Damien Barlow is a Lecturer in English at La Trobe University's Albury-Wodonga Campus. His research interests include colonial Australian writing, queer theory and contemporary Australian novels, especially gay, lesbian and queer texts.

Carmen Lawrence, MHR Fremantle, entered Western Australian state politics in 1986 after training as a research psychologist and lecturing in a number of Australian universities. She served as Education Minister and Minister for Aboriginal Affairs before becoming Australia's first woman premier and treasurer in 1990. She shifted to Federal politics in 1994 and was appointed Minister for Human Services and Health and Minister assisting the Prime Minister for the Status of Women. In opposition, Dr Lawrence held various shadow portfolios. She became the first popularly elected president of the Australian Labor Party in 2004.

Andrew Lynch is Associate Professor in the School of English and Cultural Studies, University of Western Australia.

Roger Osborne is currently conducting research for AustLit: the Resource for Australian Literature at the University of Queensland. He has published a number of essays on Australian and international print culture and is the co-editor of Joseph Conrad's *Under Western Eyes* for Cambridge University Press.
