DEFENDANCE

NATURAL RESOURCES TO
RECONSIDER

The State of Washington, Department of Ecology, requests this Court to defer briefing on and consideration of the Motion of the Spokane Tribe to Amend Findings in the Court's Memorandum Opinion and the Motion of the Department of Natural Resources to Reconsider. These pending motions and all similar motions which may be filed should be noted for argument at the same time as hearing on exceptions to the proposed Judgment expressly directed for submission, to the Court, July 23, 1979.

Federal Rule 52(b) governs motions to amend findings. It does not clearly state that motions to reconsider or motions to amend findings may not be made or heard before entry of judgment. However, in this case, given the local rules for the eastern district and the Court's express directions to plaintiffs, waiting until after presentation of the proposed Judgment is the better procedure.

The Court in its Memorandum Opinion of July 23, 1979, allowed the plaintiffs 20 days to submit a proposed Judgment. Given the

MEMO OF DOE, RE: MOTS TO AMEND AND TO RECONSIDER briefing schedule set out in Local Rule 11 and the 5 day notice requirement for hearing motions, we note that a hearing on a pre-Judgment motion could not have taken place before the expiration of this 20-day period.

Although we understand that the United States may seek an extension of the 20-day period for submission of the proposed Judgment, the Court nevertheless should defer consideration of motions until such time as all parties have a draft Judgment before them. This will allow the Court to make one order on all such motions and exceptions to the proposed Judgment. Once Judgment is entered, parties may move to amend findings or move to reconsider. The Court also should hear all post-Judgment motions at once and issue an order relating to them. That order would commence the time in which any appeals could be taken.

We have discussed this procedure with the attorney for the Department of Natural Resources, and he has no objection to this approach.
