MCINTIRE, MARGUERITE Born in Washington, D.C. Resident of Brunswick Marguerite McIntire was born in Washington, D.C. of English parents, She writes:

"In 1921 was a freshman at Massachusetts State College -- Tufts College the other three years--majored in English and was a student in the theological department. In 1925 went to Norway, Maine, as assistant to the minister in the Universalist Church and a year later, on the death of the minister, took over the church, and was ordained.

"In 1927, married Glenn R. McIntire and gave up my job for that of being Mrs. McIntire. In 1932 moved to Brunswick, where Mr. McIntire is Bursar of his college-- Bowdoin. Have three children, do much of my own housework, good deal of church work, like to cook, talk, read, and play sonatas badly on the piano.
