The subject terminology of all of the print or electronic versions is governed by the Thesaurus of Psychological Index Terms 7th ed. (1994), found in the Reference Room.
 - Printed Index: **Psychological Abstracts** contains summaries of psychology and psychology-related English-language journal articles, technical reports, book chapters, and books; organized by subject area for easy browsing. Cumulative author and subject indexes are published annually. Found in the reference stacks in the Reference Room on the first floor of Reese Library (REF BF1 .P65).
 - **PsycINFO** is the online counterpart to Psychological Abstracts, and is available through Any articles from psychology journals that are full-text in Ebsco will also be full-text in this version of PsycINFO. For more information from the American Psychological Association, consult: [PsycINFO: Frequently Asked Questions](#).
 - **PsycARTICLES** (also through Ebsco) covers general psychology and specialized basic, applied, clinical, and theoretical research in psychology. Over 25,000 full-text articles are available from 42 journals published by American Psychological Association, Canadian Psychological Association, and Hogrefe & Huber. **Coverage Dates:** 1999-
 - **Psychology & Behavioral Sciences Collection** is a database with more than 470 full-text journals (the full-text psychology journals from the Academic Search database). It covers topics in emotional and behavioral characteristics, psychiatry & psychology, mental processes, anthropology, and observational and experimental methods.
 - The **ERIC** (Educational Resources Information Center) database covers all aspects of education and educational research, includes both abstracts of published and unpublished sources on thousands of educational topics. It corresponds to the printed indexes of **RIE** (Resources in Education) and **CIE** (Current Index to Journals in

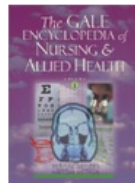

Reference books

Why use books, when there are websites and journal articles available to you? For one thing, a book-length work on a topic of interest to you will probably go into more depth than you anticipate, and will show you how your specific topic is related to its discipline -- or disciplines, in some cases. For topics that are cross disciplinary, look for books with call numbers in the R classification (Health care, broadly), or the RT classification (Nursing, specifically).

Reference books can be great starting places for papers or projects. They provide background information that you can build on to develop a research topic. They can also help you understand how nursing, as a discipline, defines certain concepts. The following are selected examples of reference books that you can find in our catalog, GIL:

Beginning the literature review

Once you have selected a topic, how do you begin searching for materials to support it? One way is to search by whatever words you know. Another way is to use the words that database developers use to describe the contents of journal articles and other publications. These "subject headings" are sometimes called DESCRIPTORS in the research databases.

1. Write down your topic and select important keywords to search for. Include synonyms for each keyword.
2. Select the best database to begin your search in. Be prepared to use more

- Explicit instructions help them learn the mechanics of information retrieval.

broaden your search. In ProQuest, once you're in ABI Inform, look for the 'change' link at the top of the page to choose more databases. In EBSCO, look for the blue 'choose databases' link above the search boxes. In H.W. Wilson, open Business Full-text, then expand the database selection area.

If you want to use an article from your textbook, use the GALILEO find cited article feature under Journals A to Z <http://www.galileo.usg.edu/scholar/aug/journals/> to see if Reese Library has access to the electronic format. If not, check the Library catalog <http://gil.aug.edu> to look for a paper copy.

Examples for a few topics, from both GALILEO and GIL. GIL is the library catalog where you look for books on your topic. Look at the Finding Books tab on this guide to get tips for searching the catalog.

Company diversity/pluralism. In ABI Inform, try workplace diversity, advantages as a subject, and use the scholarly article limit. Then try workplace diversity, disadvantages.

GIL: Use exact subject Diversity in the workplace

Needed communication skills. In Wilson Business Full-text try business communication as a subject, and recessions or financial crisis as a subject. Then try searching one as a subject, and one as smart-text searching, and then switch them

GIL: Use exact subject Business communication

Historical changes in management or leadership styles: in Business Source Complete, try management styles or leadership styles or authoritarianism in any field, and history or social change as a subject.

