Know all Men by these Presents that I John Pike of Paxton  
in the County of Worcester and Commonwealth of  
Massachusetts formerly a private soldier in the Army  
of the Revolution was in Capt Washburn in the  
thirteenth Massachusetts Regiment and in ~~the~~ <sup>my</sup> company  
in said <sup>first</sup> Regiment in consideration of the sum of fifty  
dollars paid me by E Ho Scribner of Portland in the  
County of Cumberland and State of Maine Esquire  
do hereby release, remise and assign to the said  
Scribner his heirs and assigns all my right, title, interest  
and estate in and unto two hundred acres of land  
to which I am entitled by virtue of a grant made to  
the soldiers of the Army of the Revolutionary war pursuant  
to Resolves of the Legislature of Massachusetts passed  
March 27th AD 1833 To have and to hold to the said  
Scribner and his heirs and assigns to his & their use forever.

And the Land Agent of said Commonwealth is  
hereby requested and authorized to make execute  
and deliver a deed of said land to said Scribner of  
his assigns

hand and seal this tenth day of July AD 1833.

I John Pike, of Paxton, in the County of Worcester, and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, aged seventy years do on oath depose and say, that I enlisted April 13, 1776, for three years, in the thirteenth Massachusetts Regiment commanded by Col Smith - and served out the whole term of three years as a private soldier, in Capt Noah Allen's company - at the expiration of the three years I received an honorable discharge - which, not having been considered of value at the time, has been lost.

On the 13th of March 1781, I again enlisted as a private soldier for three years, and entered the army in the First Massachusetts Regiment, commanded by Col Joseph Vose, in Capt John Mills company - I served out my time and received an honorable discharge, which was sent to Washington at the time I made application for a pension. A pension of Eight Dollars per month, was granted me under former acts of Congress.

I resided in Paxton, my native place, at the time of both enlistments above mentioned - and have continued to do since they expired to the present time

I am the same person named in the annexed deed to E H Scribner.
