THRIFT IN OUR SCHOOLS

Our schools reopened a few more about the grand old book. days ago, and it is appropriate that we give thought at this time to the important problem of thrift instructions to the young. In a recent statement, Secretary Hughes of the U. S. government said: "The primary lesson for the citizen of democy". Hereafter every Friday lesson for the citizen of demonight (and not on Monday) cracy is self-control, and this is achieved only through selfdiscipline. As I look back upon my own life I find the best lessons were the hardest.

It is important that our boys and girls be given thrift instructions, because of the things briefly referred to in this quotation from the U.S. Secretary of State. Thrift develops self-discipline, and we do no kindness to any child when we pamper it, when we make the way too easy, or when we foster the idea that life has no hardships.

More and more the subject of thrift is being taken up in our schools, and no educational movement is of greater importance. Afew moments a day spent in correct instruction of school children on these practical matters will prove of in-

old chateau of Bouchout in Brabant, Belgium, at the age of eighty-four, after fifty-seven years of madness. Therefore the story of the attempt of Napoleon III to establish a French empire in Mexico in defiance of the Monroe Doctrine makes timely read-

Benito Pablo Juarez, an Indian. was elected president of Mexico in 1858, after eleven years of public service. Juarez, in defeating Miramon in the civil war that followed, exhausted the Mexican treasury. Suspension of payments in 1860 caused England, France and Spain to intervene.

Napoleon III saw here a chance to establish in Mexico the French empire that had failed of establishment in Canada (1765) and in Louisiana (1803). The United States government was too busy with the Civil war to make forcible resistance to violation of the Monroe Doctrine. As the British and Spanish withdrew, he sent over large French forces. These made war on Juarez, drove him into the mountains and in 1863 entered Mex-

Napoleon III selected Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian Joseph, second son of Archduke Francis Charles of Austria and brother of Emperor Francis Joseph I, as emperor of this French empire in Mexico, Maximilian, then thirty-one, was handsome and soldier-like, with a fine education and a taste for the fine arts. He was living with Carlotta at Miramar, near Trieste, a palace that he had built for residence. Carlotta-Marie Charlotte Amelie-the only daughter of Leopold I of Belgium, was twenty-three and a royal beauty. "tall, beautiful, graceful, with a gentleness that won all who met her and of courtly and gracious, manner." She spoke fluently in tongues of England, France, Germany, Italy and Spain. She was popular in every court of Europe.

Through French wire-pulling in Mexico, in September of 1863, a deputation of Mexican notables arrived at Miramar to ask Maximillan to become emperor of Mexico. Maximilian, history says, was reluctant to accept. But Carlotta was as ambitious as she was able. Francis Joseph was presumably glad to see his popular brother go. Maximilian, after the form of a popular election in Mexico had been gone through with and Napoleon had made a secret agreement with him to support him with French troops, accepted the throne April 10. 18d4, and arrived June 12 in Mexico City to establish his empire.

Maximilian attempted to establish a mild reign. Bome of the Mexican leaders accepted him. But a large proportion of the Mexicans did not. Juarez. to whom Maximillan made friendly overtures. ild have none of him. A hitherto unpublished letter, from Juarez to Maximilian, recently brought

Sometimes it occurs, it is true, that people are allowed by faith to attack the hely rights of others and threaten the rights of those who defend their nationality. But I believe in the judgment of his tory, which stands apart from wrong and evil. This will give its verdict on us, 'Justitia regnerum fundamentum.' "

Juarez soon took up arms and civil war foilowed. In 1865 Maximilian proclaimed all those in arms to be outlaws—a fact that probably sealed his fate when tried for his life.

In the meantime, the United States, in the throes of the Civil war, had refused to recognize Maximilian. With the close of the Civil war the United States government found itself in possession of the strongest military force that the world had ever seen. Thereupon Gen. Philip H. Sheridan appeared at the Mexican border with an impressive force and the United States government said in effect to Napoleon III of France:

"You are violating the Monroe Doctrine. Get your French troops out of Mexico forthwith and take Maximilian with them!"

Napoleon had no choice but to do exactly as the United States government commanded. warned Maximilian that he must withdraw the French troops from Mexico. Maximilian declined to abdicate. Carlotta saw that they were lost with out French support and fled to Europe to appeal to Napoleon.

The last of the French troops withdrew from Mexico in 1867. Juarez promptly besieged Maximilian in Queretaro. May 14 Maximilian was captured, the night before he had fixed upon for escape. He was tried by a council of war, condemned to death and June 19 faced a firing squad on the Hill of the Bells. He gave each of the five soldiers a gold piece and asked them to aim well. He died like a brave man and a gentleman,

Juarez, an able man of few words and hones purpose, resumed the presidency and held it till his death, five years later.

