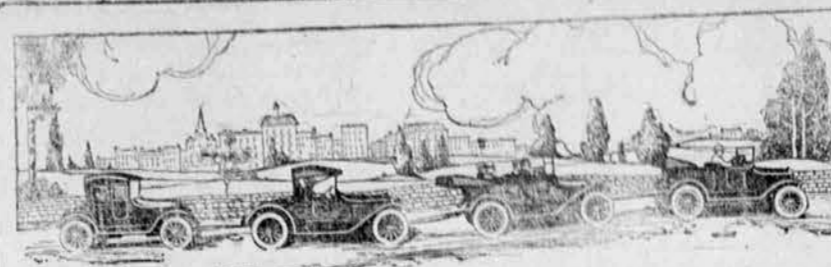

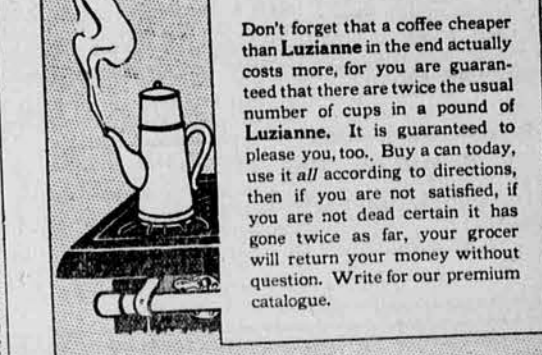

Christmas of the fruit Exchange, says the schedules will be all that the growers desire.

The transportation companies estimate the peach crop this year between 200 and 300 cars in excess of the estimate of the fruit exchange, which fixed the number at approximately 3,300 cars. Reports as to the size, quality and condition of the fruit are said to be very flattering.

Bed Rooms In Open Alleys and Court Yards

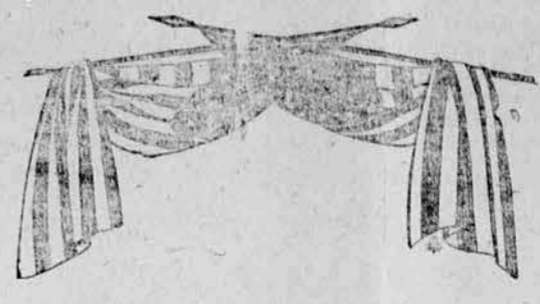

WILSON AND MARSHALL Renominated By Acclamation TO LEAD THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY

St. Louis, Mo., June 15.—Woodrow Wilson and Thomas R. Marshall were renominated by acclamation at 11:52 p. m., tonight by the Democratic national convention.

On motion of Senator Hughes of New Jersey, the rules were suspended and no ballots were taken. The delegates simply roared, "Aye," when the names of Wilson and Marshall were called, and Chairman James declared them nominated by acclamation. Senator Kern, nominating Vice President Marshall, discarded a long prepared speech and simply said: "I renominate Thomas Riley Marshall."

The renomination of both candidates were completed four minutes before midnight. Because the platform committee was not ready to report, the Democratic convention at 12:31 a. m. recessed until 11 o'clock Friday.

Washington, D. C., June 15.—President Wilson was notified at 1 o'clock to-night by Secretary Tumulty that he and Vice President Marshall had been renominated by acclamation at the St. Louis convention. His only comment was, "I am very grateful to my generous friends."

Mr. Wilson had gone to bed a few minutes before, after spending the evening with his wife and a party of officials receiving returns from the convention and waiting for the nomination.

Canning Club Rules for State Fair

Bulloch County Girls Will Compete

Every County contesting must furnish County Agents report containing summary of the years work, written upon a blank furnished by the State Agent, together with all record books and all note books of club members and an exhibit consisting of twelve jars and twelve tins. The tins should consist of six cans of tomatoes and six cans of string beans and must be donated by the clubs of the County for an insurance fund against breakage. The specimens in glass will be sold or returned as desired by the County. The County exhibit may contain any varieties of individual exhibits, or may in addition include peach pickle, strawberry preserves, yellow tomato preserves, grape jelly, baby beets and cucumber pickles. The chief consideration to be quality and selection of marketable vegetables. Counties entering for first prize must have a canning club members.

Prospective exhibitors will take the matter up with Miss Lois P. Dowdlet, or Mrs. B. S. Wood, Assistants in charge of Girls' Club, Athens, Ga.

Each club member contesting for any of these prizes must have cultivated a tenth-acre under the joint direction of the State College of Agriculture, and submit at the Georgia State Fair, a daily report book, a booklet containing history of her work, a canning club cap and apron, or a uniform dress, together with an exhibit in one of the classes named below. Only one girl from any county will be allowed to enter any class. No girl may enter for more than one prize. The exact number and kind of specimens required must be exhibited by every contestant. Each specimen must have 4H brand label on it bearing name and address of packer. Each contestant is requested to follow the receipts given in bulletin of the State College of Agriculture, when forwarded solely for the purpose of exhibition consigned to the Secretary of the Georgia State Fair, Macon, Ga., when shipments are transported wholly within the State of Georgia.
