Along with the cover of this issue, we have included the brochure from which it was derived. The brochure was created as part of an identity project that WOU students worked on for local communities during fall 2014.


About the brochure:



ONMOUTH

HISTORY


Monmouth, Oregon was settled by a group of immigrants from Monmouth, Illinois. No structures from those early days remain; the oldest private structure still existing in Monmouth today is the Craven House, located on east Main Street. The Western Oregon University campus is where you can find the second oldest existing structure, known as Campbell Hall, dating back to 1871.

Monmouth was settled by pioneers who made a point of allocating 640 acres to build both a city and a "college under the auspices of the Christian Church" and proceeds from the sale of these lands were used to found Monmouth University. For decades (until 2002), Monmouth was a dry town that banned the sale of alcoholic beverages in supermarkets, restaurants and bars.

FACTS

Monmouth is in Polk County, and is part of the Salem Metropolitan Statistical Area, about 15 miles west of Salem on OR 99W. According to the 2010 US Census, the city occupies a total area of 2.24 square miles. The population was 9,534, the racial makeup was 82.8% White, 13.4% Hispanic or Latino, 1.1% African American, 1.5% Native American, 3.3% Asian, 0.6% Pacific Islander, 10.7% from other races or from two or more races. The median age in the city was 23.7 years.

Historical Sites

Fort Yamhill State Park

Built in 1856 to regulate the eastern border of the Grande Ronde Reservation and to ease tensions between settlers and natives, Fort Yamhill is one of the best preserved forts in the Pacific Northwest.

Ritner Creek Covered Bridge

Hwy 223 @ Kerber Road Monmouth, OR 97361 (503) 623-8172

Named for pioneer Sebastian Ritner who arrived in Oregon in 1845, the bridge was constructed in 1926. One of the last covered bridges to serve on an Oregon highway, it was moved in 1976 to its current location.


Independence Historic District

Listed on the National
Register of Historic places
in 1989, the historic district
encompasses the entire
downtown sector. The roughly
30-block district preserves
approximately 250 homes and
businesses of a prosperous
riverside town of the 1880s.
Between the 1890's-1940's
Independence was dubbed
the hop capital of the world.

Independence is a city in Polk County, Oregon, United States, on the west bank of the Willamette River along Oregon Route 51. Independence was founded in 1845 by pioneers who migrated from Independence, Missouri.

Independence thrived as a shipping point, by both rail and boat, for agricultural products and lumber until the 1950s. The city was known for its hops production from the 1890s through the 1940s. Thirty square blocks of the oldest part of town form the National Register of Historic Places-listed Independence Historic District.

The city has a total area of 2.82 square miles and the population was 8,590 at the 2010 census.



























Monmouth is the home of Western Oregon University (WOU). WOU is a public liberal arts college with a student enrollment of approximately 6,200 students. It was originally established in 1856 by Oregon pioneers as Monmouth University. Subsequent names include Oregon Normal School, Oregon College of Education, and Western Oregon State College.






