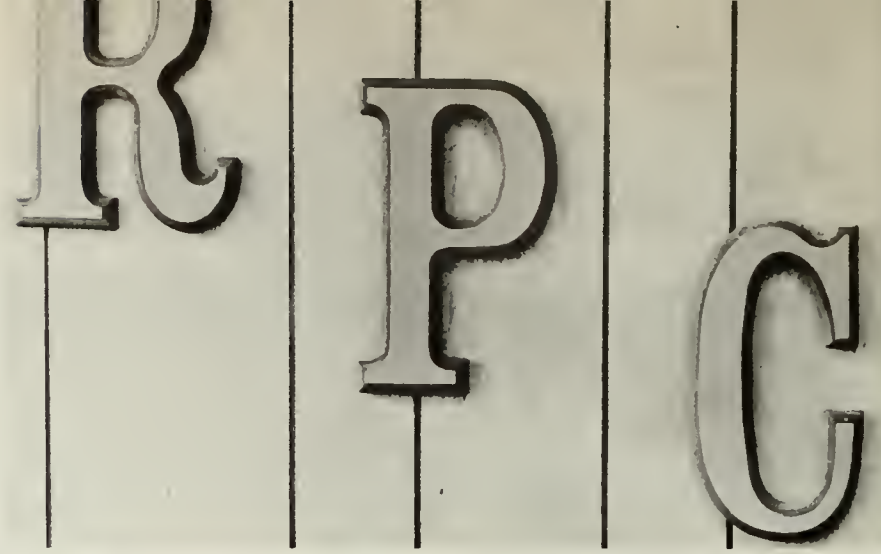




# The '78 Dedication

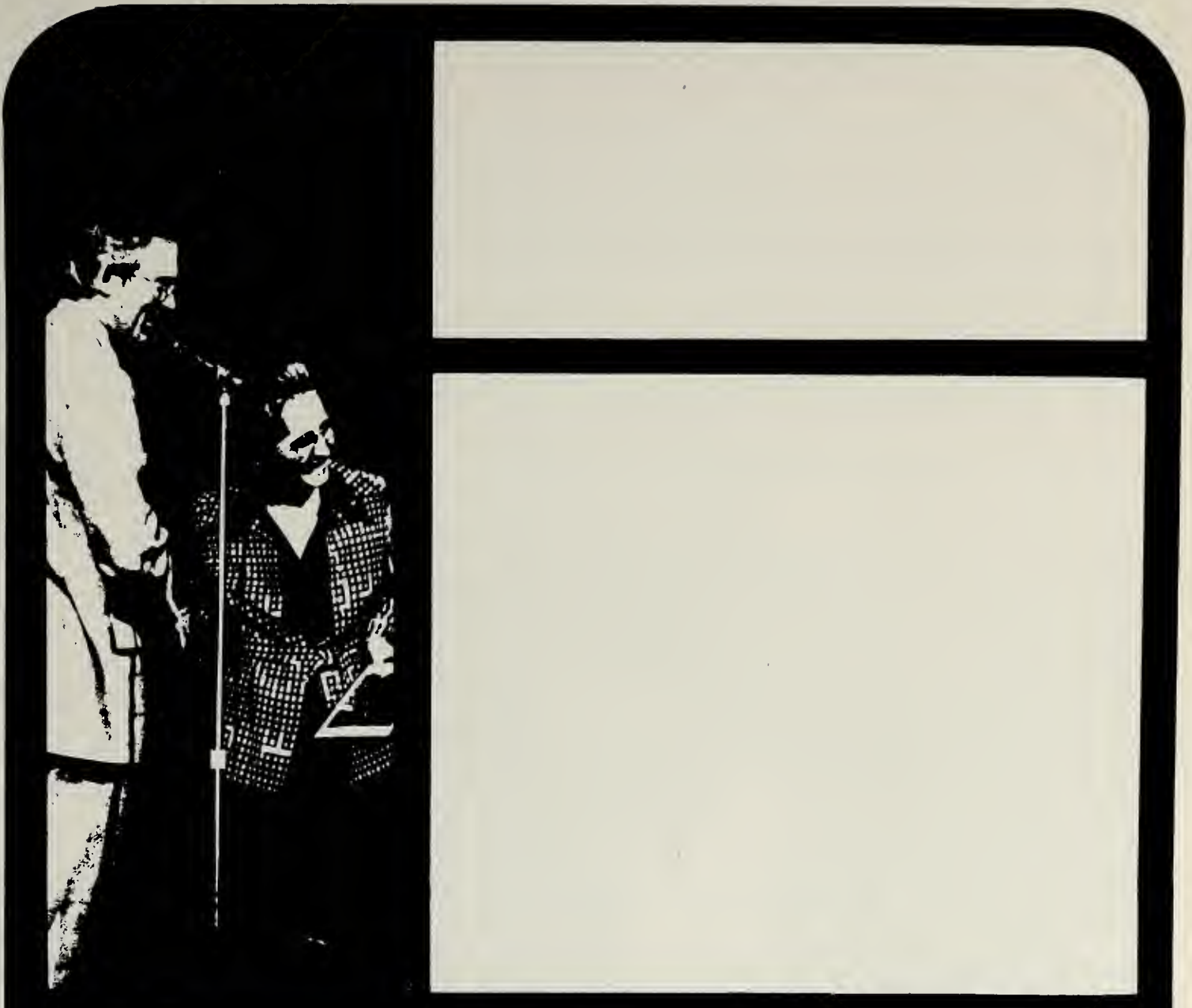
Rich Cook is an intense person. Because of his intensity and dedication to any work he undertakes, the 1977-78 Vine is being dedicated to him.

