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## TAAC, home losses top '91 letdowns

Critics might jump to the conclusion that the 1991 GSU Eagle baseball season was a disappointing one.

There was no College World Series appearance. There was no eruption at Hanner Fieldhouse after the announcement of an at-large bid in the NCAA regionals for the Eagles. There was barely even a winning record.

But it cannot be assumed that the Eagles' 32-27 season was a disappointment.

Just parts of it were.

### Absence from post season play

After the Eagles lost three of their top four pitchers from last year, a catcher who hit a team-high .382 and a center fielder who stole 29 bases, they could've been expected to come short of a repeat trip to the College World Series.

But, with six position players back, they also could've been expected at least to qualify for the Trans America Athletic Conference Tournament.

The Eagles finished with a respectable 10-8 TAAC mark, but they were not good enough to qualify for the four-team playoff. GSU missed the tourney for the first time since the TAAC began in 1980.

The possible turning point was GSU's April 6-7 series with Florida International in Statesboro. The two clubs entered the three-game series with identical 4-5 TAAC records.

Southern dominated the first game 11-1 to move a full game ahead of the Golden Panthers. Mike Miller, David Dupree and Todd Greene homered to highlight Jim Carragher's complete-game victory.

However, Greg Mucerino belted a three-run homer to key a 4-2 FIU victory in game two. The Panthers won game three 9-1 to drop GSU to 5-7 in the TAAC.

The Eagles did not sweep a conference series until April 20-21 against Mercer. By then, though, FIU and Stetson had already clinched the two TAAC Eastern Division playoff spots.

### Unfriendly confines at Clements

It took the GSU Eagles just four games to lose as many times at home as they did the entire 1990 season.

Simply put, visiting teams did not win at J.I. Clements Stadium last year. Southern won 26 of 29 contests, including 24 in a row, on its home field.

The Eagles looked like they would continue the success as they downed the defending national champion Georgia Bulldogs 4-1 in their home opener. However, after the Eagles were throttled 18-2 in game two of the UGA series, they dropped two straight to Clemson.

GSU's home mark plummeted to 1-6 after two losses to South Carolina-Aiken, an NAIA team, and one to Georgia Tech.

Despite closing the season with eight straight home wins, the Eagles

finished only 17-13 at Clements, a nine-and-a-half game drop from a year ago.

### Starting pitcher after Hamilton

Junior right-hander Joey Hamilton had the kind of year everyone expected — 12 wins, six complete games, 125 strikeouts and a 3.85 earned-run average.

The kind of year that will make GSU's all-time victories leader a first-round draft pick this summer.

Problem was, the rest of the staff simply gave up too many runs. Not counting Hamilton, the team ERA was 6.42. Even with him it was 5.73.

Right-hander Dave Masi showed promise as a freshman in 1990, going 2-1 and throwing a complete game. But Masi suffered the dreaded "sophomore jinx," tying for the team lead in losses (2-6) while sporting a 7.64 ERA.

Righty Jake Greene didn't allow an earned run in fall practice, but he was roughed up when the action counted. Greene won four games (4-4), but uncorked 17 wild pitches while being touched for a 6.68 ERA.

Ronald Stanford had a rocky first year (2-5, 6:09) and Carragher owned a 10.31 after his first three decisions (1-2).

### Low team batting average

In 1990, six Eagles batted .305 or better and two more finished in the .290's. As a team, Southern batted .310.

In 1991, four Eagles batted .305 or better and two more finished in the .290's, but GSU slumped to only

.269 as a unit.

Catcher was the hardest-hit position. Although no one expected Buddy Holder to be the next Fitzpatrick, his average was a let-

down. Even with a .348 clip over the last 10 games, Holder could manage only a .227 final average.

The lead-off position also suffered. Kevin Hallman batted .321

through the first 16 games, but slumped badly late in the season to end at .251.

