I, Mary Libby  
Cumberland and State of Maine, aged fifty-nine years, do, upon oath, declare,  
in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine, passed March 17, 1835, entitled  
a "Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the  
deceased Officers and Soldiers," that I am the widow of Thomas Libby late of  
Scarborough in the County of Cumberland and State of Maine, who died at  
Scarborough on the 27th day of March A.D. 1827.  
That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband,  
did enlist in the year 1777, in Col. Henry Jackson's  
regiment of the Massachusetts, for three years  
I faithfully served that period, & received  
an honorable discharge, I would refer  
to my declaration (No 336,) on file in the  
Land Office.

I do further on oath declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, Thomas Libby  
was at the time of his said enlistment, an inhabitant of  
Scarborough, and that I do know that he was at the time of his decease as aforesaid, an  
inhabitant of the said State of Maine, residing in Scarborough aforesaid, where he had resided for  
seventy years before his decease. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe,  
that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, (nor have I received  
since his decease,) a grant of Land, or money in lieu thereof, from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts,

of the Revolution three years, on the  
Continental Establishment, that he is yet an  
resident citizen of the United States aforesaid,  
and that by reason of your appli-  
cants reduced circumstances in life, he is  
in need of assistance from his Country for support.

And your applicant further represents,  
that in the service aforesaid, he belonged  
in his said capacity of a Sergeant to Captain  
Company of the H. Jackson's Regiment of the  
Massachusetts Line, that he entered said ser-  
vice on or about the 1st day of July one thou-  
sand seven hundred and twenty seven and  
that he left said service on or about the  
1st day of July One Thousand Seven hundred  
and eighty, was discharged at Ramapago  
by Col. Jackson which discharge I have lost.  
That he is sixty three years of age - was in the  
Battle at Monmouth and several skirmishes.  
Therefore, inasmuch as your applicant, as he  
very believes, comes under the provisions of the  
Act, entitled "An Act to provide for certain