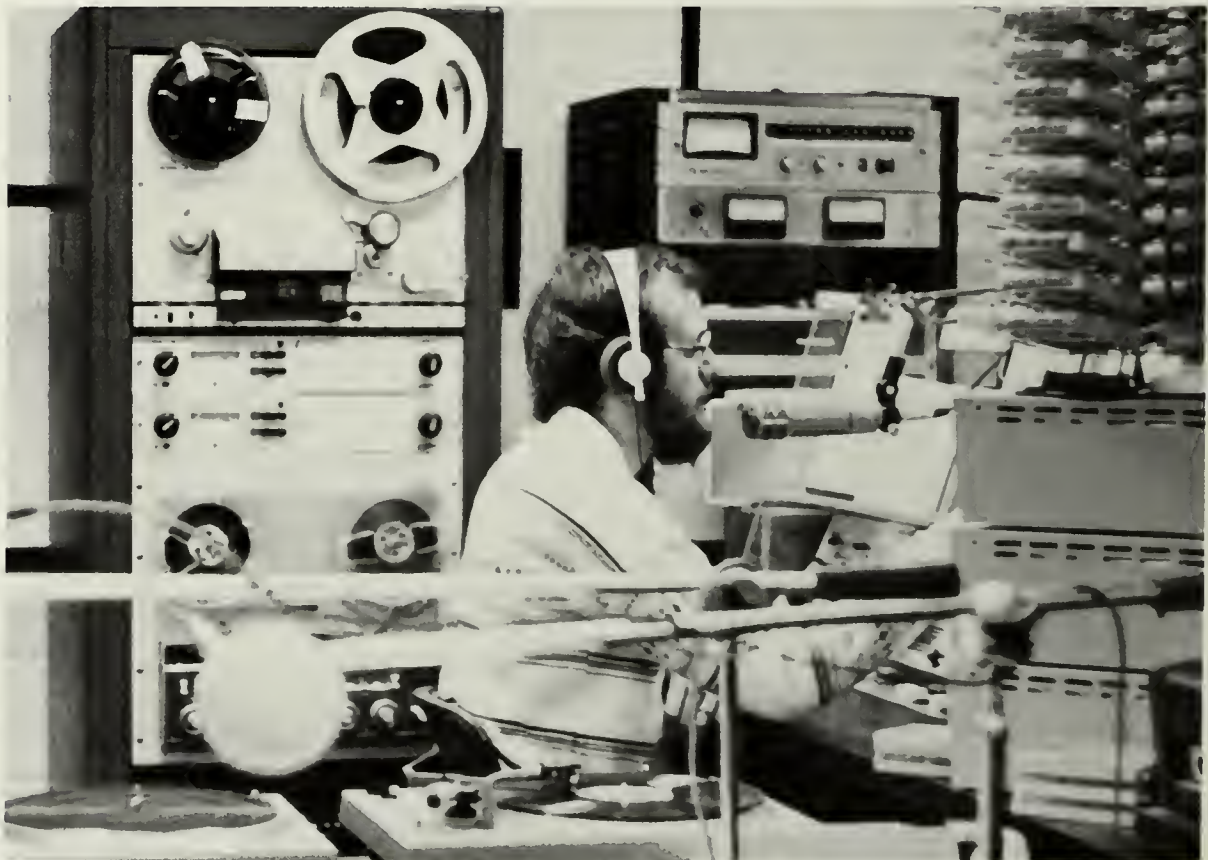

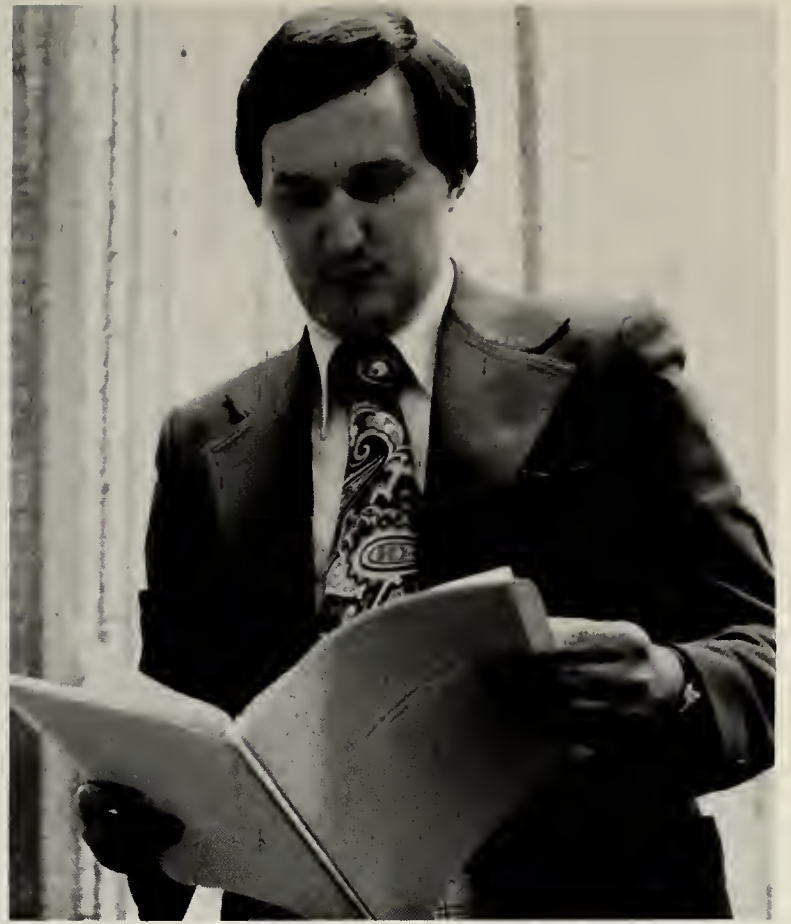

A foot and a half of water filled the transmitter building during the flood in March, but none of the equipment was damaged.

