Mr. Speck was born in Brooklyn New York November 8, 1881. He received his A.B. degree from Columbia University in 1904 and has held several positions on the faculty staff of the University of Pennsylvania, at present being Professor of Anthropology at that institution. Since 1923 he has been a lecturer in anthropology at Swarthmore College, has been on the staff of several anthropological publications and member of various technical organizations in this field. He has done extensive work on American Indian Anthropology and has written several books on Indian customs, folk lore, mythology, arts, religion, etc. At present his home is in Swarthmore, Pennsylvania.