GIL: Use exact search Management Employee participation, or Organizational Change, or Management by Objectives.

To find an electronic journal in our collection, enter the name of the journal in the Search for Periodical Titles box located below and click search. You have options to limit the search type by **Contains, Begins With, or Exact Match**. If we have a title in our collection, you will be presented with a list of different ways to access the journal, including the coverage dates.

Recommended journals for your paper are listed here. Those that are accessed through Academic Search Complete, Research Library and Wilson Omnifile databases are relatively simple to search. For the others, detailed instructions are provided below.

Police Practice and Research—indexed in Academic Search Complete

Crime and Delinquency—Sage; access through Electronic Journals by Title list

Policing—indexed in ProQuest Research Library

Policing: A Journal of Policy and Practice—Oxford University Press; access through Electronic Journals by Title list

Crime and Justice—indexed in LexisNexis Academic

Criminal Justice Review— indexed in Wilson Omnifile

International Journal of Police Science & Management—Academic Search Complete

For *Crime and Delinquency*, click on the Sage link which will take you to the publisher's site. Click in the 'search this journal' box and add your keywords, or use the advanced journal search to target different fields to search in. When you find an article, you may print, save or use the 'email article to a colleague' feature to email the article.

The Borinqueneers (2007)

Their toughest fight was not on the battlefield.

The Borinqueneers chronicles the never-before told story of the Puerto Rican 65th Infantry Regiment, the only all-Hispanic unit in U.S. Army history. Through compelling interviews and rare archival footage, this film explores the unique experience of the 65th, culminating in the Korean War and the dramatic events that would threaten its very existence. Bound by a strong cultural identity, the men of the 65th were determined to prove their mettle, in spite of discrimination within the Army and curtailed rights in their own land, where to this day they can be drafted but cannot vote in U.S. elections. But in the fall of 1952, the 65th would face its toughest challenge when dozens of its soldiers abandoned their positions and were tried in one of the largest courts martial of the war.