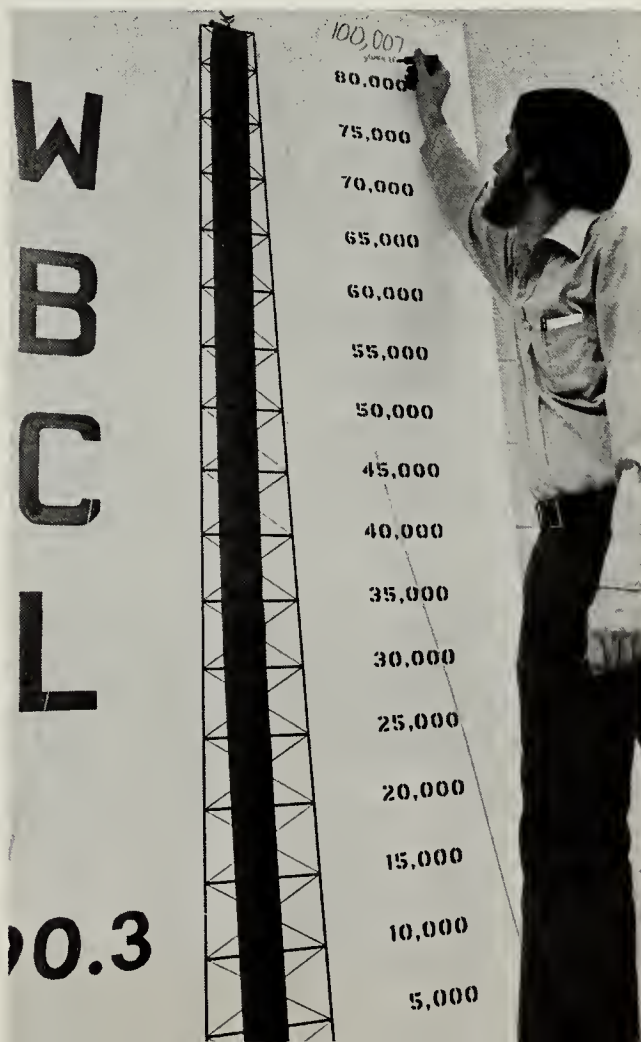

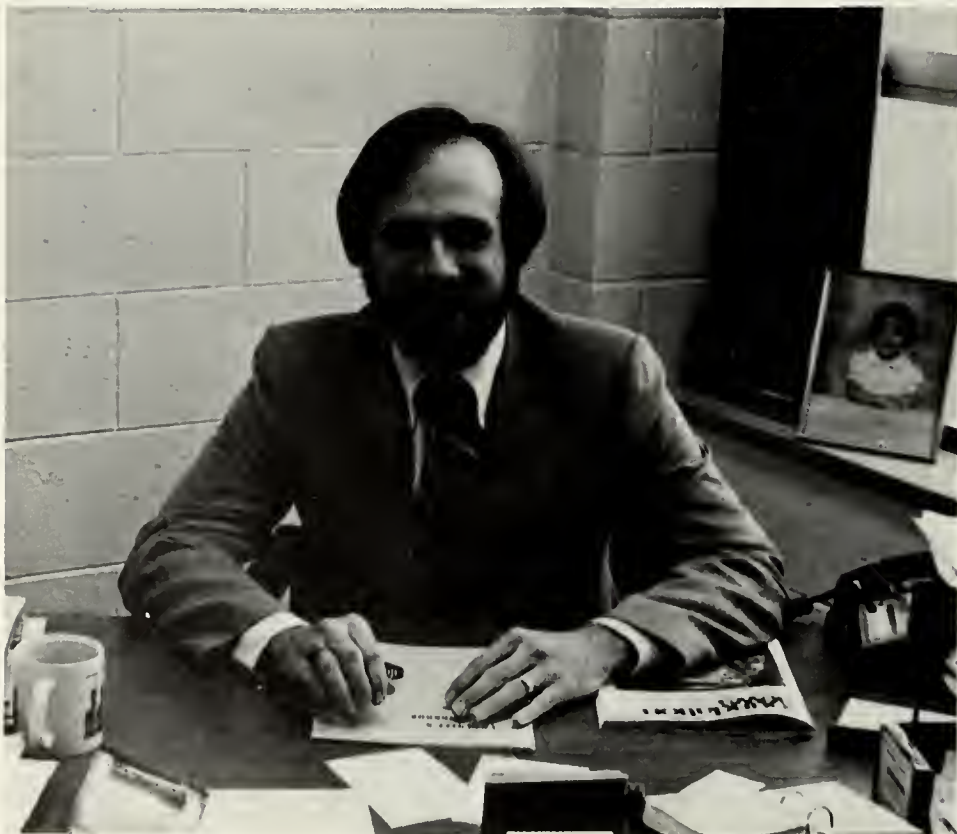

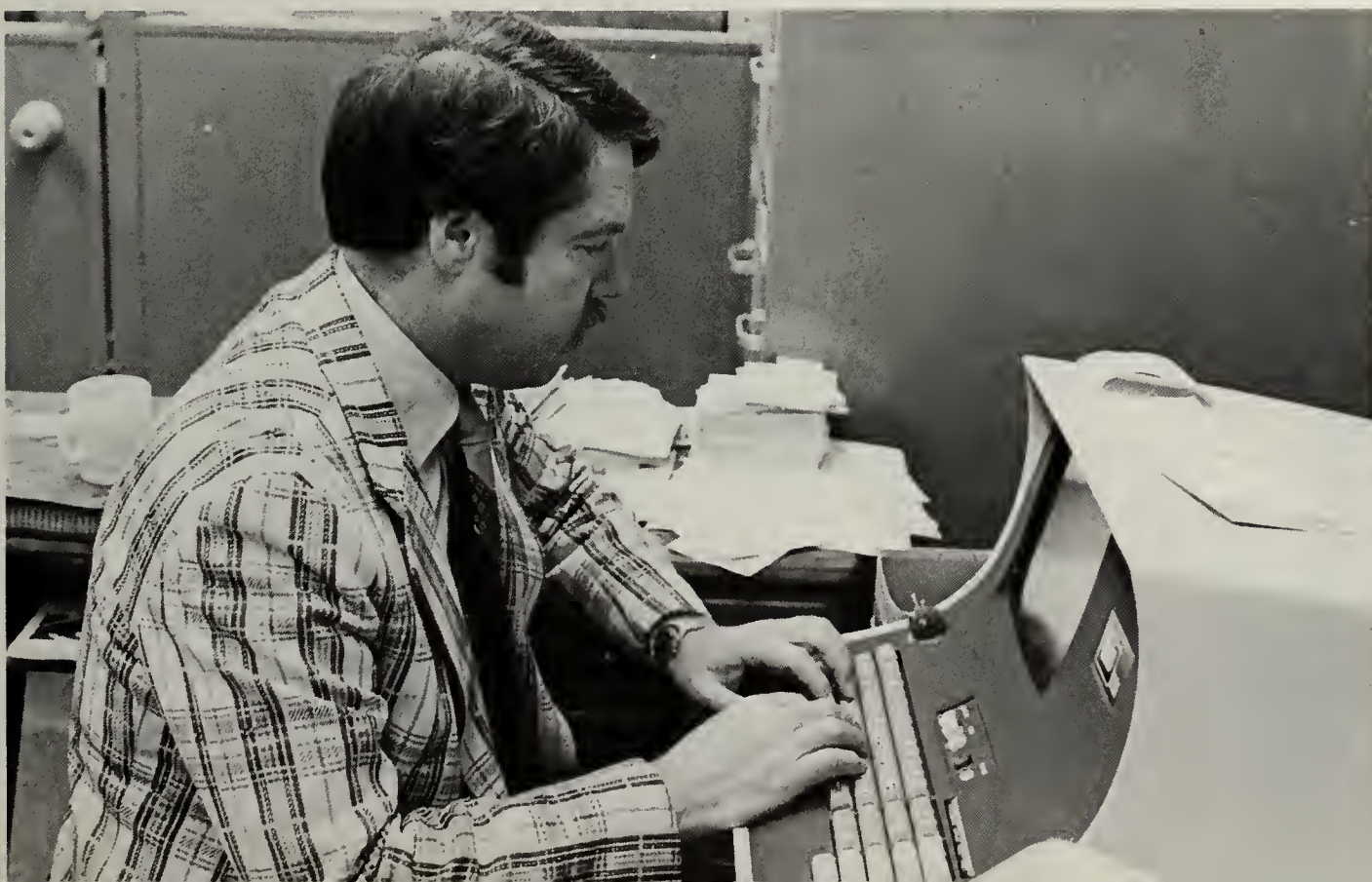