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## Fennell swings into regional

Bo chosen to represent GSU

For the second consecutive year, golfer Bo Fennell has been selected to represent GSU as an individual at-large participant at the NCAA I East Regional in New Haven, Conn.

Donna J. Noonan, NCAA Director of Championships, made the selection announcements for the 54-hole tournament Monday.

Play opened yesterday at the par-70, 6,600-yard Yale Golf Club. Second round action is scheduled for today with the final round taking

place tomorrow.

Fennell finished the spring as one of the top golfers in the country, recording a 71.60 stroke average over seven tournaments. He enjoyed an exceptional finish, placing first or second in each of the last four tournaments.

In his last 12 rounds, Fennell finished nine under par, averaging 70.25 shots per round. His late-season surge included a 65 in the opening round of the conference tournament (he finished in a tie for first).

He was a third-team Golf Coaches Association All-America choice last

spring after finishing 15th at the NCAA I East Regional in Savannah, missing the National Championships cut by just one stroke.

The East Regional consists of 23 teams and five at-large selections. Eleven teams and the top two individuals will advance to the National Golf Championships, which will be held June 5-8 at the Poppy Hills Golf Course in Monterey, Calif.

The five at-large individuals or top players from a non-qualifying team are eligible to make up the two individual slots.

## Dean & Darnell join GSU

Mike Darnell, a 6-2, 190-pound catcher from Goose Creek, S.C., and Mark Dean, a 5-11, 165-pound outfielder from Wadsworth, Ohio, have signed letters-of-intent with the GSU baseball program.

Darnell is a two-time all-state

selection. He batted .390 with seven home runs and 26 runs batted in in 1991 at Stratford High School.

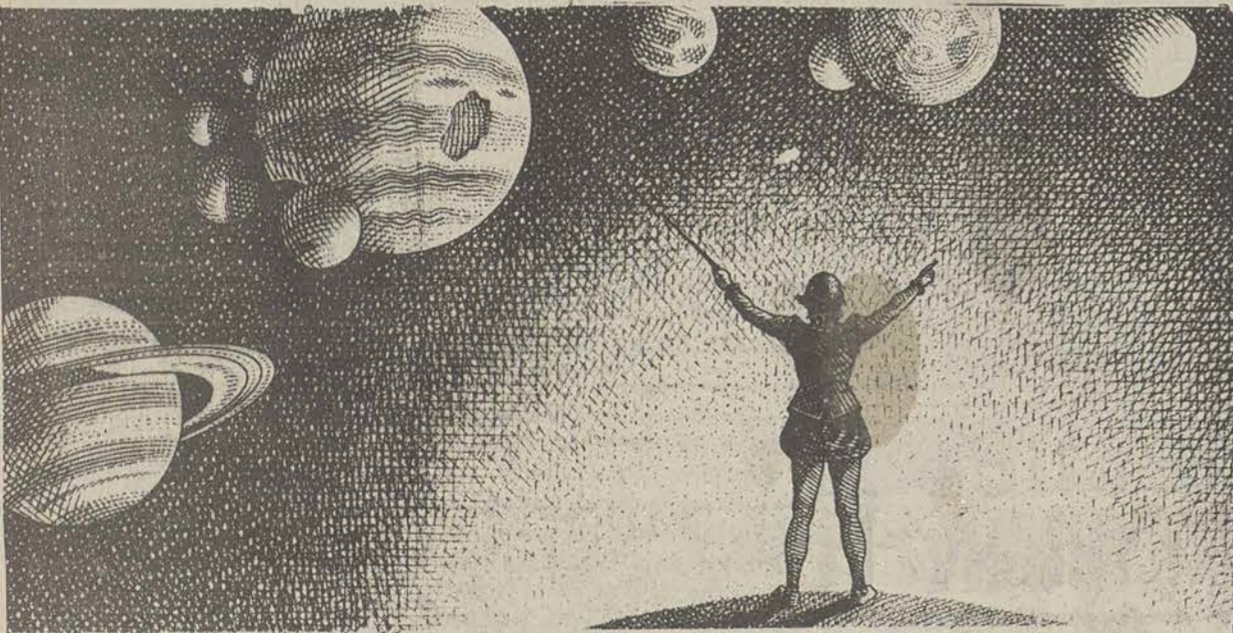
In a three-year varsity career, Darnell hit .376 with nine home runs and 64 RBI. He was also an all-state choice in football at quarterback.

