Jon Robertson, guest pianist

Jon Robertson enjoys a distinguished career both as a pianist and conductor. His career as a concert pianist began at age nine with his debut in Town Hall, New York with The New York Times calling him a pint-sized Paderewski. As a child prodigy and a student of the renowned pianist and teacher Ethel Leginska, he continued to concertize throughout the United States, the Caribbean and Europe. Already established as a brilliant concert pianist, he was awarded full scholarship to the Juilliard School of Music where he earned the B. M., M. S. and D. M. A. degrees in piano performance as a student of Beveridge Webster. Although his degrees were in piano performance, he also studied choral and orchestral conducting. He later traveled to Sweden and East Germany to become the first and only private student of maestro Herbert Blomstedt, former conductor and music director of the San Francisco Symphony and now conductor and music director of the Gewandhous Orchestra, Leipzig.

In 1972 Jon Robertson accepted his first post as conductor and music director of the Thayer Conservatory of Music Orchestra in Massachusetts. While music director, he also conducted the New England Sinfonia on their successful national tour in 1975. After a successful guest conducting appearance with the Kristiansand Symphony in Norway, he was immediately engaged as conductor and music director in 1979. While director of the Symphony, he was invited to conduct the National Norwegian Opera Company in six performances of La Bohème, as well as yearly productions with the Kristiansand Opera Company. First appearing in Redlands as guest conductor in the spring of 1982, Maestro Robertson became the conductor and music director of the Redlands Symphony Orchestra in the fall of that year and is currently in his twentieth season with that ensemble. Maestro Robertson has conducted many orchestras as guest conductor. As such, he has conducted the San Francisco Symphony at Stern Grove, the Beijing Central Philharmonic of China, the Gavele Symphony in Sweden, the Oakland East Bay Symphony, the Tronheim Symphony in Norway, the Long Beach Symphony, the Nebraska Chamber Orchestra and the Santa Barbara Chamber Orchestra. He is a regular guest conductor of the Cairo Symphony Orchestra, which is in residence at the Pianofest Austria at Bad Aussee, Austria.

Jon Robertson is currently in his eleventh year as Professor of Music and Conductor of the Philharmonia Orchestra at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), where he also serves as Chairman of the Music Department.

Sergiu Schwartz, violin

Sergiu Schwartz's international concert appearances have taken him to major music centers on three continents including twenty European countries, Israel and over forty U. S. states as soloist with over two hundred leading orchestras in recitals and chamber music concerts. "Following in the footsteps of his fellow countrymen Itzhak Perlman and Pinchas Zukerman, he is a product of the best of European romantic interpretative style and 20th-Century American technical acuity," states New York's Newsday, while Le Soleil (Canada) notes that "he stands out as one of the best violinists of his generation." Recent solo orchestral engagements include the Dresden Staatskapelle, Jerusalem Symphony, London Symphony, Sarajevo Philharmonic, Dresden Philharmonic, Slovak Philharmonic, European Community Chamber Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra of Mexico, Florida Philharmonic, Chicago's Grant Park Festival Orchestra, among numerous other distinguished ensembles in the U. S. and worldwide.

Mr. Schwartz has collaborated in performances with preeminent conductors including Sergiu Comissiona, James Judd, Peter Maag, Giuseppe Sinopoli, and Bruno Weil. He has performed in major concert halls including New York's Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall; Kennedy Center (Washington); Barbican Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall, and Wigmore Hall (London); Royce Hall (Los Angeles); and Academia Santa Cecilia (Rome), among many others. Mr. Schwartz is a frequent guest at national and international music festivals in the United States (including Aspen, Newport, Interlochen), Israel, Switzerland, Finland, England, France, Holland, Romania and Bulgaria. He has been featured in broadcasts for major radio and TV stations, including the BBC, NPR and CNN, and WXEL-TV's "Great Performances," and has recorded for Vox, Gega-New, Arcobaleno, Naxos, Nonesuch, Romeo Records, CRS Records, and Discover/Koch International.

Sergiu Schwartz studied at the Israel Rubin Academy in Tel Aviv, where he also gained exposure to world-class artists such as Isaac Stern and Yehudi Menuhin during master classes at the Jerusalem Music Center. He continued his studies with Yfrah Neaman at the Guildhall School in London, and with Dorothy DeLay at The Juilliard School in New York, where he was also awarded scholarships from the America-Israel Cultural Foundation. Mr. Schwartz's honors include major prizes in international violin competitions in London, Switzerland, Chile and the United States, as well as awards from the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Foundation for the Advancement of the Arts.

