





- Take risks



## Background


- I LOVE BOOKS!!!

## Excerpt from "When We First Met"

Selam Victoria,

I know what you mean. I also get excited when I get something new. *Netela* is something you wrap to keep you warm or as a cover when you go to church or visiting. For children, *netela* is small. It is very thin white material and it comes with colored borders. My mother fluffs, cleans and then spins the cotton into very fine thread and then takes it to a *chemanhe* who weaves it into a *netela* and adds colored borders at both ends.

## Excerpt from "When We First Met"

Then my mother twists the cotton at the end of the borders, which makes it look like it has thin white tassels. I helped pick up the colored patterns for the border of your *netela*. I hope you like it. It is almost finished. We will bring it to The NGO next week. My mother said that she hopes you like it. I told her you would because I liked it. Write as soon as you get your *sitota*. *Sitota* means gift.


