WELCOME CLEMENT LAU, NEW ASSOCIATE DEAN OF HENDERSON LIBRARY

On April 1, 2016, the Zach S. Henderson Library welcomed Mr. Clement Chu Sing Lau as the new Associate Dean of the Library. Clement comes to us from his most recent position as Associate Librarian for Technical and Collection Services at Hong Kong Baptist University Library in Hong Kong. In this senior leadership position, Clement reported to the University Librarian and managed the library division responsible for collection development, acquisitions, cataloging, gift exchange, serials, electronic resources management, collection maintenance, technical processing, bindery and repairs, and materials budgeting. He hired, supervised, and evaluated five professional staff and twenty-seven support staff. He also oversaw library assessment and the liaison librarians program. As a member of the library's senior management team, he participated in strategic planning, and in formulating and administering library policies.

Clement played a key role in library facilities management, including the planning of a remote storage facility and the construction of a new learning commons. He served as the library's representative to the Hong Kong Joint University Librarians Advisory Committee (JULAC) Integrated Library System Working Group, and the JULAC Distributed Print Journals Project.


Before joining Hong Kong Baptist University, Clement was the Associate Director for Technical Services and Administration at the University of Baltimore Law Library. He was responsible for managing the law library budget, technical services operation and planning, collection maintenance, personnel recruitment and training, facility maintenance, and technology. He was also involved in the University and Law School's strategic planning, budgeting, and staff training efforts, as well as University System of Maryland Libraries' consortium projects. Between 2009 and 2013, he implemented several initiatives associated with the new law library's construction. They included the application of Radio Frequency Identification technology to the new library, withdrawal of library materials (over 120,000 volumes), and surplus books donations, in addition to assisting with space planning and design, collection de-selection and the overall library move.

Clement earned his Master of Library Science degree from the University of Maryland at College Park. He also holds master degrees in non-prof' it organization management, in business administration, and in management information systems, all from the University of Maryland University College. In addition to his leadership positions at Hong Kong Baptist University and the University of Baltimore Law Library, he has served in librarian positions at the University of Maryland-Baltimore County, Trinity College in Washington, D.C., and Mount Vernon College, also in Washington, D.C.

As the Associate Dean of the Library, Clement will assist the Dean in all aspects of leading the Zach S. Henderson Library. He will have particular responsibility for project management and library assessment.

About the Book:


The Awakening by Kate Chopin is a classic piece of American literature published in 1899. At the time of its publication, the book became controversial and scandalous for its mature themes especially from a woman's perspective. This resulted in the book being pulled from and debated at some libraries and schools. The novel fell into obscurity for many years until its reemergence in the 1960s and 1970s with the rise of the women's movement across the country. Through that, The Awakening and its author, Kate Chopin, are considered revolutionary and groundbreaking for its upfront discussion of marriage and sexuality.

NEW FACULTY: JESSICA GARNER

Jessica Garner is the new Interlibrary Loan Librarian and Assistant Professor at the Henderson Library. Jessica began her library career in Statesboro after earning a BA in English from Georgia Southern ('06). She worked full time at the Statesboro Regional Library while earning a MLIS from Valdosta State ('09). Jessica returns to her alma mater from the Live Oak Public Libraries system, where she worked in Hinesville and Savannah in a range of capacities, most recently as the head of Technical Services at the Bull Street library.

Jessica performed Interlibrary Loan as part of her Technical Services duties at Live Oak, whereas Interlibrary Loan is part of Access Services at the Henderson Library. Much of the work is similar, but there are some substantial differences too. The nature of the material requested varies greatly, for one thing. The other big change for Jessica is she used the World Share interlibrary loan software at Live Oak. Henderson Library uses

ILLiad software instead, but Jessica is already well on her way to mastering the intricacies of ILLiad.

Jessica is a fitness enthusiast as well as a book lover. She lives in Statesboro with her husband, Scott, and son, Atticus.





Readers of this newsletter may remember that Henderson Library has a seed library. Most of the seeds are considered "heirloom;" that is, old and somewhat rare. Our selection is designed to make sure we are not in competition with commercial seed sellers. We give the seeds out, and we ask patrons to return some if their crop is successful.

Zach's Sustainable Seeds has two types of heirloom tomatoes, one variety of watermelon, and poppies. Also, from the Campus Community Garden, we have a small quantity of tomato and watermelon seeds. Another out of the ordinary seed that we have is milkweed. The monarch butterfly must have access to milkweed to sustain their lifecycle, and is now in decline. We encourage the planting of milkweed to support the monarch population. The seeds are at the checkout desk on the second floor. Patrons will typically get one packet of seeds with planting instructions.

Long time *Friends*' member Rosemarie Stallworth-Clark got great results using some of our turnip seeds, as you can see from the photo (above) that she sent us!