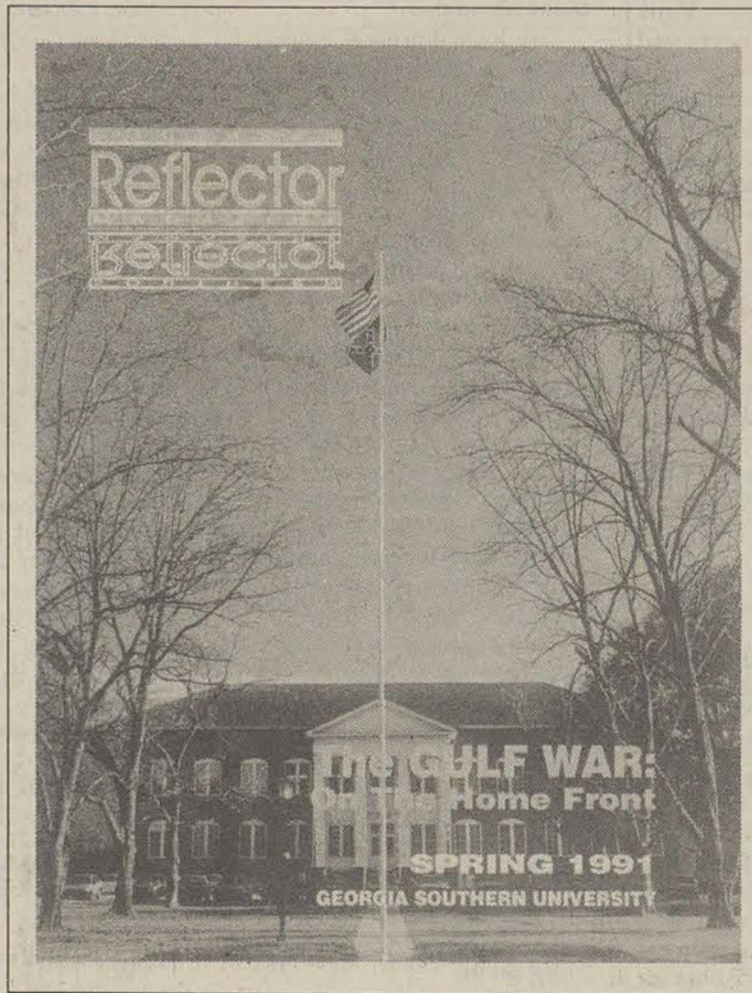
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## Battle of the Bands draws dedicated rockers

GSU's University Union Ballroom was the site for the Campus Activities Board's 1991 Battle of the Bands Monday night, with local progressive rock act Home of Thousands taking first place out of a field of eight diverse and talented bands.

"We didn't think we had pulled it off," said Jason Bueller, Home of Thousands drummer.

Bueller's sentiments were echoed by vocalist and guitarist Brian Bice.

"We're surprised," he said, "I feel both elated and grateful."

Both Bueller and Bice were members of long time local cover band Silent Remarks, but in the past year joined with bassist Ryan Kelley, who is also guitarist for last year's Battle of the Bands winner Jive Socket, to form their current lineup.

"Hopefully now we can be recognized around this campus," said Bice, "we've been around for a while as a 100% original band and maybe this will get people to come check us out."

For placing first the band received five hours of free recording

time at Savannah's 20/20 Recording Studios. Members say they plan to go into the studio immediately and record a group of original songs.

