to the fire and cook until the mixture coats the spoon. Flavor with vanilla when cool and freeze.

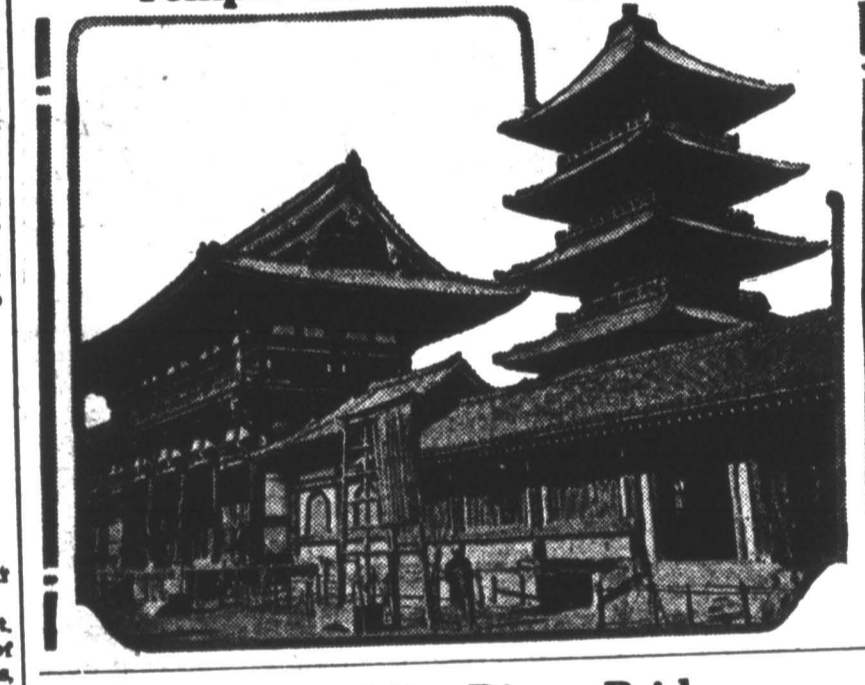

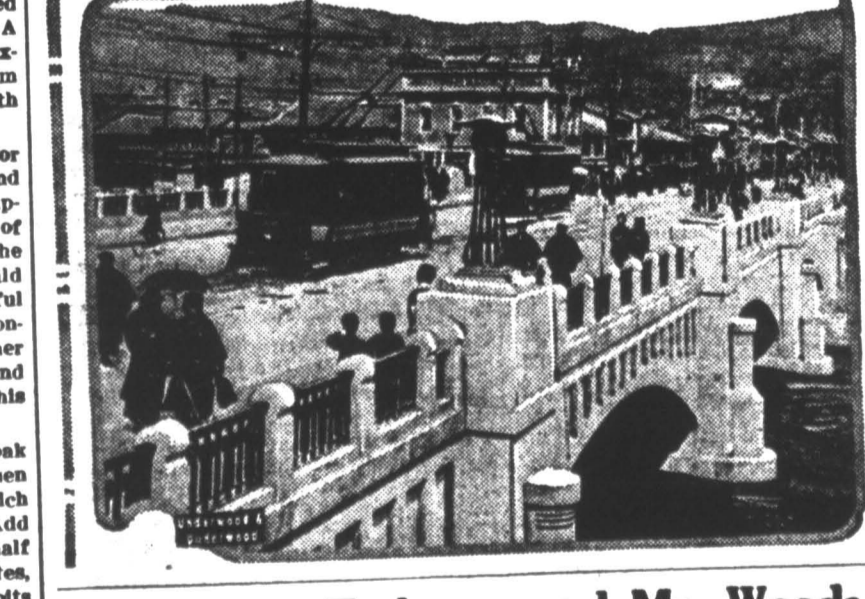

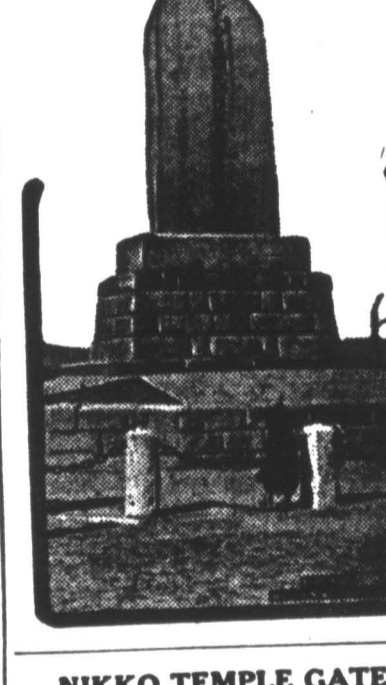

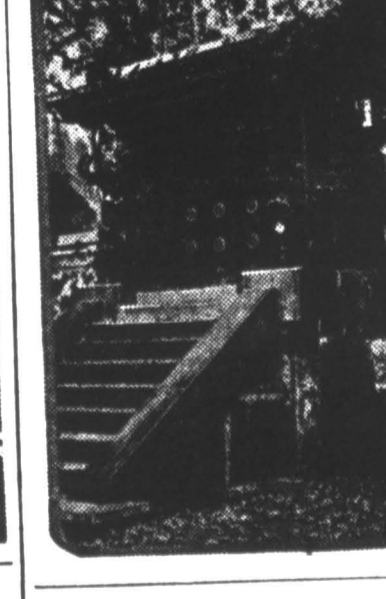

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The Santa Fe and the Car Supply for 1923

Everyone in Santa Fe territory is asking if we are going to have cars enough when the usual heavy business comes this year. We hope to have them, but -

Our ability to furnish cars depends not only on our own efforts, but on the ability of all the railroads in the United States to function properly. For three years the railroads have been struggling slowly forward. They are beginning to see daylight. Since January 1st, nearly 10% more cars of commercial freight have been handled than in the corresponding months of 1920. The second year in the same months the car shortage has been reduced by one-half. These figures mean constructive effort by both shippers and carriers.

In this program the Santa Fe is - Providing new engines and cars; enlarging its shops; building second track wherever congestion is liable; and enlarging its yards and other facilities. In addition it is making every effort to reduce its "bad order" cars and locomotives to less than the normal number, to get the greatest number of miles per day out
