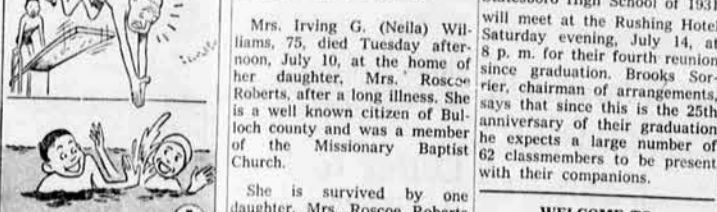

SAFETY HINTS from the Red Cross



A quick way to get hurt is to select the spot directly under the diving board for your swimming. You will be badly bruised, and so, very likely, will the diver. Next to swimming with a life preserver is the most enjoyable for all.

Corn is probably the best adapted crop in Georgia for hogging-off purposes. That's what Swine Specialist Bill Hays of the Extension Service thinks.

When you cook foods to be frozen, cool them quickly. Agricultural Extension Service nutritionists advise. Baking done by setting the uncovered pan of food on ice or in ice water.

Freeze meat pies or turnovers with pastry crusts unsealed. Nutritionists advise. Baking crusts after freezing gives them a fresher flavor and makes crusts more tender and flaky.

Time is not a substitute for fertilizer or landplaster when growing large seeded Virginia type peanuts, says J. Frank McGill, Agricultural Extension Service agronomist.

The taste of flour and meal is not changed by enriching, says John Noland, corn meal enrichment specialist at the Coastal Bermuda for hay? Extension Service Agronomist Frank McGill says it's best for this purpose when around 15 to 18 inches tall.

According to a 1955 U. S. Department of Agriculture report over 50 per cent of the total milk produced in the United States was produced in the North Central States. Only about seven per cent was produced in the South Atlantic states.

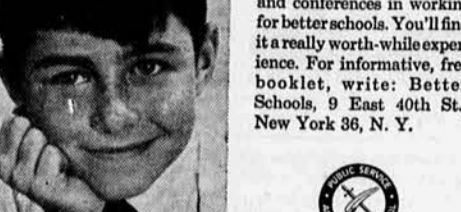
