GEORGIA TO HAVE MANY NEW HOMES

Research Consultant Says There Will be 115,000 Built In State In Five Years

Georgia will house its homeless at the rate of 115,000 new homes during the next five years, in the judgment of an Atlanta economic research consultant who has just completed an exhaustive study of the current demand for housing.

In a survey conducted for Rich's Inc., Joseph K. Heyman predicts a bright outlook for Georgia building, despite rising costs and shortages in both labor and materials. His study was undertaken in connection with the nation-wide architectural contest under the joint sponsorship of Rich's and Pencil Point-Progressive Magazine, to select the ideal small home design for Georgia. A jury of seven distinguished architects will meet in Augusta on February 15 to choose the winners.

This small house design contest has been limited to houses suitable for families with an average annual income of \$3,000. That priced home, according to Mr. Heyman's investigation, will be in greatest demand with 2,500 of the proposed new units to cost an average of \$3,750, and the balance, 32,500 far less, to cost an average of \$2,000.

The housing report, which took into consideration such factors as population trends, within-state migration, consumer purchasing power and the post-war accumulation of housing deficits during the war period, was based on data accumulated by housing authorities and real estate leaders. It disclosed that, contrary to popular opinion, Georgia's population appears likely to increase during the 1940 decade by 300,000, or approximately ten per cent.

GOVERNOR SIGNS IMPORTANT BILLS

Many Measures Enacted Have Become Operative With His Signature

The Governor of Georgia last week had a busy period of bill-signing and among the most important were the following measures:

To authorize hypothecation of Western & Atlantic Railroad rentals for 19 years to guarantee payment of \$12,500,000 in revenue certificates to be issued by the Georgia Port Authority for development of state ports at Brunswick and Savannah.

To authorize issuance of seven million dollars worth of revenue certificates by the Milledgeville State Hospital Authority for new buildings at the institution.

To permit the State Highway Patrol to increase number of its patrolmen and augment their salaries and allowances.

To allow superior court judges to sign a divorce decree without trial by jury at a hearing within not more than twenty days after a petition is filed, and to grant a second and final decree thirty days after the first one is issued. A jury trial must be held if either party requests it.

To reduce five or six cents per gallon tax on gasoline used for farming purposes.

To authorize the city of Columbus to acquire through condemnation proceedings properties of the Georgia Power Company in that city.

To allot \$200,000 for a national shrine at Warm Springs as a memorial to the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

To appropriate \$500,000 for construction of National Guard armories. To this bill, the Governor added: "This appropriation to be made when and if the federal government matches the state funds, and when and if there is a surplus in the state treasury."

To authorize expenditure of \$9,100,000 for expansion of state services.

To provide a twelfth month's pay for school teachers.

CARD FROM MR. HODGES To the Voters of Bulloch County: As a candidate for another two-year term for chairman of the board of commissioners of roads and revenues of Bulloch county, I wish to thank you for your support during the past year of serving you. At all times I have co-operated with the school and all other departments of the county government, and city administration. It has been my desire to give you the best service possible working with the other two county commissioners.

Five years ago our board began plans for a number of county improvements, such as road paving, bridge and road construction, improvement of the Bulloch County Hospital, remodeling the court house and jail, the building of a new prison camp, etc.

Then, as you know, came Pearl Harbor, and in order that we might put every effort into the winning of the war we gave up the best road equipment we had to further the war work at the government's request, and our work was limited to only a small part of peacetime activities. Since the war closed, the county has been able to purchase new equipment for road work and is completing a new prisoner camp for housing its prisoners. Plans are practically complete for more than doubling the capacity of the county hospital. Our health department is getting back on before-the-war basis and, joining the Federal Government and other local units of government, we have just begun a county-wide program of Drills fever and malaria control, spraying all homes in the county this year with DDT. The State Highway Department has just informed us of the re-opening of all Burdett's Ferry road contracts from Statesboro to Sylvania, and an early letting of ten miles of paving from the Teachers College to Denmark on State Route 67 to Pembroke. Surveys and plans for post roads in the county are nearing completion and we expect soon to see contracts let for completion of grading and paving of several of these roads.

Since our work has been practically stopped during the war, I will appreciate the opportunity of serving you again for the next two years as chairman of the board of commissioners, and with my past experience, if re-elected I feel I can carry to completion the program set up by your board of commissioners.
