I *Anna Woodbury* of *Danville* in the County of *Lumberland* and State of Maine, aged *Seventy three* years, do, upon oath, declare in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine, passed March 24, 1836, entitled a "Resolve additional to a Resolve, passed March seventeenth, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, entitled 'Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the deceased Officers and Soldiers,'" that I am the widow of *Samuel Woodbury* late of *Danville* in the County of *Lumberland* and state of Maine, who died at *Danville* on the *29th* day of *April* 1828

that before I was married to the said *Woodbury* I was the widow of *Joshua Bangs*, and that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe that my said husband *Joshua Bangs* did enlist into the host three years serving of the Revolutionary war as a private soldier, which term of service I believe he served out.

I do further on oath declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, *Joshua Bangs* - was at the time of his said enlistment, an inhabitant of

Hallowell in the County of *Lumberland* and state of *Maine*

and that I do know that he was at the time of his decease as aforesaid, an inhabitant of the said State of Maine, residing in *Lisbon* ^{County of Lincoln} where he had resided for

three years before his decease. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, (nor have I received since his decease,) a grant of land, or money in lieu thereof, either from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, or the State of Maine, for his said service, or any other service during the Revolutionary War, and that I am therefore justly entitled to the full benefit of said Resolve.

Anna Woodbury of *Danville* in the County of *Lumberton* and State of Maine, being the same person by whom the foregoing declaration was made, do hereby constitute and appoint *John L. Ingersoll* of *Danville* my true and lawful Attorney for me and in my name, to receive from the Land Agent of the State of Maine, such certificate as he may issue to me, in virtue of a Resolve of the said State, passed March 24, 1836, entitled 'Resolve additional to a Resolve, passed March seventeenth, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty five, entitled 'Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the deceased Officers and Soldiers,' to the benefit of which Resolve I am entitled. And my said Attorney is hereby authorized and empowered upon the receipt of said certificate for me and in my name, to receive the same, and to do all things in and to that effect, which he might, were I personally present.