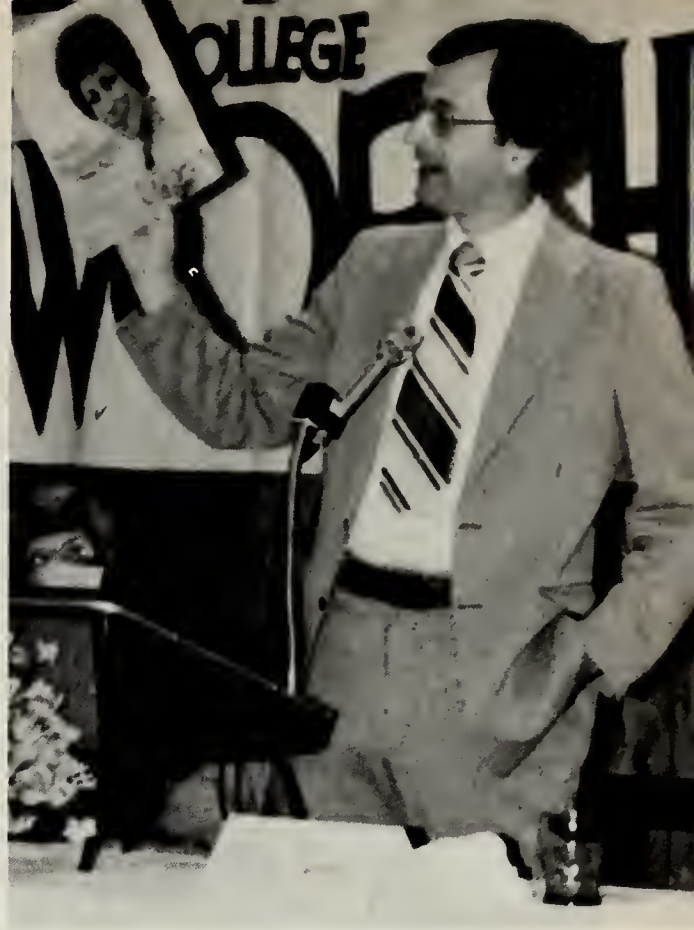

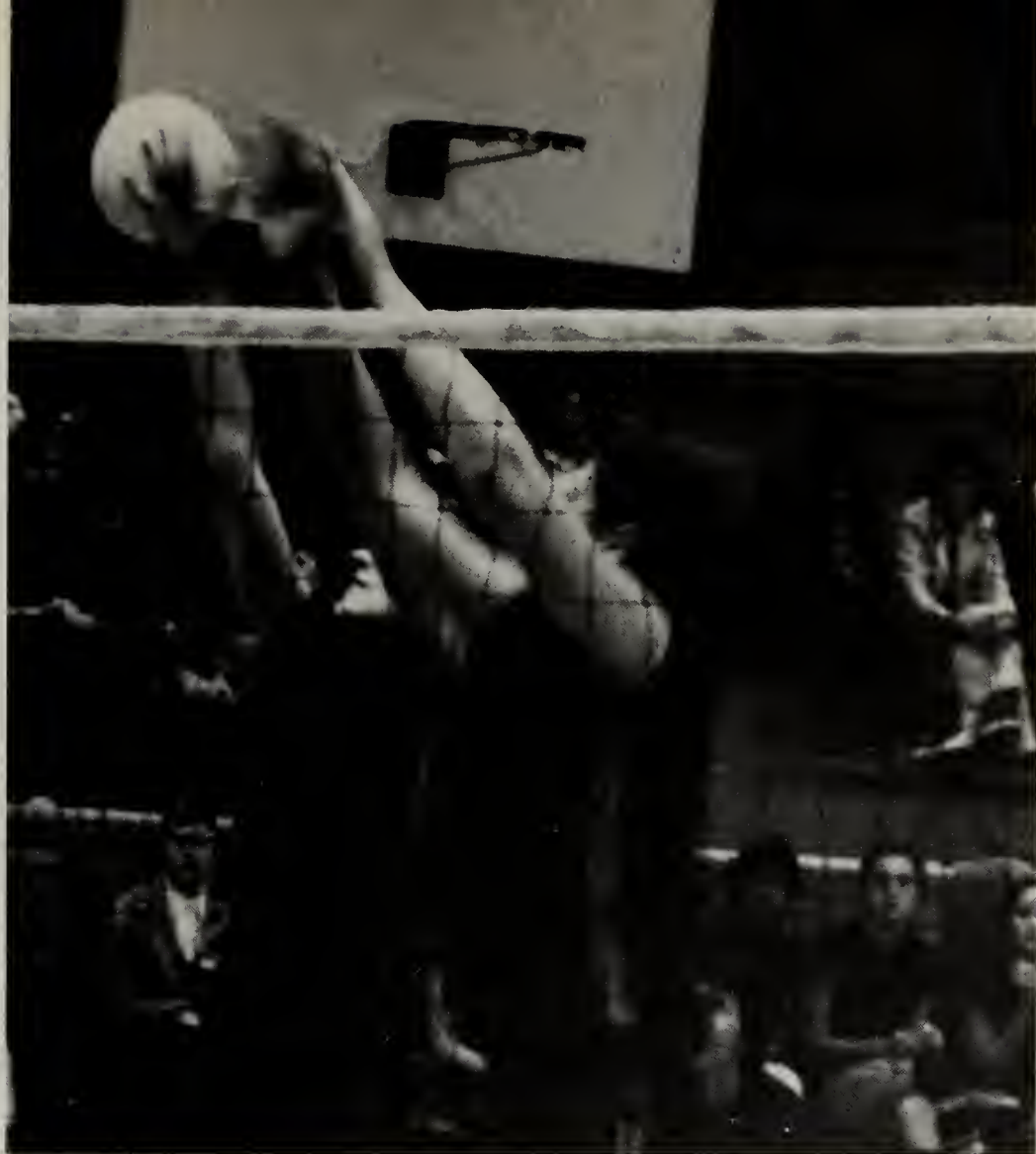

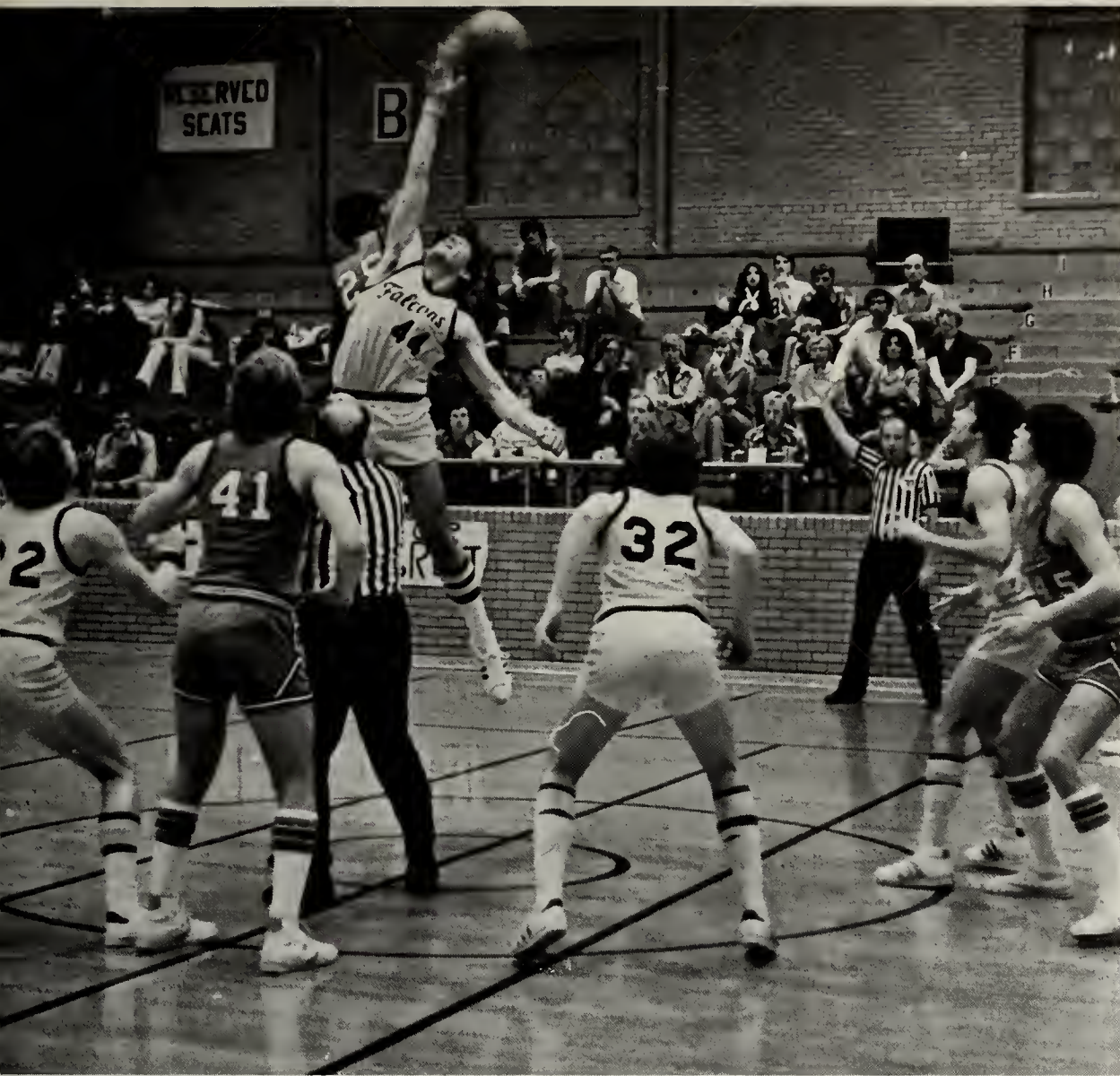

