

Asako Furuoya, *oboe*, a native of Japan, received a Bachelor of Music degree from New England Conservatory of Music, where she studied with Keisuke Wakao. She is currently pursuing her Master's degree at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music as a full scholarship student, studying with Joseph Robinson. She performs frequently with the Miami Symphony Orchestra and has been awarded the Top Prize in Oboe of Yokohama International Music Competition in 2013.

Ruth Santos, bassoon, a native of Honduras, started her bassoon studies at the age of thirteen with Oscar Orlando Meza, Bassoon teacher at the National School of Music in Tegucigalpa, where she studied for six years before coming to the USA. In 2010 Ruth got accepted into the music program at Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas where she studied with Kimberly Krutz, a member of the Kansas City Symphony. Ruth is currently pursuing a Bachelor's degree in bassoon performance at the Conservatory of Music at Lynn University, studying with Michael Ellert.

Greg Stead, *oboe*, was born in South Africa and has been performing throughout Florida since 2006. He is currently pursuing a Master of Music degree from Lynn University where he studies with Joseph Robinson. Previously, he received his Bachelor of .Arts from the Florida State University College of Music where he studied oboe with Dr. Eric P. Ohlsson. He has performed with many ensembles in South Florida including the Miami Symphony Orchestra, the Naples Bach Ensemble and the Gulf Coast Symphony Orchestra.

Karen Fuller Dixon, *flute*, is Principal Flute of the Palm Beach Opera Orchestra and newly appointed Principal Flute of the Opus One Orchestra (Miami City Ballet). She also performs with the Boca Raton Symphonia, the Atlantic Classical Orchestra and Orchestra Miami, and coaches chamber music at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music in Boca Raton. Ms. Dixon received both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Flute Performance from the Manhattan School of Music. She is on the Board of Directors and is a founding member of the Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival, appearing on all six Chamber Music Palm Beach CDs on the Klavier Music Production label.

Michael Ellert, bassoon, is Principal Bassoon of the Palm Beach Opera Orchestra, Southwest Florida Symphony (Fort Myers), Boca Raton Symphonia and is the newly appointed Principal Bassoon of the Opus One Orchestra (Miami City Ballet). Mr. Ellert is an Assistant Professor of Bassoon, Head of the Woodwind Department and Chamber Music Coordinator at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music. He is on the Board of Directors and is a founding member of the Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival, appearing on all six Chamber Music Palm Beach CDs on the Klavier Music Production Label.

Michael Forte, clarinet, is Principal Clarinet of the Palm Beach Opera Orchestra and Southwest Florida Symphony (Fort Myers) and is the Co-Principal Clarinet of the Boca Raton Symphonia. He is a former member of the Maracaibo Symphony (Venezuela) and is a graduate of Syracuse University. Mr. Forte is on the Board of Directors and is a founding member of the Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival, appearing on all six Chamber Music Palm Beach CDs on the Klavier Music Production label.

Lisa Leonard, piano, enjoys a diverse career as soloist, chamber musician, and educator. An active chamber musician, she has performed with members of the Berlin, Vienna, New York, Cleveland and Cincinnati Symphonies and with members of the American and Mendelssohn String Quartets. Ms. Leonard received her M.M. and B.M. from the Manhattan School of Music and has served on the faculties of the North Carolina School of the Arts, the Meadowmount School of Music, and the Las Vegas Music Festival and is currently the head of the Graduate Instrumental Collaborative Piano Program at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music. This year marks her tenth season with the Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival and she appears on one Chamber Music Palm Beach CD on the Klavier Music Production Label.

Marc Reese, trumpet, is best known for his internationally acclaimed near two decade tenure with the Empire Brass. He has also performed with the New York Philharmonic, Cleveland and Boston Symphony Orchestras. Mr. Reese has numerous recordings on Telarc, Sony and Naxos. As an educator, Mr. Reese serves as Assistant Dean and Brass Department Head for the Lynn University Conservatory of Music. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from Boston University and Master of Music degree from the New England Conservatory. This is Mr. Reese's seventh season with the Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival.

GUEST ARTISTS

Deborah Fleisher, *harp*, is on the faculty of the Frost School of Music as lecturer in the Department of Instrumental Performance. She is a graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music and received an Artists Diploma from the Peabody Institute. She was the harpist with the Baltimore Opera, Delaware Symphony, Concert Artists of Baltimore, Florida Grand Opera, Miami City Ballet, and Florida Sunshine Pops. She performs throughout South Florida from Key West to Naples to Palm Beach.

Dan Satterwhite, trombone, studied music at Mars Hill College and North Texas State University. Since making South Florida his home, Mr. Satterwhite has been a frequent guest musician with many orchestras, including the Naples Philharmonic, Florida Orchestra, Florida Philharmonic, Jacksonville Symphony, Alabama Symphony and the Palm Beach Opera Orchestra. As a recording musician, he can be heard with artists ranging from Reneé Fleming to Rihanna. Mr. Satterwhite is currently Assistant Professor of Trombone at Lynn University Conservatory of Music and serves as bass trombonist of the Florida Grand Opera Orchestra, Boca Symphonia, and the Palm Beach Symphony.

Erika Yamada, oboe, was born in Kyoto, Japan and grew up in the New Orleans area where her family moved when she was five. She is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music where she studied with Richard Killmer and received a Bachelor of Music degree in performance and the Performer's Certificate. She was a member of the Florida Philharmonic and the Florida Grand Opera orchestras and has played principal oboe with the Miami Chamber Symphony, Orchestra Miami, the Miami City Ballet, the Atlantic Classical Orchestra, the Boca Raton Symphonia, and the Shinsei Symphony Orchestra in Tokyo, Japan. She has served on the faculties of the University of Miami, New World School of the Arts, Broward Community College, and S.U.N.Y. at Geneseo and is a panelist for the National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts.