Taking second place in the event was Ophelia Daze, who relied on an intense psychedelic sound and the most elaborate stage show of the evening to make their impression on the judges. The band's stage show featured strobe lights, dimmed house lights and soap bubbles emanating from an unknown source to help set the atmosphere they desired.

"We really enjoyed the compe-

tion," said drummer Ann Clayton, "Even if we hadn't placed, I feel we had a strong performance and had lots of fun."

Ophelia Daze plan on using the three hours of recording time awarded for second place to record a live demo tape which they hope to have released before the end of this quarter.

The third place band in the contest were Trip and Fall, the only band finishing in the top three to perform cover songs. The band played a set of both original songs and covers such as Jimi Hendrix's *Fire* and *Hard to*

*Handle*, a song originally written by Otis Redding and more recently recorded by Atlanta's Black Crowes.

Aside from playing in the contest, Trip and Fall also donated their sound equipment, none of which was provided by CAB, for many of the bands to use.

For third place, the group received a gift certificate to Deloaches Music.

Other groups competing in the Battle of the Bands were: Crashin' Abbey, Daddy Was a Preacher, Jokers Wild, Midnight Sun and Threshold. The amount of parity among the competing bands was greater than ever in the history of the event, creating a difficult situation for the judges forced to decide upon three superior bands.

"It's incredible," said Dr. Russell Dewey, faculty advisor at campus radio station WVGS and a judge for the Battle of the Bands, "This fall I judged a battle of the bands for Pi Sigma Epsilon and there were four bands entered. Tonight there were eight totally different bands, which means there are at least twelve good bands in Statesboro, some of which are really good."

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## International Studies offer global opportunities

Many foreign students have come over from several different countries to study at GSU, and now we Americans have the chance to travel to other countries and study. If you feel the ability to be cultural is over powering you then go with your feelings. Of course, a second language is necessary in order to be able to communicate on your own with people of the country that you are visiting.

The International Intercultural Studies Program is the home base from which all of the many different programs came about. Each program has

several different tours and excursions for all of the students who love to go sightseeing.

One of the trips to Montpellier, France includes round trip airfare, a six-week academic program, accommodations in dorm rooms, two meals daily, program related excursions, and 13 to 15 undergraduate credit hours all for \$3,395. In order for a student to go he must have a 2.5 overall grade point average and a 3.0 average in his most recent French classes.

Another type of program is in Quebec, Canada. A total of 10 to 15 undergraduate hours can be earned in this program. Accommodations are with Quebecois families for a total of 6 weeks. No course pre-requisites are needed but beginners may

only sign up for a two-week course only. The total cost which is \$2,550 includes all of the above along with transportation, excursions, and two meals a day.

These overseas studies programs are not only for the foreign-speaking students. Anyone who wants to go is more than welcome to apply. The IISP also has programs like journalism, nursing, history, theater, and business majors. These programs are offered in countries such as England, Paris, London, Australia, Italy, and Mexico.

One of GSU's more recent programs has to do with the high school students. Jeanne Haegmann, a present french teacher is accompanying a group of students who are in high school but yet attending GSU for college

credit. These privileged students will be earning regular college credits overseas.

In order to apply a student must have a completed application form, a \$200 deposit, two letters of recommendation from an instructor familiar with the student's work, and official transcripts with seal from each college attended, sent directly by the registrar to the IISP office.

To be eligible to study abroad a credit-seeking student must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5. Some programs may require a slightly higher average.

Basically all of the programs offer similar activities, benefits, and accommodations. Price does vary with each program but financial aid is available.

## "Wolves" and "Lambs" appear on the big screen

### THE SILENCE OF THE LAMBS

Starring: Jodie Foster, Anthony Hopkins, Scott Glenn

Silence comes in loud and clear!