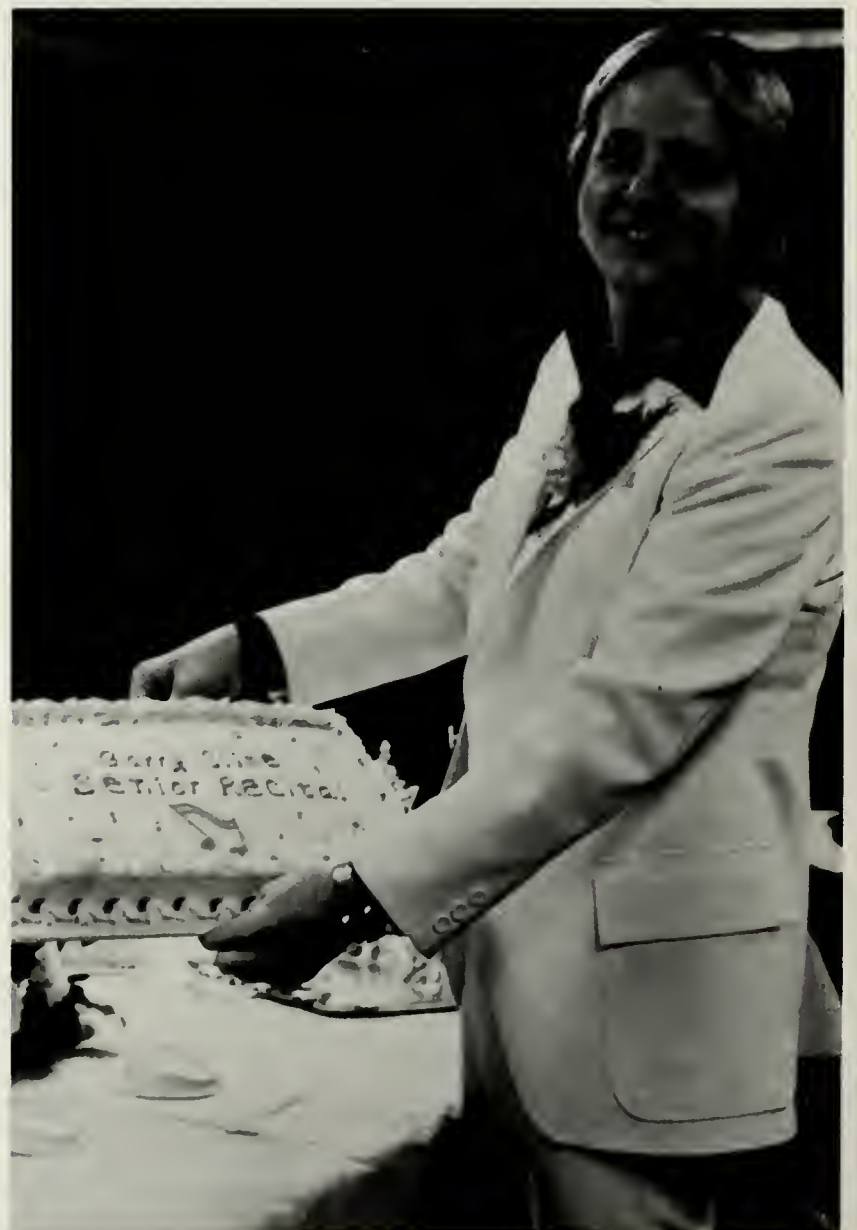

During the year this group shared much while promoting missions. They pushed for greater prayer involvement. They organized evangelistic thrusts to the center city of Fort Wayne. They sponsored