Carlotta's vain attempts to secure aid in Europ were as dramatic as tragic. Napoleon III feared to face her and evaded a meeting until she forced an interview. The meeting was without witnesser Napoleon refused to aid her. He may have wanted to keep his pledged word to Maximilian, but he did not dare to defy the United States. Just what was said behind those closed doors is not known, but Carlotta was heard to shrick at its close:

"I ought hever to have forgotten what I am and what you are. I ought not to have forgotten that there is Bourbon blood in my veins, and should not have disgraced my descent by lowering myself before a Bonaparte and being led away by an adventurer (*

Attendants, entering, found her unconscious on

Carlotta next saw Pope Plus IX, who received her at a reception in the throne room at the vatican and accorded her the honors of a reigning monarch. She suspected that this was a ruse to prevent the discussion of her affairs. Later, the pope returned the visit, as etiquette demanded. An ample escort accompanied him, and again Carlotta could not find opportunity. But she made an other effort. Dressed in mourning, with one wom-

gium, is occupied by the widow of Archduke Maxi milian of Austria. I instruct German soldier: not to disturb the household, not to ring the bel and not to sing in passing." And Carlotta's home remained untouched through the devastation,

Many stories about Carlotta have been circulated during her long seclusion in Bouchout. It is known that at first she was violently insane, her main obsession being that everyone was trying to polson her. Later she became more rational-so rational that her actual insanity was questioned

Her royal family never took any steps to have her declared legally incompetent, and it is said she has never spoken or written anything that settled definitely whether she was sane or insane, or renlized that she had lost her place.

Although Ill, she managed for a long while the most minute details of her lavish establishment. Every day she wrote out her orders in one of the grand salons, and these commands were executed by the servants. With her tollet she was scrupu-lously careful, and attired herself with the same taste and distinction that she used when moving in the court circles of Europe. Her painting and drawing occupied hours each day, and she passed much of her time playing the plane,

It has also been broadly hinted that Leopold II kept her sequestrated as insane, though she was not so, to concest the fact that he had taken and «quandered her fortune.

One question is still unanswered: Has Carlotta read this final letter from Maximilian which he penned shortly before his execution? "My Beloved Carlotta: If God permit that your

health be restored and you should read these few lines you will learn the cruelty with which fate has stricken me since your departure for Europe. You took with you not only my heart, but my good fortune. Why did I not give heed to your voice? So many untoward events! Alas! So many sud den blows have shattered all my hopes; so that death is but a happy deliverance, not an agony, to me. I shall die gloriously like a soldier, like a monarch, vanquished but not dishonored. If your sufferings are too great, and God shall call you soon to join me, I shall bless His divine hund which has weighed so heavily upon us. Adden.

Other improvements in he order given by most of the five undred farmers are more liberal feedng, feeding more legunies, better wa er supply, providing minerals, feeding according to production, feeding nore protein, and more regular feedng. At the same time they list the ommon errors in feeding which are esponsible for poor results, poor cominations of feeds being the one most requently mentioned, followed by un-terfeeding as the next most effective educer of profits. Following these in egular order, based on the number of imes mentioned in the answers, com ack of protein, lack of water, lack of egumes, sudden changes of feed, poor ousing parasites, lack of salt, waste f feed, poor equipment, and overfeedng. Practically all of these troubles re easily preventable.

Almost all of these 500 farmers had aised at one time or another scrubs rades, and pure breds, and almost to man thej joined in a paean of praise of the pure bred. Only 1 per cent of hem reported that they had failed vith improved stock. Most replie ontained specific estimates showing he superiority of well-bred over ranlom-bred animals, and when aver ged it was brought out that the nen consider that pure breds make bout 40 per cent better returns on eed used than common stock. It is neeresting to note here that another juestionnaire sent out by the dep nent a year ago and answered by heir opinion pure breds have a genral utility value a little more thi er cent greater than common

In the northeastern states, where dairying is very generally followed, two-thirds of the farmers in the list have siles. Although most of the sliage is fed to dairy cows, the list of animals to which it is fed, according to the ques tionnaire, includes also steers, breeding ewes, and brood sows. A few men reported feeding it in limited quantities to horses, hogs, and lambs.

It is worth while to note that me than 22 per cent of these farmers was answered the government questi credited farm papers as the principal source of their knowledge of feeding problems. Other important source mentioned were: Experience on home farm, general observation, bulleti and books and records.



MAKE-FRUIT BUTTERS WHEN YIELD IS GOOD

Recipes Given Have Been Tested by Specialists.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

There is no better way to use good apples and the sound parts of windfalls and wormy and bruised apples than to make them into butter. Pears and plums-also make good butter, and peach butter is unusually appetizing. While apple butter is usually made with cider, using gallon for gallon of have been tested by the United States Department of Agriculture and are rec- | way as other butters or preserves.

Apple Butter With Grape Juice.

To each gallon of peeled and sliced and strained, add one pint of grape juice, one cupful of brown sugar and one-quarter teaspoonful of salt. Cook slowly and stir often for two hours, or until of the desired thickness: then stir in one teaspoonful of cinnamon.

