The Moline Cross divides the college seal into four equal parts. The fleur-de-lis is the crest of the family of D. C. Flory, founder of the college, and the open book symbolizes knowledge and the fight against ignorance. The cardinal and the dogwood branch are symbols of Virginia, and in the lower right corner is the personal seal of Alexander Mack, founder of the Church of the Brethren. The crest is topped by a two-headed eagle representing the college's athletic teams. The motto is translated "beauty, goodness, truth, and harmony."
