John Allens, Declaration. On the 23° of april AD. 1818 John Allen of St George in the county of Lincoln and State of Massachusetts makes the following declaration - That in the mouth of January AD 1777 he ordisted in the army of the Revolution in Capt Whites Company and Col. Tuppers Regament to serve for three years - and Shortly after onlisted for during the War or That about a year before he was discharged he was transferred to Col, Vosey Regiment - all in the massachusetts line and on the continental establishment - That he continued to serve actually and faithfully against the common enemy during the time of his enlistment and that he was how = - orably discharged at new Trindson on north River in the state of newyorks, but has lost said discharge -That he was in many of the general engagements - at the taking of General Burgoyne and the Battle of Monmouth and many Amaller engagements - that he is now 14 years old - That he has never received any pension from the United States - and that by reason of his reduced Circumstances in life Stands in need of afsistance from his country for fupportand therefore respectfully claims to bee placed on the pursion list of the United States as a private by virtue of the act of congress of march A.D. 1818 entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Maral Service of the United States in the Revolution ary War"

State of Massachusetts Country of Lincoln fs. On the 23 day of april A.S. 1818 John Allen who made the above written declaration, personally apperanced before the subscriber a Justice of the C.C.C. Pleas in the State of Massachusetts and made solemn Oath

While's Company, and Col Supper's Regiment (being one of the Regiments in the Massachusetts line, and on the Continental Establishment) in the American army, in the Har of the Revolution, from Sanuary first 1777 to December 31 1780, being four years, and enlisted for the War but our records are of no later date than 1780.
