"HAD IT LONG ENOUGH?"

There's a craze or two in almost every political campaign where some aspiring candidate launches his candidacy on the platform of "tenure of office."

With all the solemnity at his command, he cries out in the public places that his opponent "has had it long enough," and therefore ought to be put out of office.

This is the platform of the man who has little merit in his own candidacy, and less to criticize in his opponent; it is the slogan of the man who wants office himself, but who cannot present a real tangible reason why he ought to have it; it is the cry of the politician who would fool the people if he could into believing that he is sincere and generous, when in reality he is selfish and insincere.

In the present campaign for local offices in Bulloch county, there is less of this campaign bosh than there has ever been in the past. Attempts to work up excitement over the issue have died in their infancy.

The average voter of Bulloch county has learned that men in office who are competent and worthy should not be discriminated against simply at the request of some other man who wants a chance at the job, unless that other man is more competent and more worthy.

Men of affairs don't conduct their business that way. The merchant or banker does not turn off his clerks at the end of each year, or two years, or four years, simply because they have had the job long enough.

He does it because they have become negligent and undervising, or because he finds a better man for the job. The business man knows that the longer his employees are with him, provided they are energetic and honest, the more they are worth to him—the better they understand his business and the more able they are to help him.

If the stranger whose abilities are untried should come and seek to supplant one of these employees on the sole ground, "he has had the job long enough," the business man would laugh at him.

There are farmers in Bulloch county who change tenants every year, perhaps. They don't do it on the ground that their old tenant has "had the job long enough." Indeed, they turn him off because he is not satisfactory. If he is satisfactory, he stays on and on, and the fellow who seeks to supplant him must offer some evidence better than the plea, "he's had it long enough."

Politicians may not realize it, but the average voter is as intelligent as the business man. He suspects a reason when some one seeks to influence his vote against a candidate seeking re-election. He lifts up the cover just a little, and sees the hidden motive—the "nigger in the wood-pile."

We make bold the assertion that there is not a single official in Bulloch county now seeking re-election who will be turned out by the voters at the primary on February 18th on the ground "he's had it long enough." Not a single one. We go further and declare that we do not believe that there is a single man in Bulloch county who will vote against one of these officials on that ground.

(Continued from page 3) paint and beautify the buildings and grounds.

The actual value of the school buildings and equipments and the grounds during the last eight years has increased to more than double the worth of the all above at the time we began our work in 1912. The people know these facts. Nearly every school is now a real home for the children. All would be had we been able to have gotten the co-operation of the citizens of the school districts. This fact is well known by all.

Here is the big false statement that Mr. Brannen is making: He says that the white teachers during last year only received sixteen thousand dollars. Here is the exact amount they did receive: \$21,883.11. In other ways attacks are being made as to our official records. My books are now and have been open to any person who is entitled to see them. Reports have been promptly made to every grand jury to which I ought to have made reports. (My books did not happen to get burned.) My record is here for inspection and is not destroyed. I invite inspection. Come and look the records over, and welcome.

My office is the only office in the county that has a real State auditor to inspect. No set of books anywhere has a more stringent and critical examination than mine. They have the stamp of the State auditor on every voucher issued. Must be right. The county should have known this, and no doubt most of our people do know this. No book in Statesboro is more critically examined than my books are.

Since the establishment of the Federal Reserve Bank in the South, we have been able to borrow money at a less rate of interest than six per cent. But even six per cent costs. We have no way out of this unless we issue scrip like Mr. Brannen used to do, and have the teacher discount the scrip and just what the public may desire to charge to cash them in.

And any report to the effect that any penny of the county funds has been squandered is absolutely premeditated and maliciously false. Any person who will do this for a moment and will think will see that. Mr. Brannen's pedigree, however interesting to him, is well known to the people of Bulloch county and needs no self-praise elaboration. Civilization should have advanced by this late day to the extent that where a man is seeking office he should do it on merit and not through a medium of mud-sling and scandalous insinuations.

