I *Mary Walker* of *Livernore* in the County of *Oxford* and State of Maine, aged *eighty five* years, do, upon oath, declare

in order to obtain the benefit of a Resolve of the Legislature of Maine, passed March 24, 1836, entitled a "Resolve additional to a Resolve, passed March seventeenth, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, entitled 'Resolve in favor of certain Officers and Soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and the Widows of the deceased Officers and Soldiers,'" that I am the widow of *John Walker*

late of *Livernore* in the County of *Oxford* and state of Maine, who died at *Livernore* on the *Seventh* day of *May* A. D. *1809* That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe,

that my said late husband, *John Walker* did enlist as an orderly

Sergeant in *Hills* company, *Rose's Regiment & Glover's Brigade* in the Army of the United States, on or about the first day of *January* A. D. *1777* for the term of *three* years & served in said company, *Regiment & Brigade*, during the term of said enlistment, I was *equally* and honorably discharged, although said discharge is not in my possession and cannot now be found - And I do further declare that I have reason to believe and do believe that my said husband enlisted as a soldier in the *eight* month's service at or about the commencement of the revolutionary war, under *Capt. Babbok of Louisa* regiment, & served in the Army of the United States during said last mentioned term

I do further on oath declare that I have reason to believe, and do fully believe, that my said late husband, *John Walker* was at the time of his said enlistment, an inhabitant of

the town of *Hopkinton* in the Commonwealth of *Massachusetts*

and that I do know that he was at the time of his decease as aforesaid, an inhabitant of the said State of Maine, residing in *Livernore* aforesaid, where he had resided for

more than twenty years before his decease. That I have reason to believe, and do fully believe,

that neither my said late husband, nor any one claiming under him did receive, (nor have I received since his decease,) a grant of land, or money in lieu thereof, either from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, or the State of Maine, for his said service, or any other service during the Revolutionary War, and that I am therefore justly entitled to the full benefit of said Resolve.

for Certificate of Discharge

J. Pelatiah Gibbs of lawful age do testify and say that I was well acquainted with John Walker who died at Livermore about twenty years ago - His widow, Mary Walker is still living and resides in Livermore aforesaid. He first enlisted, as understood at Salisbury, Connecticut, for one year and after serving out the term of his said enlistment, returned to Hopkinton, Mass, where his Parents and wife resided. Soon after the said John Walker returned as aforesaid to Hopkinton he enlisted again into the Army of the Revolution for the term of three years. I do not recollect the names of the Captain and Colonel under whom he served - He was stationed at Boston part of the time for the said three years, also at Providence and Rhode Island - While stationed at Boston, he hired me to do duty for him a fortnight to enable him to visit his family - I resided at Mendon when the said John Walker enlisted for said three years - Knowing to the fact that the laws of Hopkinton made provision for the support of his family while he was engaged in the service of the Army agreeably to the provisions of Law. I have always understood that the said John Walker served out the term of his enlistment for said three years and that he was allowed some thing for the depreciation of Continental money.
