- 5. Develop a public health law research database and collect and organize peer reviewed and legal articles pertaining to a public health law topic.
- 6. Demonstrate ability to measure statutory law and regulations for empirical research.

- 7. Describe how case law can be coded for a public health law evaluation.
- 8. Provide a descriptive overview of the future of public health law research.

Course Requirements:

- **Course Delivery Platform**: This course will be delivered via face-to-face meetings and as needed via guided research.
- **Readings & Assignments**: Reading assignments specific to the research topic will be provided.
- **Examinations**. There are no exams for this course.
- Research Project: A research project pertaining to a public health law topic will be required. The project will involve the following: (1) researching a specific public health law topic applicable to the U.S. healthcare system; (2) compiling a current database of recent articles, government documents, and legal resources; and (3) creating an outline of the subject. Further instructions will be provided in person.
