Margaret Sherman of Theepot in the County of Cumberland and State of Maine, aged co years, do, upon oath, declare, in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine, passed March 17, 1835, entitled a "Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the deceased Officers and Soldiers," that I am the widow of James Therman in the County of Cumbelland and State of Maine, who died at said Tresport on the about the year day of That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, James Sher did enlist in the revolutionary war in the Massachusetts line, as a private or suggestitut the Regiment I do not remember. I however believe that he served nearly the whole of the revolutionary war, making more than three years and that he was honorably discharged at the close of the war or a few months after; that he was promoted to rank of Commissay in the course of the war. I do further on oath declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, fames sherman was at the time of his said enlistment, an inhabitant of Said Therport there in the bournouwealth of Massachusetts and that I do know that he was at the time of his decease as aforesaid, an inhabitant of the said State of Maine, residing in Theefort aforesaid, where he had resided for more than fifteen years before his decease. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, (nor have I received since his decease,) a grant of Land, or money in lieu thereof, from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, for his said service, or any other service during the Revolutionary War, and that I am therefore justly entitled to the full benefit of said Resolve.
