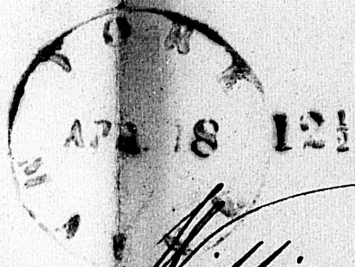

I Hannah Young of York in the County of York and State of Maine, widow, aged seventy eight years testify and say, that I am the widow of John Young late of ^{York in} the County of York and State of Maine deceased a Soldier in the War of the Revolution, and that my Maiden name was Hannah Banks, that I was lawfully married to the said John Young on the fourteenth day of June A.D. 1781 by the Rev. Isaac Lyman of said York, and according to the best of my knowledge and belief that in the month of April or May A.D. 1775 my said husband enlisted as a private Soldier in the Company commanded by Captain Samuel Derby, in Col. Scammons Regiment for the term of eight months, and served in said Company for that term of time, when he again enlisted in said Company & Regiment for the term of one year, and that he served in said Company for that term - and that he again enlisted as a private Soldier in the year of 1777 in a Company & Regiment in the Massachusetts line for the term of three years, and served as a Soldier for the full term of three years for which he enlisted, but what officers he enlisted and served under during this term I cannot now tell.

I further testify and say that my said husband was an inhabitant of the said town of York, in the then District of Maine at the time of his enlistments aforesaid and continued to be an inhabitant of said York till the time of his death which was in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & ninety eight.

That I now am & ever have been a resident in said York, and that neither my said husband nor myself have ever received a grant of Land or money in lieu thereof, from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and that I believe myself entitled to two hundred

acres of land by virtue of a resolve of the Legislature
of the state of Maine approved March 17 1835 in
favour of certain officers and Soldiers of the Rev-
olutionary War and widows of deceased officers and
Soldiers.

beck Maine, the receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge, have and by these presents do sell, convey quitclaim and assign to him the said Morton his heirs and assigns forever all my claim and right to the two hundred acres of land from the State of Maine mentioned in the within certificate. To him and to hold the same to him the said George W. Morton his heirs and assigns forever.
