

East year the franchise for the corporation controlling these three plants was valued at \$56.855, while the personal property, such as power louse, gas plant and appurtenances and steam heating outlit, was valued more than they were for 1906. at \$110.155 for 1906. These two figures stand for this year's taxes. The other corporation of the Stone & Webster people is the Paducah Traction company which controls the street car line Last year this franchise was valued at \$38,860, and for this year that is in-creased to \$43,445, while the traction company's personal property, such as ears, tracks, efc., was valued last year at \$84,860, and this is raised this year to \$89,145. By leaving the light and power franchise at \$56,855 and raising the traction franchise for this year to \$43.145, this makes the combined franchise assessment for these interests an even \$100,000. This makes the Stone & Webster people pay taxes on \$308,300, exclusive of the buildings and real estate, which is valued under a separate head.

The franchise of the Paducah Water company was valued last year at \$12,500, which is raised to \$46,500 for this year.
