Dear Mr. Dunnack,

I shall be pleased to send you a copy of "The Dartmouth Murders" within the next few days. May I present it to the Library without bill? It will be impossible, however, for me to send any clippings, and I am sure that the files will not care for a picture of an apartment house as proof of my birthplace, so that will be omitted also. But as for autobiographical material:

I was born at 108 Spruce Street, Portland,
Maine, on November 11, 1899 (therefore forecasting the armistice). My father is George
Clifford Orr who himself was a writer, chiefly
for magazines, although he has done little in
the literary line in the past twenty years.
My grandfather was Captain Edgar A.Orr, seacaptain of the old type, most of whose ships
were built at Bath. (I am seasick at the sight
of a cance).

Educated in the Portland schools and at the Portland High School where I was active in literary and dramatic work and was editor of the school "Racquet." I was a member of the class of 1922 at Dartmouth College and went my full four years although I do not hold a Dartmouth degree. There I was head of drmatics, editor of the literary monthly "The Bema," and author of several plays and musical comedies.

Directly on leaving college I went to the Boston Evening Transcript as special feature writer, becoming there in the next three years, assistant to the literary editor, columnist, and

editorial writer. I left in September, 1925, and became publicity manager of Robert M.McBride and Company, Publishers, of New York. I was rotten at the job and left after six months to start free-lance writing, contributing to various magazines and newspapers. A year later, I joined the staff of the Do ubleday, Doran Book Shops in New York, and for some months was manager of their bookshop in Wall Street.

Since November, 1928, I have held no regular job and have been entirely a free-lance.

"The Dartmouth Murders" is my first novel. It was written, for the most part, at Ogunquit Beach, Moody, Maine, during the summer of 1928, was serialized in College Humor, and was published in Owtober, 1929.

Although I have not been a permanent resident of Maine for many years, my parents and sister still live in Portland at 108 Emery Street,