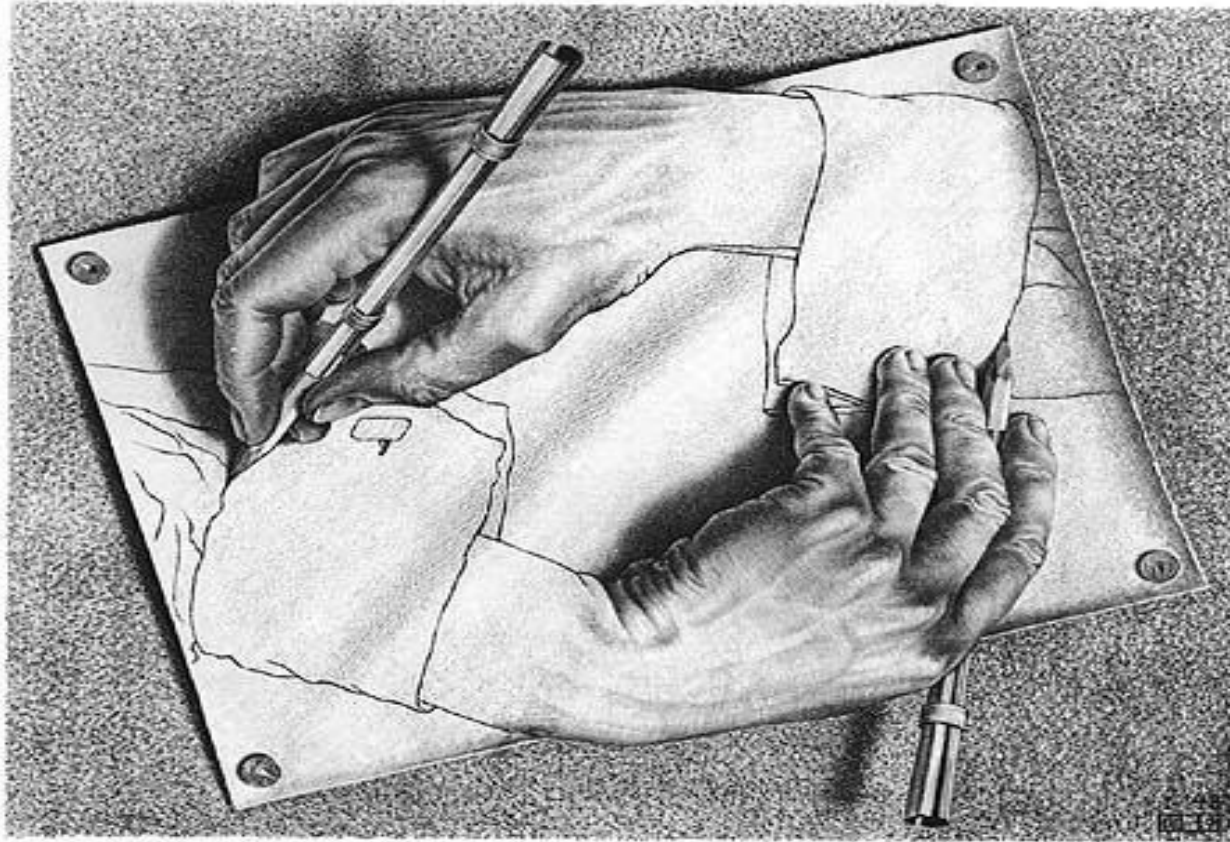

Flight 11 and Flight 174 took off at 7:59 and 8:14 AM, respectively.

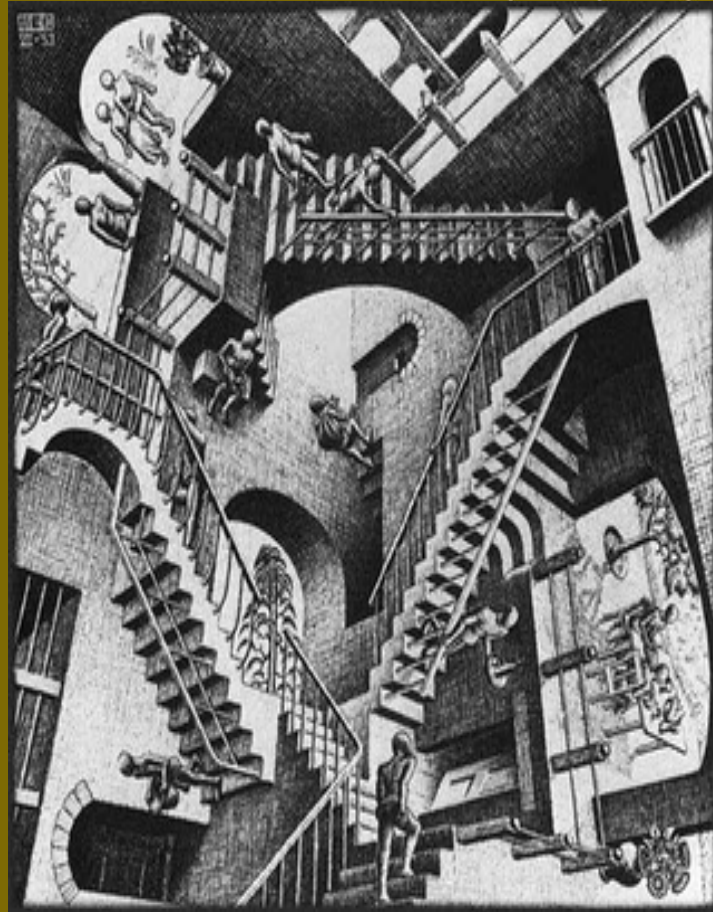
American Airlines Flight 77 took off from Washington's Dulles Airport at 8:20 AM.