The teachers, the patrons and the children of this county know that I have worked with them and for them in the hope of making Bulloch's schools as good as they should be. They have co-operated with me and my record stands purely on its merits. And many of our people will appreciate these facts.

Mr. Brannen was not willing to be governed by the votes of the people in 1910. I had to be twice elected to this office before I was permitted to hold. Mr. Brannen claimed that he was entitled to hold the office after I had received 2106 votes against his 399. You all know we had to have this matter settled in the courts. Now he seems to want the people to put him back into harness after having said by his actions and words that the people should not be permitted to decide who should be superintended.

20,000 MILLIONAIRES IN THE UNITED STATES

Washington, Jan. 31.—Twenty thousand persons in the United States are now rated as millionaires, the new income tax reports show. More than 12,000 new millionaires were created in this country during the four years of the European war.

The internal revenue bureau is receiving these reports from all parts of the country as a result of the filing of returns for the last three months period which ended last Monday.

The millionaire class, according to government standards, includes all persons whose incomes for the calendar year are at least \$50,000 or 5 per cent of \$1,000,000. This, of course, includes some high salaried executives whose private fortunes do not total \$1,000,000.

On the other hand this millionaire class includes many persons whose incomes are well over \$1,000,000 a year. Thus, for the last full year for which reports were available today, sixty-seven persons paid taxes on incomes ranging from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000 a year. The average tax paid by three persons for the year was \$249,848.

It is a short memory that cannot recall the sugar investigation in the Senate a year ago last winter, when the Speckles interests exposed the American Sugar Refining company, and accused the latter with having juggled the allocation of sugar under the Food Administration, and manipulated the American market. According to Mr. Speckles their trust succeeded in shutting out their competitors, including, of course, Mr. Speckles—the man who hollered.

At that time Mr. Speckles insisted that if the Cuban market had been left open to free competition that the law of supply and demand would have made sugar plentiful and cheap, whereas under the system of government purchase there was nothing but confusion in the midst of which the sugar trust manipulated the situation.

The Speckles doctrine was carried out this year when the President kept "hands off" and let the Cuban sugar supply find its natural outlet. Mr. Speckles has now protested against the condition which finds his

refineries and the American Sugar Refining, and the whole balance of the crowd, pinching out sugar to the dealers, who in their turn are operating according to the old Vanderbilt philosophy that "the people who phoned"—at something like 20 cents per pound.

Mr. McCann and George Zabriskie, chairman of the Sugar Equalization Board, are both hot in the collar because the government did not purchase the Cuban crop, and they lay the present high prices to that fact and to the manipulations of the Louisiana producers. Possibly they are right in the adoption of these long-distance explanations. And then, again, possibly the dividend sheets of the sugar trust and the "independent" Messrs Speckles, as well, will eventually record the same old tale of a successfully manipulated market and a successfully manipulated public. It would not be surprising.

High profits by middle-men for the mere handling of food products; lack of proper agencies of contact between the farmer and the ultimate consumer.

Many of the replies, said one official who had looked over them, probably are not for any real purpose, but the writers contemplate either leaving their farms or curtailing acreage under cultivation because of one or more of the three major grievances...

Commenting tonight on the replies, Assistant Postmaster General Blakelee said: "Such a condition at a time when the predominant cry is for production and still more production, cannot be met by a private means."

Before the senate committee he characterized the situation as "disturbing and portentous of disastrous consequences." This opinion was expressed by Mr. Blakelee after a member of the senate committee had remarked that the replies were "mostly from a bunch of 'hotheads'."

Excerpts from a number of letters taken at random from the more than 40,000 already on file at the postoffice department, showed the trend of thought among the farmers of this state in their replies to the State Superintendent of Education, New England, the Middle Eastern states and the Eastern agricultural section.

"The time is very near," wrote a farmer at East Chatham, N. Y., "when we farmers will have to curtail production and raise only what we need for our use and let the other fellows look out for themselves. Labor unions are more to blame for the high prices than any one else. People are trying to get pay for what they don't earn."

