Four Oaks, a Novel by Kamba Thorpe is the title of a volume just published by George W. Carleton, New York. Of Kamba Thorpe we confess that we never heard before; never-theless, he—or she—has written a story which is very much above the average of the novels which are constantly pouring from the press. The author is evidently a Southerner, and the scene of the story is laid in Kentucky. Anyone familiar with the aspects of social life in a largish Southern town, ten or twelve years ago, before the bitter political animosities which culminated in civil war had begun to manifest themselves in social intercourse, will find that life very vividly and accurately delineated in this book. the articles of association:

I This Association shall be called the Free Religious Association.—its object being to promote the interests of pure religion, to encourage the scientific study of theology, and to increase fellowship in the spirit; and to this end all persons interested in these objects are condially invited to its membership.

Il Membership in this Association shall leave each individual responsible for his own opinions alone, and affect in no dagree his relation to other Associations. Any person desiring to co-operate with the Association shall be considered a member, with full right to speak in its meetings; but an annual contribution of one dollar shall be necessary to give a title to vote,—provided, also, that those thus entitled, may at any time confer the privilege of voting upon the whole assembly, on questions not pertaining to the management of business.

tions not pertaining to the management of business.

III. The Officers of the Association shall be a President, three Vice Presidents, a Secretary and Assistant Secretary, a Treasurer, and six Directors, who together shall constitute an Executive Committee, entrusted with all the business and interests of the Association in the interim of its meetings. These officers shall be chosen by ballot, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, and shall hold their offices for one year, or until others be chosen in their place; and they shall have power to fill any vacancies that may occur in their number between the annual meetings.

IV. The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held in the city of Boston, on Thursday, of what is known as "Anniversary Week," at such place and with such sessions as the Executive Committee may appoint; of which at least one mouth's previous notice shall be publicly given. Other meetings and Conventions may be called by the Committee, according to their judgment, at such times and places as may seem to them desirable.

V. These articles may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association by a majority vote of the members present, provided public notice of the amendment has been given with the call for the meeting.

Louis Blanc's "Letters on England" is made the basis of a very discriminating article on the genius and writings of the brilliant French journalist, historian and statesman. A portion of this article, referring to the position of M. Louis Blanc in relation to the late war in this country, and some passages indicating the singular changes of public sentiment in England during and since the war, we copy below:

Of all the political topics with which these letters deal, American affairs furnish the most accurate and searching test of the warmth, the earnestness, and the completeness of the writer's liberal faith. The sophisms by which the astute champions of the Slave Power succeeded in blinding, perhaps, the majority of pretended, and no inconsiderable number of true liberals, to the real designs of the secessionist rebellion, were powerless to obscure sionist rebellion, were powerless to obscure the keen vision, or to warp the calm good sense of M. Louis Blane. His instincts were too im-passioned, his principles too leavened with emotion, to allow him, upon any pretense, faith will be furnished within three days after the case mbling of Congress. Louis Blanc, with his customary candor, repeatedly and with pain acknowledges, there was a distinct aberation of feeling on the part of English society—on the part, that is, of the great mass of the aristocracy and the middle class—from those liberal principles which receive everywhere more than enough of the homes of our line loyals. The neoule did which receive everywhere more than enough of the homage of our lip-loyalty. The people did not join in this somewhat contemptible outburst of jealous vanity; but the People had not then succeeded to its heritage of governing England. In public affairs, the House of Commons—an administrative committee, representing the land and the capital of the country—was held not unnaturally by foreign nations, by our American kinsmen, as well as by our Continental neighbors, to represent the nation. And when it became clear that "The Model Republic," as it was tauntingly termed, was inextricably involved in the coils of a disastrous civil war, it did not long remain a matastron. was inextricably involved in the coils of a disastrous civil war, it did not long remain a matter of doub' that the large majority of the British Parliament was exuitant at the assumed ruin of the Democracy, the formidable offshoot of Anglo-Saxon energy, and dreaded rival of the British name. Hence the rapid change of sentiment on the Subject of Slavery, so seemingly inexplicable, so uninteligible, so illogical. M. Louis Blanc seems to have left the sudden evolution astonishing at all events, even if capable of a simple, though not creditable explanation.

It is manifest to any one now looking back on the history of the four years during which the future of the American Union was wrapt in gloomy uncertainty, that our Tory and Whig statesmen, our pseudo-liberal orators and journalists, rejoiced in the danger to the Republic, and, in prophesying the defeat of the North, forecasted their most zealous anticipations. For this base rejection of principle we have since been punished; the Restoration of the Union has been a thing to make England uneasy; and as yet, who shall say that the peril has passed by? The United States have not forgotten—it would hardly be in human nature so soon to forget—the building and equipment of the Alabama, the opposition which was offered to the enforcement of the Foreign Enlistment Act, the apathy that was exhibited in the matter of Mr. Laird's questionable practices. And some time—most earnestly do we hope that day may never come—it may be in the power of the men we then thought it a light thing to insuit and wrong, to pay back to us some of the injuries and contumelies which we were guilty of abeiting. A more short-sighted and suicidal poicy than we maintained, from the hour that the first shot was fired in South Carolina to the day when Lee gave up his sword at Appomatox Court House, could not have been easily devised. THE CHOLERA AT MAVANA.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16. The following are specials to the Herald:
