Georgia Southern's annual Honors Day ceremony was held Friday, May 15. Russell Dewey, assistant professor of Psychology, and Jesse Thompson, a GSC senior, received the high honors of the day.

The Professor of the Year Award was received by Dewey from Gamma Beta Phi. The Alumni Association Scholarship Award, given to a GSC senior with the highest GPA, was awarded to Thompson.

Excellent Scholarship Awards, presented to seniors with at least a 3.8 GPA, were presented to 26 seniors. Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges were awarded to 16 students and 29 students received Constructive Leadership and Unselfish Service Awards.










ORGANIZATIONS






CHESS CLUB

Delta Tau Delta was chartered in GSC on May 17, 1969 by 28 young men seeking honesty, integrity, and brotherhood in its members.




INDUSTRIAL ARTS ASSOCIATION

The GSIAA's main goal is to acquire a lab for the use of all majors to improve their skills so they may teach the quality of Industrial Arts that is expected of them.













WVGS









Lynn Ryan All-American


















Soccer Off To A Fast Start

















Lady Eagles Have 25-II Mark












































Lady Eagle Softball Wins Third State Title
































Eagles Have Another Outstanding Year

Georgia Southern had another outstanding year in baseball, but stumbled in the TAAC Championships and lost their chance for a third straight bid to the NCAA Championships. After going unbeaton in regular season conference play, including winning four and tying one with Mercer, the Eagles lost twice to the Bears in the TAAC Championships in Abilene, TX. Derrell Baker received several individual honors after breaking the Eagles single season batting average record with a .462 mark. He was named to the TAAC All-Conference and All-Tournament teams; was TAAC player of the year; NCAA All-Altantic Region; Thirdbaseman and NCAA Second Team All-America. 












































































Young Eagles Played Consistently
