

Payment of the Confederate Debt. It seems the Copperheads have determined to assert the validity of the Confederate debt in any event. The danger of leaving that huge corruption fund in a condition to be employed to secure its own recognition has been faithfully presented by Republican speakers and writers. How easy it would be for Congressmen, after purchasing half a million of these bonds apiece, in a legitimate way, at the market price of less than five cents on the dollar, to bring them up to par by a sin-le vote! How clearly under such imaginable circumstances, would honorable gentlemen see that our family quarrel has been regarded too exclusively from a sectional standpoint, and that justice requires the assumption of the Southern as well as the Northern burden! With what arguments and appeals would a subsidized press overflow! How forcibly and persuasively would Mr. Stephens, of Georgia, advocate upon the floor of the Senate this new acknowledgment of Southern rights! It may be, that Congress would stedlastly resist the temptation; but are we willing to incur the risk of such an agitation? The Republican party is not willing. We propose to make it a part of the national compact, that the Confederate debt shall remain forever worthless, and that the validity of the National debt shall be unquestioned. And we do not propose to allow Mr. Stephens to advocate the recognition of the Confederate debt, or anything else, on the floor of the Senate, just

After opposing the constitutional amendment at every step, the Copperleads see at last that it must succeed. Tennessee has ratified it. New Jersey has ratified it. A powertul party is organized and actively seeking its ratification in North Carolina. This dangerous question will undoubtedly be withdrawn from American politics. Will it? The Copperhead agitators say no. The party whose representatives in the Thirty-ninth Congress, with only six exceptions, voted to increase their own salaries, is not willing to see so much possible plunder stricken out of existence, resolved into mere waste paper. It is as an international question that they now assert the validity of the Rebel debt. The argument was sketched in the World some days ago; it has since appeared in the Argus, fortified by identically the same authorities and illustrations. It begins with the declaration respecting the Southern States, in the report of the nstruction Committee, that "for four years they had a de facto government." A better statement for the purpose is found in an expression used by Thaddeus Stevens in a recent speech at Bedford, Penn. Mr. Stevens called the States lately in rebellion, "mere territories, conquered by our arms from the Confederate States of America." From this point the argument rests upon citations from Gardner's "Institutes of International Law" as fol-

ly are passed by a cession or conquest. Page 55. In ordinary cases, where the whole national property and jurisdiction are ceded to another nation, the latter is justly liable for her dolar. There are some collateral citations, but we have endeavored to state the argument clearly and fully. Its application to its case in hand is impossible, as we believe, for several reasons. In the first place, the learned writer is speaking of nations, and it does not follow because an association of men has a goveroment, that it is therefore a nation. A State, or a city, may have a government, but it is not a nation. A band of robbers, ora fresh water college, may have a government, but will hardly be called a nation We may properly speak, as the Reconstructive Committee does, of a de tacto or de jure government, but a de facto nation is always de jure. The Confederacy was never a nation. No power ever recognized its nationality. Its independence was never obtained, and whatever is true only of nations is for that very reason not true of the apparition known as the Confederate States of America In the second place, our author says that where "in ordinary cases" jurisdiction passes from one nation to another, the latter is justly liable for the debts of the former. But this is not an ordinary case. The debt was incurred in an attempt to break down the previously existing jurisdiction of the United States. That peculiarity marks the case as highly extraordinary. If we paid the toreign holders of this debt, we should be magnanimously restoring to them, with handsome inest, the means contributed to break down the authority of our government, the money which prolonged the war and cost us much treasure and many lives. No rational being can defend a principle involving such consequences as these, No publicist ever did or vill defend it. Thirdly, the Argus produces an example, drawn from current history. It is the cession of Venetia to Italy. "Italy," says the Argus. "has just been obliged to assume that portion of the Austrian debt which it belonged to Venetia to pay." Even if this were true, the cases are far from parallel; but it so happens that on the very morning when the Argus published its essay on the Confederate debt, we printed the following dispatch, received by the Atlantic cable :

PICKLED FORAGE.—A few days since we had the pleasure of meeting, on the Alexandria and Orange train, an old gentleman, a valued friend, who advised us, as we valued a reputa-tion for veracity, never to assert again (as we did in an article published some time back on liming hay) that people in Germany actually pickled fodder for their cattle. We retorted on our friend the well known story of the old wo-man who refused credence to her salior boy's stories of flying fish, while sho swallowed as gospel truth an enormous lie her son told about pulling up by the anchor, when in the Red Sea, one of Pharaoh's chariot wheels. Now, as re-gards pickling fodder, we certainly did see it done in Germany, and in this wise—not one, but several pits were dug in the clover field, about ten feet deep, with the same width and length; these were lined with loose boards, and the clover thorwn in green, as cut, and tho-rougly trampled down by two men; the sur-face of every layer, about a foot or eighteen inches in thickness, was whitened with salt; layer was added to layer, and trampled as above and salted, antil the pit was filled with a com-paratively solid mass of clover. A rude cover-ing of boards was then put over the whole, sufficient to turn rain, a slight trench, such as a soldier digs around his tent—and the opera-tion was then complete. We were told that at-ter formentation, he mass wascut out through the winter with sharp spades, fed to stock of all kinds, and devoured with great relish. We were informed, moreover, that the process ap-piled as well to pea vines, the leaves of the Je-rusalem artichoke (solamin tuberosis) and to the leaves of certain forest trees.
