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136 PERISH WHEN VESSEL BURNS AT SEA RESCUE SHIPS HELPLESS ON ACCOUNT OF HIGH SEA

Liverpool, Oct. 11.—The steamship Voltorno, of the Uranium line, has been burned at sea with the loss of 136 lives. The final death roll may be much higher when full details are received from the ten rescue ships that dashed at full speed for the doomed vessel when the "S. O. S." was sent out by her wireless operators.

TOM WATSON TO BE TRIED OCT. 20 CHARGED WITH VIOLATION OF U. S. POSTAL LAWS

Augusta, Ga., Oct. 13.—Thomas E. Watson, editor, author and the people's party nominee for the presidency of the United States in 1904, will be tried in the United States district court in Augusta during the week beginning Oct. 20 on the charge of sending obscene matter through the mails.

The charges against Watson resulted from the publication of articles in two of his magazines denouncing the Roman Catholic church. In one of these articles he referred to the church beliefs as "the most profligate of pagan religion."

The articles were published in Watson's Jeffersonian of the July, 1911 issue and in Watson's Magazine of issues April and May, 1912. Their caption was, "The Roman Catholic Hierarchy; The Deadliest Menace to Our Liberties and Our Civilization."

The editor was indicted by the federal grand jury here Nov. 29, 1913. In the indictment the alleged objectionable words were omitted. The indictment stated that they were so "obscene as to be offensive to the court, if set forth, and improper to be spread upon the records of the court."

Watson appeared as his own counsel at the preliminary hearing. In defense of the articles he claimed that they could be no more objectionable than certain passages of the Bible. If he were guilty of the charge, he claimed, it would be a violation of the postal laws, which would send a Bible through the United States mails.

Counsel for the defense and the government have agreed to begin the proceedings immediately after the opening of the federal court term, Oct. 20. This agreement, it is understood, has been approved by Judge Rufus E. Foster of the eastern district of Louisiana, who is charged to preside at the trial in the live stock exhibit area.

The following wireless message from the Carmania gave the first notice of the disaster: "Steamer Voltorno, bound from Rotterdam for Halifax and New York with 600 immigrants on board, afloat and abandoned Friday night in latitude 48.25 north longitude 34.33 west. Two hundred and thirty-six passengers missing."

The Carmania was the first liner to pick up the "S. O. S." call which the operator on the Voltorno was frantically sending out. The Carmania immediately repeated the calls to other vessels giving the position of the Voltorno.

Nine other trans-atlantic liners were in wireless range and sped toward the burning ship. The race was a thrilling one. A gale was sweeping the seas and the rescue ships had to pound their way through headwinds and raging waters.

In the rescue fleet were the following vessels: Carmania, La Touraine, Minneapolis, Kappanook, Cear, Narragansett, Devoia, Kronland, Grosser Kurfurst and Seydlitz.

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NEW TARIFF LAW

SYNOPSIS OF THE UNDERWOOD SIMMONS BILL.

FREE WOOL ON DECEMBER 1

Measure Expected to Yield Surplus the First Year—Free List Enlarged by the Senate.

WASHINGTON.—The twenty years tariff was renewed in final stage in Congress, when Chairman Underwood of the Ways and Means Committee laid before the House the report of the conference and announced that the differences between the Senate and House bills had been compressed.

It is the second low tariff measure that has been passed in more than 45 years.

The average ad valorem rate of the present bill is very much lower than that of the Wilson-Corman act.

The average rate of the present bill ranges from 10 to 20 per cent, while the estimated rate of the present bill ranges from 10 to 20 per cent.

Among the 675 amendments made in the Senate, many related merely to verbiage.

The general trend of the Senate amendments was in the direction of reduced duties.

The Senate bill when reported reduced duties 27.64 below the existing law and 4.22 per cent below the House bill as it had come to the Senate.

The result of the conference report has been a slight increase of the ad valorem rate of the House bill.

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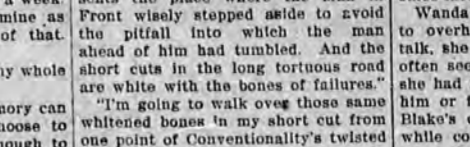

State Road Engineer.

Announcement is made that the state prison commission, which, under an act of the legislature was constituted a state road commission, has decided to appoint a state road engineer to co-operate with the various county boards in the building of good roads.

This engineer will visit the various county boards upon request of the county boards and will offer such assistance as may be practicable in the laying out of roads and in the selection of material to be used. He is to be a civil engineer and is to have had experience in the construction of roads as well.

This step is the first in the direction of what is intended to eventually lead to the state supervision of road building. Whether it is popular remains to be seen. To our mind there are strong reasons to object to the plan of state supervision. Co-operation from the state would be all right, but there is no good reason why the road building of any county should be delegated to a state board.