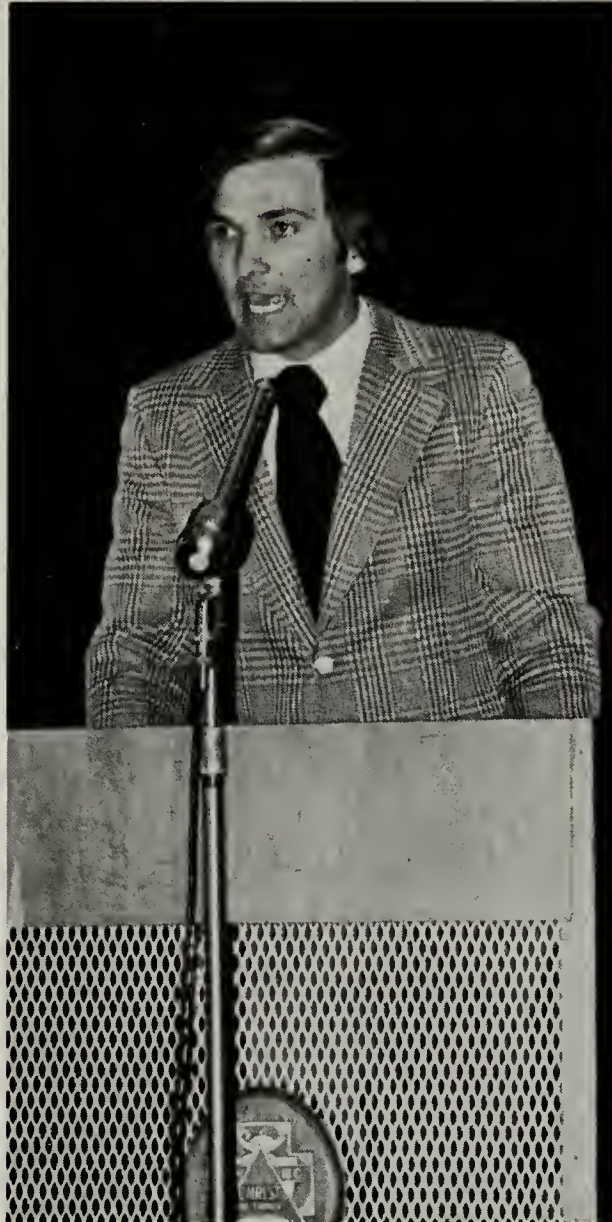

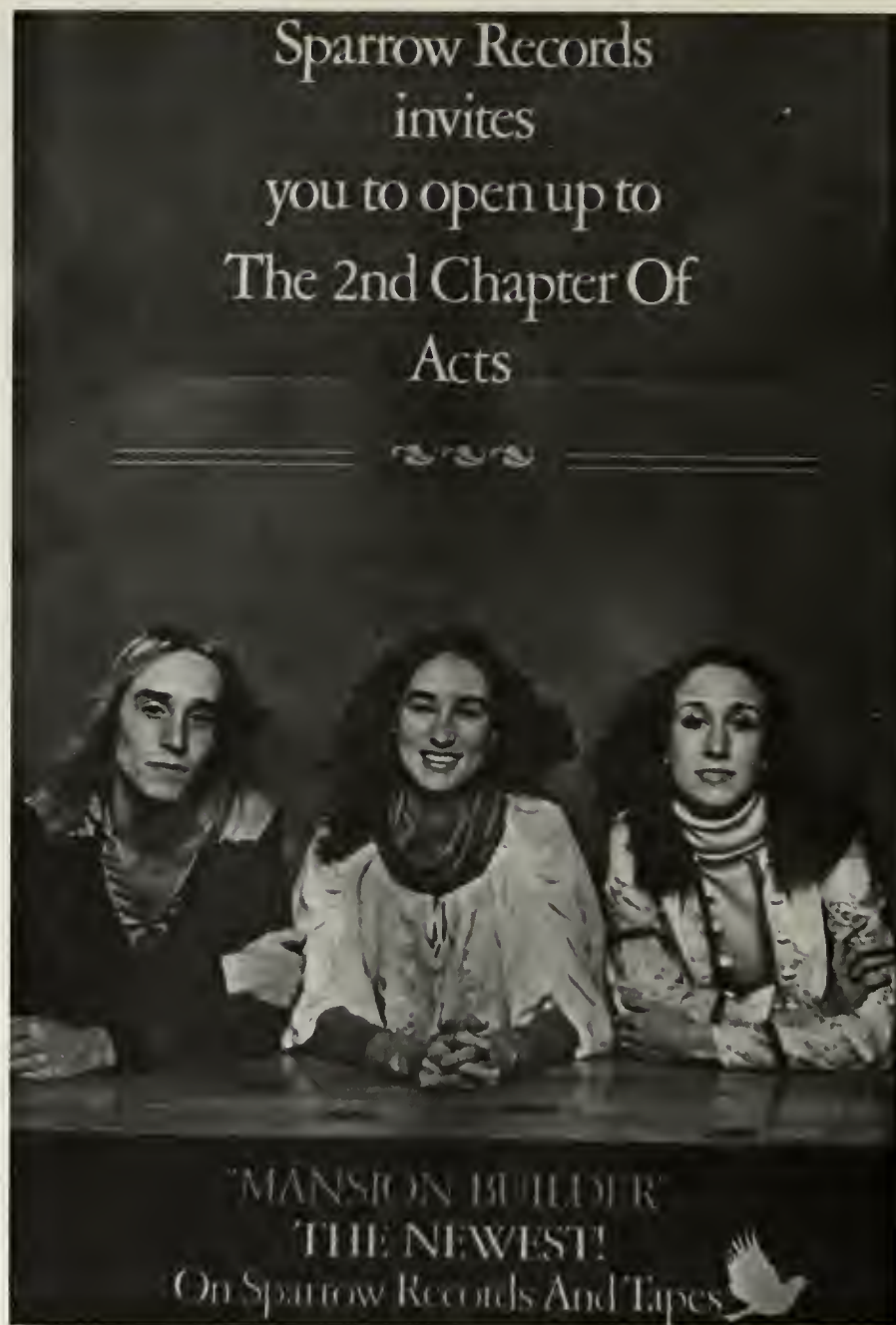