Apple Butter With Lemons. Slice four lemons, cover with water and let stand over night. Next morning put them in a preserving kettle with eight pounds of apples, pared. cored and sliced. Cook for one hour: add three pounds of sugar and cook slowly, with frequent stirring, one and one-half hours longer, or until of the proper thickness.

Apple Butter With Pluma.

An exceedingly rich and snappy butter is made with apples and plums. Use one measure of plums to two measures of peeled and sliced apples. Wash and cook the plums and rub through a strainer or colander to get out the pits. Cook the apples into sauce, add the stewed plums and continue cooking an hour or two until of the right consistency. When two-thirds cooked, add two pounds of sugar per gallon. When finished, used spices and vanilla according to taste. A good proportion is one-half teaspoonful each of ground cinnamon, cloves and allspice, and from two to four teaspoonfuls of vanilla per gallon.

Pear Butter. Pear butter is made like apple butter without the cider. Use pears ripe enough to cook up well. Peel, core and slice them; put in a preserving kettle with a little water and cook slowly until soft. METHOD OF CLARIFYING FAT

With at Least an Equal Ve of Water and Heat for Short Time.

An old-fashioned method of clarifying fat from the soup kettle or from cooked meats such as bacon, ham, chicken, beef, sausage, and other sources, is recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture, Melt the fat with at least an equal volume of water and heat for a short time at a moderate temperature, stiring the mixture occasionally. When cold, remove the cake of fat and scrape off any small particles of meat and skin that adhere.

Some fats are better flavored than others for use in pastry or cake making, but all cleanly rendered fats may be used in frying. If the flavor or color or both are not satisfactory at the first rendering, the process may be repeated several times. Another method, often recommended, is to cook a number of slices of raw potato in the boiling fat. The addition of a small uncut onion, a few leaves of summer savory and thyme, salt and pepper when rendering meat drippings, makes a savory fut useful for gravies. Sausage fat is excellent for frying meats which have less flavor of their own, as veal cutlet or rabbit.

Fat in small quantities may be eas lly kept sweet in the ice box for cook ing purposes. If lard is rendered at nome in large quantities to last long time it should be kept covered in tins or earthen jars, in a cool, dry

They appeared in the lower court on a charge of murdering their uncle, Apolonio Herrera, as a result of quarrel over a bridge crossing an irrigation ditch. In the fight that followed the quarrel, it is alleged that Herrera was killed by a shot from a revolver in the hands of Gumicindo Truillo.

New Mexico and Arizona have suffered a blow from which it will take them five years to come back, says Aldo Leopold of the forest service, who has just completed a trip through several of the national forests. The perennial grasses have been grazed trampled and dried out, he says, and the rank growth that has sprung up since the recent rains is what is known as "six weeks grass." There are many varieties of six weeks grass. all of which spring up from seed when there is plenty of rainfall, but none of which make good winter grass. There are plenty of places throughout the southwest, he says, where there would be a good stand of gramma grass now, had care been taken in avoiding overstocking. 

-Take 15 large sour apples, two green peppers, one cupful of seeded raisins, two good - sized

Para core and chop the apples together with the peppers, from which the seeds and membrane have been removed, and the onions. Add the raisins and vinegar and put into a kettle and simmer for two hours. Add the sugar and oning and cook slowly another hour. Seal in glass jars while hot. This recipe makes about five pints.

Peach Chutney,-Take two and one haif pounds of fresh penches, one and one-quarter pounds of evaporated peaches, one-haif pound of seeded raisins, two tablespoonfuls of red chilipowder, one small onion, one-half cup-ful of mustard seed, one-half pound of green ginger, one and one-quarter ds of brown sugar, one quart of vinegar and one-third of a cupful of salt. Soak the evaporated peaches several hours in water to cover, then cut into small pleces. Peel and cut the fresh pieces. Put the onion and ginger root through the food chopper. Boll the peaches in a pint of vinegar for one-half hour. Make a strup of the sugar and a pint of vinegar and cook all the ingredients in it for an hour, stirring frequently until thick. Seal while not in preserve jars. This makes eleven cupfuls.

Pickled, Spiced Onions.—Peel small onions and cover with hot water and salt, making a strong brine. Let them stand twenty-four hours, drain, cover with another hot brine. Next day drain, make a fresh brine, heat to the bolling point; add the onlone and boll three minutes. Drain and put the onlone into jars with bits of mace, bay leaf, cloves and alices of red pepper. Fill the jars with hot vinegar and sugar. Allow one cupful of sugar to four quarts of vinegar. Seal at once.

Colory Sticks.—Take tender white callery, wash and crisp it in cold water.
Drain and dry and fill the groove in



Stir until the sugar is dissolved, adding all the ingredients. It will curdle, but when frozen will be smooth and velvety. Freeze as usual.






Scene in the Principal Street of Tokyo