To these people the long highways (the boast and admiration of those who set themselves up as the original road enthusiasts) are of little value comparatively. This, though, is the sort of highway that state road supervision will lead to.

While the community roads are left begging for attention, the road building machinery of the state will be expending their money upon the long runs which the big men of the state insist are the beauty and admiration of the traveling public.

There are only a few schools without teachers for next term. If you wish to get a place in Bulloch county you had better get busy and contract. Of course there will be a number of assistant places open that will be left for the year.

The board of education decided to allow a six-months term of school for next year, provided one month be taught before the first of January. Only five months will be allowed after that date. To have five months after January 1st, they must be taught consecutively. No vacation will be allowed. Take notice, patrons, and act accordingly.

The patrons of the Pine Hill school are making quite an improvement on their new building. An assistant's room is being added and the house will be painted when the addition is completed.

The patrons of the old Mitchell school district are going to put up a building that will be up to date. The site has been purchased and the work has been begun on the house, which will be a credit to that community. That is the proper thing to do, gentlemen. Let us have good schools throughout the county.

Quite a number of the petitions that have been out for the purpose of getting signatures to call an election for school tax county wide have been turned in with many signatures. It is beginning to look like a go on the county wide tax question. It is the only way we will be able to have long term schools and good buildings.

A ROMAN SLAUGHTER. Daniel Webster's Deadly Work With the Ancient Prosecutors. Daniel Webster had accepted the office of secretary of state, but did not meet the new president in Washington until eight or ten days before the inauguration. It seems that he had prepared an inaugural address for General Harrison. One day, among other arrangements, he suggested to the new president in a delicate way as he could the fact that he had sketched an inaugural address, knowing that General Harrison would be overwhelmed with calls and business after his election and he himself having leisure to write. The general at once replied that it was not necessary, that he had prepared his own inaugural. "Oh, yes," said he; "I have got all that ready." "Will you allow me to take it home and read it tonight?" asked Mr. Webster. "Certainly," the president replied, "and please let me take yours." So they exchanged their documents, and the next morning when they met General Harrison said to Mr. Webster: "If I should read your inaugural instead of mine everybody would know that you wrote it. Now, this is the only official paper which I propose to write, for I do not intend to interfere with my secretaries, but this is a sort of acknowledgment on my part to the American people of the great honor they have conferred upon me in electing me to this high office, and, although, of course, it is not so suitable as yours, still it is mine, and I propose to let the world have it just as I have written it. I must deliver my own instead of yours." Mr. Webster was a good deal annoyed, because the message was, according to his judgment and taste, inappropriate. It entered largely into Roman history and had a good deal to say about the states of antiquity and the Roman proconsuls and various matters of that kind. When he found that the president was bent upon using his own inaugural Mr. Webster said that his desire was to modify it and to get in some things that were not there and to get out some things that were there, for as it then stood it had no more to do with the American government and people than a chapter of the Koran. General Harrison rather reluctantly consented to let him take it. Mr. Webster spent a part of the next day in modifying it. Mrs. Seaton remarked to him that day, that he looked rather fatigued and worried, but he replied that he was sorry that she had waited dinner for him. "This is of no consequence at all, Mr. Webster," she said, "but I am sorry to see you so worried and tired. I really hope nothing had happened." "You would think that something had happened," he replied, "if you knew what I have done. I have killed seventeen Roman proconsuls as dead as smelts, every one of them."—"From 'Wit and Humor of American Statesmen'.

Liberty Boy Makes Big Yield of Corn on Acre Rev. J. W. Rustin, who was a visitor to the city Tuesday from Liberty county, was a caller at the Times office, and while here reported an incident which comes within his knowledge in that county in which a young man only 14 years of age has established a record for corn production. The young farmer is the son of Lucullus Stafford, at Flemington, and by actual measurement is said to have raised on an acre this year 114 bushels and 12 quarts of corn. 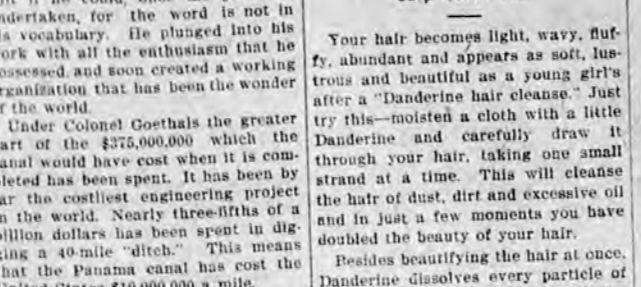

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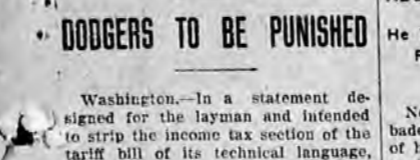