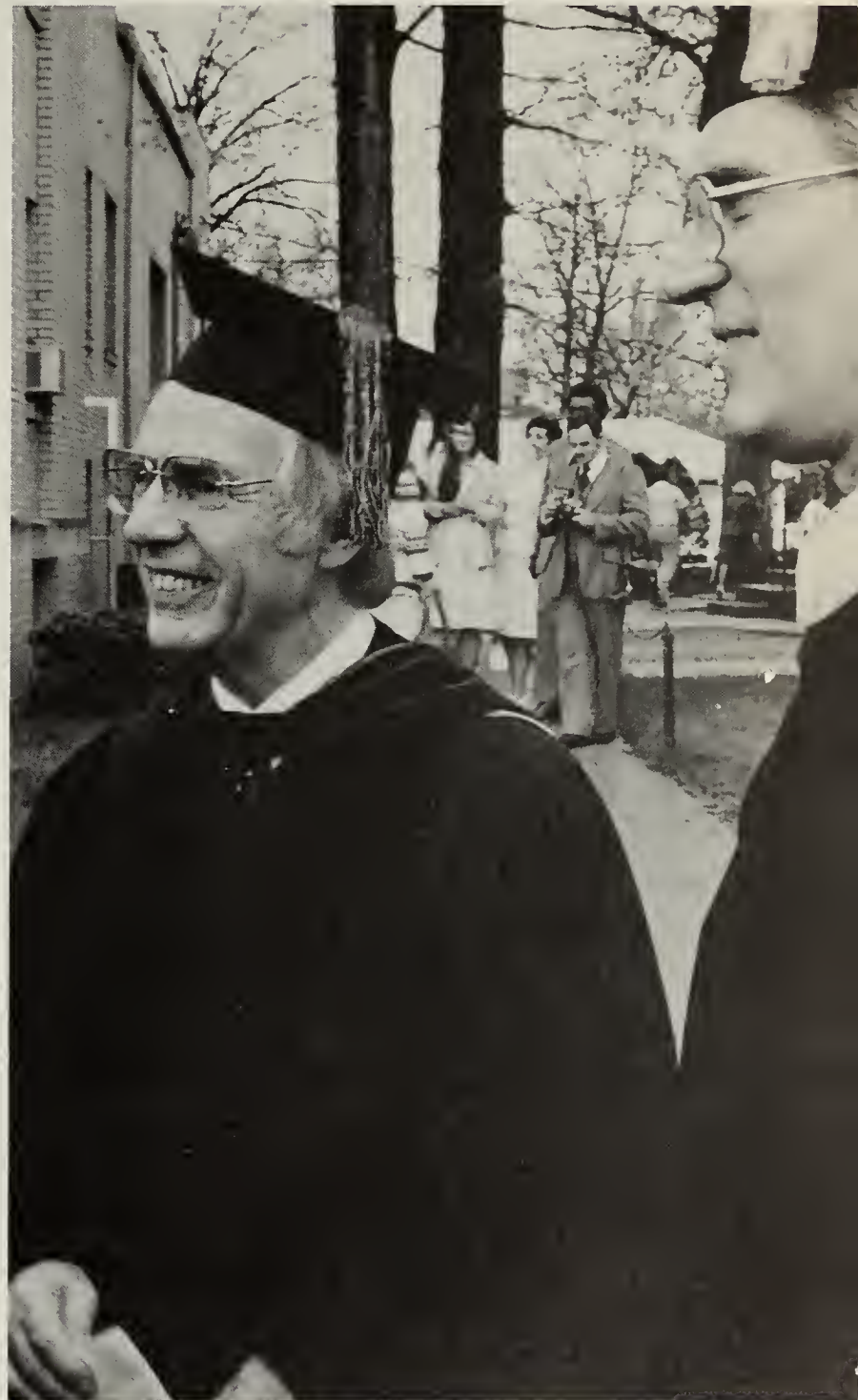

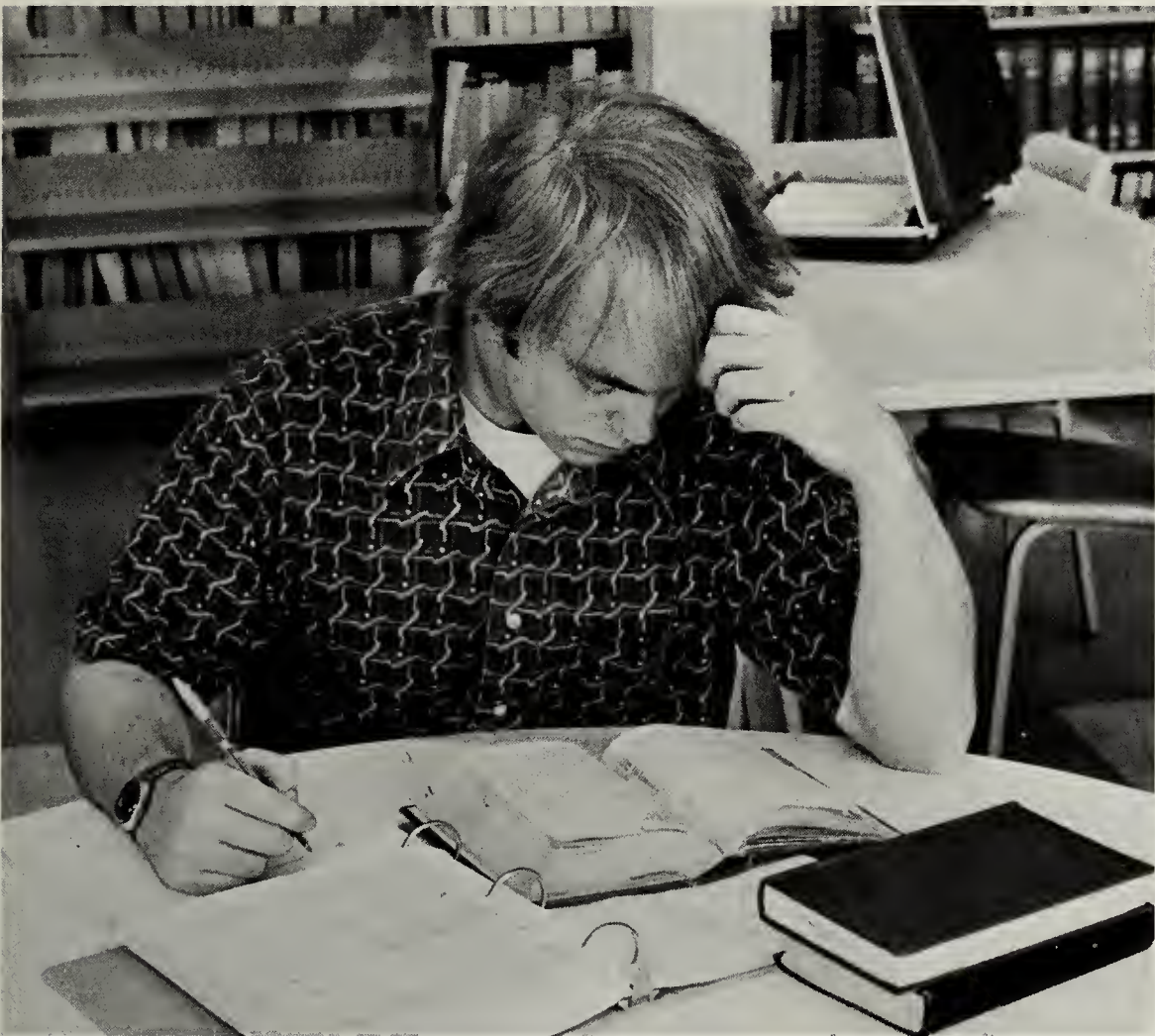