A teacher of prize winning students in prestigious international competitions, including Paganini (Italy), Pablo Sarasate (Spain), Henryk Szeryng (Mexico), Prix d'Europe (Canada), and Coleman and Carmel Chamber Music Competitions (California), Mr. Schwartz combines his performing career with his position on the artist faculty of the Conservatory of Music at Lynn University. As a visiting artist, Mr. Schwartz regularly conducts master classes and lectures at music schools, colleges, and universities worldwide, including Interlochen and Idvllwild Arts Academies, UCLA, San Francisco Conservatory, Eastman School of Music, Oberlin Conservatory, New York's LaGuardia School for the Performing Arts. Jerusalem Rubin Academy of Music, Reina Sofia Academy (Madrid), Royal Academy of Music (London), as well as summer master courses in Finland, France, Italy, Switzerland, Holland, Bosnia, Romania, and Bulgaria. He has also served as juror in major international competitions in Spain, Mexico, Italy, France, Poland, Canada, the US and Russia including the Tchaikovsky International Violin Competition in Moscow. He has been named for outstanding achievement with a full-length life history in prestigious professional international directories, including International Who's Who in Music and Musicians (Cambridge, England) and Who's Who in America.

Claudio Jaffé, cello

Born in São Paulo, Brazil, Claudio Jaffé began his cello studies at the age of seven, giving his first public concert at the age of eleven. In Brazil, he studied with Ibere Gomes Grosso, Antonio Guerra Vicente, and Juarez Johnson. At fifteen, the distinguished professor of cello Aldo Parisot invited him to study at Yale University, where Dr. Jaffé earned his undergraduate, graduate and doctoral degrees. Dr. Jaffé has appeared with the Calgary Philharmonic under Victor Feldbrill, the Brazilian Symphony orchestra under Mehli Mehta and Jean-Claude Cassadesus and Alexander Schneider. Recent performance invitations have included New York City: Montreal: Rio de Janeiro: Pittsburgh: Portland, OR; Vancouver, Canada; Tulsa; and with the Slovak Philharmonic on tour in the US. Additionally he has performed on recital stages throughout the United States including Town Hall and Carnegie Recital Hall in New York and the Ambassador Auditorium in Pasadena, CA. Dr. Jaffé also performs in Europe and in his native South America in prestigious concert halls as well as on radio and television. Dr. Jaffé was visiting professor for two years at Florida Atlantic University in Davie. He is currently Dean of the Conservatory of Music and Director of the Music Preparatory at Lynn University. He also serves as Resident Conductor of the Florida Youth Orchestra.

The mission of the conservatory is to provide performance education for gifted young musicians, setting a superior standard for education as it cultivates the musicianship, artistry, and skills needed to succeed in music performance.

Students at the conservatory

Conservatory students have come to Lynn University from 13 countries and 19 states, with 14 conservatory students from here in Florida. When they graduate, these young musicians will perform with some of the most prestigious symphonies in the world—Calgary, Detroit, Montreal, Milwaukee, Washington D.C., the New World Symphony, and the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra. Conservatory students have competed in the Juilliard Concerto Competition, National Trumpet Competition, Rubinstein International Piano Competition, and the Wallenstein Violin Competition. Graduates study at Juilliard, New England Conservatory, Yale, and other prestigious schools. The exceptional quality of the conservatory is evidenced by 98% of the graduates remaining active in music.

Adopt-A-Student

Talent abounds in the faculty and students at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music. But as it has been in the past, talent is not always given to those young people whose parents can afford the education needed to nurture and develop their gifts. To ensure the finest young musicians receive the rigorous training they will need to succeed as performance artists, Lynn University provides significant scholarship support to conservatory students.

The Conservatory of Music has the capacity to meet the educational needs of 60 or more students each year. The current Lynn University budget allots \$950,000 per year for scholarships to these students. This figure, while generous, does not meet the needs of many deserving students. Conservatory students make up 3% of the student body, but receive 9.5% of the scholarships awarded by the university. Campus wide, 56% of Lynn University students receive some kind of financial aid, while 90% of the conservatory students receive scholarships.

To meet the additional need, the university has developed the Adopt-a-Student program designed to allow patrons of the arts to support a student through a conservatory education. An annual gift of \$25,000 to Lynn University designated for this program will support tuition costs for one year.

Students selected will be listed in all programs by name and noted as the "Funder's Name Student-Musician." Patrons are encouraged to meet the student musician they support. Students are available for the program based on merit and potential.
