I, Lydia Barnes of Lubec in the County of Washington and State of Maine, aged ~~society three~~ years, do, upon oath, declare in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine, passed ~~March 21, 1804~~, entitled a "Resolve additional to a Resolve, passed March seventeenth, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, entitled 'Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the deceased Officers and Soldiers,'" that I am the widow of ~~Joseph~~ Barnes late of Lubec in the County of Washington and state of Maine, who died at Lubec on the twenty eighth day of May A. D. 1838. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, Joseph Barnes did enlist in the Massachusetts Line and served as a private soldier for more than three years and was placed on the pension Roll duly the eleventh 1828 at the rate of ninety six dollars per year -

I do further on oath declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, Joseph Barnes was at the time of his said enlistment, an inhabitant of Massachusetts

and that I do know that he was at the time of his decease as aforesaid, an inhabitant of the said State of Maine, residing in Lubec aforesaid, where he had resided for ~~twenty five~~ years before his decease. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, (nor have I received since his decease,) a grant of land, or money in lieu thereof, either from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, or the State of Maine, for his said service, or any other service during the Revolutionary War, and that I am therefore justly entitled to the full benefit of said Resolve.



I Joseph Barnes of Eastport in the County of Washington Commonwealth of Massachusetts, on oath do testify and declare that I enlisted into the continental Army of the United States of America as a private Soldier in the town of Harpswell in the County of Cumberland in the state aforesaid some time in the month of March in the year 1781, was marched to Boston there turned to Captain Alden's Company and marched to West point in the State of New York was there turned to Captain Luther Bailey's Company in Col. Sprouts Regiment which was the second Regiment in the Massachusetts Line, the Brigade was commanded by Brigadier General Patterson. I was enlisted for the term of three years — I continued in the army and did duty at different places, and think I discharged my duty as a soldier faithfully, the whole of the time I served — I was honorably discharged by the Commander in chief at West point some time in September in year 1783, by misfortune I have lost my discharge I am now fifty five years old am infirm and worn down by misfortune and sickness have never received pension or emolument from my country and am very poor and stand in need of assistance from my country for support.

I further testify and say, that he was in the Army two years, from the time of joining it, when the company he was in went to Philadelphia and I went with the company, I belonged to New York during the two years aforesaid, said Joseph Barnes did his duty as a faithful soldier.

I Seth Toothaker of lawful age testify and say that I have been acquainted for more than forty years past with Joseph Barnes now of Eastport, but formerly of Harpswell in the County of Cumberland. In the year of our Lord Seventeen hundred and eighty one, some time in the month of January, said Joseph Barnes enlisted into the service of the United States, in the company commanded by Luther Baylies and in the Regiment under the command of Ebenezer Sproat. As I had enlisted into the same service, I marched from Boston towards the last of March, of the year aforesaid or April, I am not certain which, in company with said Barnes and arrived at West Point and joined the main Army in May following.

I further testify and say, that Joseph Barnes aforesaid continued in the service of the United States till the Army was disbanded in the year of our Lord Seventeen hundred and eighty three, during all which time, I believe he did his duty, as I never heard any complaint against him.

Washington St. At the Circuit Court of Common Pleas for the third Eastern Circuit began and holden at Machias within and for the County of Washington on the first Tuesday of March A.D. 1821. before the Honorable William Crosby and James Campbell Judges of said Court. On this ninth day of March in the year above written, personally appeared in open Court, the same having the power of fine and imprisonment, and being a Court of Record for said County of Washington Joseph Barnes, aged fifty six years, resident in Lubec (late of Eastport) in said County, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows, viz. as a private Soldier in the company commanded by Capt. Luther Baylies in the Regiment commanded by Col. Sproat in the line of the State of Massachusetts, on the continental establishment, as is more particularly mentioned and described in his original Declaration, made on the seventh day of August A.D. 1819. And on which said declaration his Certificate of Pension was granted. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818; and that I have not since that time by gift, sale, or in manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary War," passed on the eighteenth day of March 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule heretofore annexed, and by me subscribed; that my occupation and ability to pursue the same, together with the number and other

other particulars of my family, are in fact and in truth
as is particularly described below, also subscribed by me.