Hailed by *Entertainment* magazine as "The best thriller ever made" *The Silence of the Lambs* has become this year's top movie. Based on the best-selling suspense/thriller by Thomas Harris, *The Silence of the Lambs* tells of a young FBI trainee, Clarice Starling (Jodie Foster) who collaborates with a former serial killer (Anthony Hopkins) by the name of Hannibal "The Cannibal" Lecter to help catch a serial killer that kills his victims and uses their skin so as to create a female body for himself.

As she taps into the mind of Lecter, Clarice Starling is able to track "Buffalo Bill" (the killer), who holds his victims in a dry well in his house before he kills them, and also finds out some things about herself. ### DANCES WITH WOLVES

Starring: Kevin Costner, Rodney Grant

This movie dances away with seven academy awards and doesn't miss a step!

*Dances With Wolves*, directed by Costner himself and based on the best-selling novel by Michael Blake, turned audiences' heads everywhere and made them regret the historical wrongs done to the Indians by the white man. At least, it made me think. Kevin Costner (*Field of Dreams*, *Bull Durham*) stars in this motion picture epic about one man who joins the Sioux Indian.

After arriving at his post Costner finds it abandoned, but stays anyway. He soon comes in contact with some Sioux Indians and becomes friends. He gives up his life as a soldier and becomes a member of the Sioux tribe. However, when Costner returns to his post for a notebook, he is captured and treated like any other Indian.

The movie tells the tale of a race that was never really understood and therefore driven out because of their "strange" ways. It tells of a society that tried to destroy and conquer the Indians instead of making peace. With a wonderful cast, including Rodney Grant who plays an Indian friend of Costner's, the film portrays one man's finding of himself and his

realization of the truth about a society that he once thought of as the ideal society.

Although the novel is not as entertaining as the movie, if it can inspire a film like this it must have something that I did not find when I read it. *Dances With Wolves* is all the Indian movies ever combined and then some... but then what else would you expect from Kevin Costner.

drawn," said Reverend J. C. Shipman of Midway, "It should have a 50 percent minority population."  
 Districts for the state House and Senate which are also being redrawn were hot topics as well. The population shift to north Georgia forces some districts in south Georgia to be combined to meet the necessary quota for a General Assembly district.  
 This led to the constant shifting of Liberty County from one district to another by representatives of the various districts.  
 "We would like to stay in the 129th District," said Henry Wilkins, speaking on behalf of the Effingham Chamber of Commerce. "We would rather lose Liberty County to stay there."

Rep. Clinton Oliver offered three options to the committee to keep his district, the 121st, intact. Two of the three involved begrudgingly taking citizens from Liberty County.  
 The committee held 13 meetings throughout the state and will take the results into committee meetings starting June 1. The committee must present the new district boundaries to the General Assembly for approval on Aug. 19.

Todd Green finished above .300 again, their averages were down from a year ago. Yuro dropped 50 points (.358 to .308) and Greene fell 43 points (.348 to .305).  
 When the starters slumped, GSU Head Coach Jack Stallings could not turn to the reserves for help. Back-ups Craig Cassidy (.176), Bryan Wiggins (.167) and Karl Garcia (.043) were a combined 8-for-64.  
 Low batting averages for first-year starters or seldom-used reserves are not unusual, but one player's struggle at the plate came as a complete surprise.  
**Doug Eder's sub-.200 average**  
 The Eagles began the season with


question marks at pitcher and catcher and in center field, but surely they thought they were set at second base.

Doug Eder started 65 games at second base in 1990, batting .305 with 12 doubles, six home runs and 44 runs batted in.

But his junior year was a drastically different story. Eder hit just .093 (5-54) through the first 16 games, and never recovered. After a drop from second to seventh in the batting order didn't help, he saw Chad Sumner take over his position.

Eder improved slightly after being moved to designated hitter in the second half of the season, but he managed to finish the year with only a .167 average, one homer and 13 RBI.


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