Writing from Palmyra, Mo., another farmer said: "I almost fear a famine. Farm help everywhere is flocking to the city, lured by short hours, high wages and the promise of a good time. Some of them are going to stay in the city and some are coming back here in a very short time."

Declaring that the whole onus of the high cost of living rests with the middle man, another Missouri farmer advocated the establishment of municipal markets to be served by the parcel post direct.

"I sell butter to the dealer for 45 cents a pound," his letter said, "and the same butter sells to the consumer for 80 cents a pound. In the distribution we lose nearly half, and we lose money on the butter at the first sale. Such conditions are causing the farmers to leave the farms by the thousands. We have reached a crisis. You may ask what we would do with the middle men. I suggest that it be arranged for them to go on the farm and help produce things. I understand that they might not relish

WIDESPREAD UNREST AMONG THE FARMERS

CONDITION IS REVEALED TO GOVERNMENT IN REPLIES TO QUESTIONNAIRE.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10.—Indications of a widespread spirit of unrest and dissatisfaction among the farmers of the country, so threatening as likely to disturb the existing economic structure, is considered by government officials to be revealed by more than 40,000 replies to a questionnaire recently sent out by the postoffice department.

The replies as thus far digested were summarized in a report prepared by George L. Wood, superintendent of the postoffice department, and sent to the senate postoffice committee today by James I. Blakelee, fourth assistant postmaster general.

The views of the 40,000 or more farmers were obtained by the broadcasting of 200,000 copies of a questionnaire throughout the agricultural states, asking for suggestions whereby the postoffice department might aid in cutting down the cost of living.

Answers to the questionnaires have been coming in since the middle of December at the rate of a thousand a day and are being examined by officials show the major complaints of the farmers in numerical order to be: Inability to obtain labor to work the farms, hired help and the farmers' children having been lured to the city by higher wages and easier living.

The association of German regular soldiers carried out a big demonstration yesterday against acceptance of the extradition demand. Similar demonstrations were held in the provinces.

In addition to the persons of Germans on the extradition list, the allied powers demand access to their churches and possession of all German documentary evidence, so that prosecution may be facilitated. The covering note is understood to declare that allies do not propose to grant amnesty to men not named in the list, but will request that they be apprehended on entire soil.

The entente letter was described today as "not in the nature of an ultimatum." The text of the letter, it was said, has eased the situation considerably from the German point of view.

The letter, it was learned, was signed by Great Britain, Rumania, Poland, Jugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Belgium and Italy. It asserts that the list does not include all war guilty Germans, but since they are practically impossible to apprehend are chiefly responsible for war crimes.

Germany cannot conclude necessarily that other war guilty have been granted amnesty, for the entente reserves the right to prosecute them if they are found in entente territory. Premier Millerand, of France, in a letter to Premier Bauer made public today, said France considered the act of Baron Kurt Von Lersner, former head of the German delegation in Paris, who resigned rather than transmit the list and its covering letter to Germany, as purely personal and did not hold the German government responsible.

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STATSBORO VOTERS WILL HAVE NO VOICE

LAW WILL NOT PERMIT THEM TO CAST BALLOTS FOR COUNTY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The voters of Statesboro are not to be permitted a voice in the selection of a county school superintendent at the primary election next Wednesday.

This matter has not been fixed by the county executive committee nor by the board of education, but by the law governing elections in Georgia.

When the matter was first discussed, and it was ascertained that the law had recently been changed, the county committee conceived that upon the consent of all the candidates for county school superintendent, the voters of Statesboro might have a voice.

It was, therefore, decided to arrange separate polling places according to city limits, those who live within the city will vote at one polling place and those who live outside will vote at another.

This matter was fully explained in the statement of Chairman Pigue, herewith subjoined: To the Voters of the 1209th Georgia Militia District, Bulloch County:

In order that we may settle confusion with reference to the voters of this county who are voting for county school superintendent in the Democratic primary to be held in and for said county on February 18th, I desire to make the following statement: The acts of the legislature of Georgia of 1919, page 389, section 147, says that the voters living in an independent school district do not vote in an election for county school superintendent. The city of Statesboro is the only independent school system in said county.

