President Linda Bleicken's Remarks to the House of Representatives of the State of Georgia  
February 4, 2010

Thank you, Speaker Ralston, Speaker Pro Tem Jones, Representative Purcell, the Chatham County Delegation, and all members of the House of Representatives.

I am honored to have the privilege to speak to you today. As president of Armstrong Atlantic State University, I am grateful for your recognition of Armstrong's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary and I invite you to join us in our celebration.

As you may know, Armstrong was founded in 1935 by the City of Savannah under the leadership of Mayor Thomas Gamble. It was a time when the Great Depression gripped the country.