We will, therefore, have two voting precincts in the county house. At one polling place the voters living within the city limits of Statesboro will vote and their tickets will be of different color and will not have the name of the candidate for county school superintendent. This precinct will have the name of the candidate seeking office.

With all these contents on, and the time short in which the people are to decide, it is an absolute fact that the campaign has been the most orderly in years, being noticeably free from the usual charges and attacks, with political deals which are always attempted at the end of the contest.

And this is the condition which exists today. What may transpire before election day, is another matter. It may be that there will be attempts at election-day sensations and false reports. It will be well enough, anyhow, for the people to be on their guard. If you hear something suddenly spring calculated to injure the man you are for, look under the cover and notice who started it. Sometimes, driven to desperation, a faction will start sensational reports on themselves for the sole purpose of laying it on the other side. Watch this feature, too.

And then watch the next issue of the Times for a full report of the election.

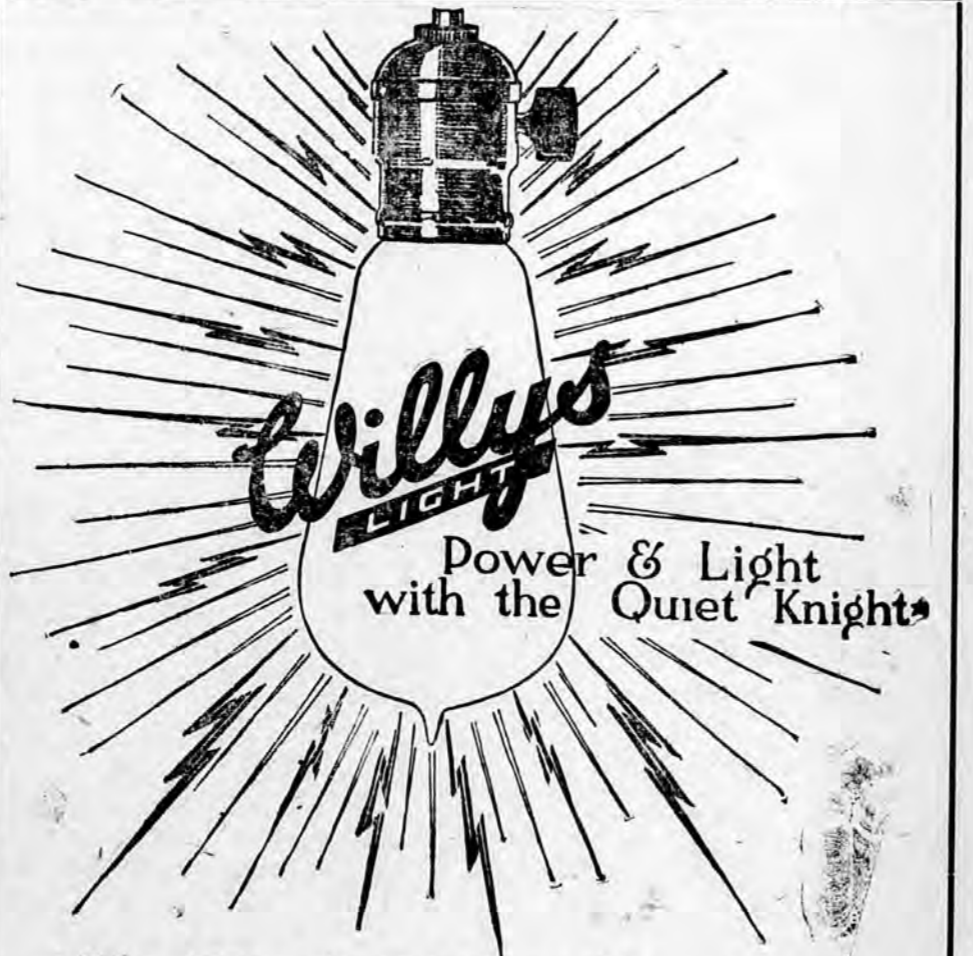

TRAFFIC REGULATIONS NOT WELL OBSERVED
