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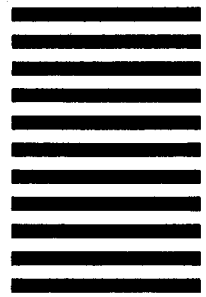
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Introduction

INTRODUCTION

The tables presented in this report are grouped as follows: Section I—Labor Force Statistics; Section II—Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment; Section III—Hours and Earnings; Section IV—Covered Employment, Wages and Contributions; Section V—Unemployment Insurance Program; and Section VI—Labor Exchange Program. A list of definitions is provided in Appendix A to explain the terms used in each Section. Appendices B and C describe the geographical and industrial classification systems used in tabulating the data.

Section I - Labor Force Statistics

The civilian labor force statistics presented in this section are developed monthly and annually for the state, counties, and labor market areas. These statistics are also available for over 500 minor civil divisions by contacting the Department of Labor. All labor force statistics in this publication are not seasonally adjusted but have been revised and may differ from preliminary estimates released previously. The methodology used to compile these estimates was developed by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The statistics pertain to the civilian labor force which excludes members of the armed forces. The civilian labor force is comprised of the employed and the unemployed (refer to Appendix A for precise definitions). Also provided is the number of unemployed as a percent of the civilian labor force, or as it is more commonly known, the “unemployment rate.”

Civilian labor force statistics have many uses. The unemployment rate and other components of the labor force are the most prominent measures of the economy and receive wide media coverage. Labor force changes are of vital concern to governments, businesses, labor groups, universities, and research institutions. In addition, billions of dollars are distributed to state and local governments through a variety of education, training, employment, and economic development programs based on civilian labor force statistics.

Section II - Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

This section consists of the nonfarm wage and salary employment figures by industry classification for the state and substate areas. The nonfarm wage and salary employment figures, except those for the federal government, refer to people on nonfarm establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. For federal government establishments, employment figures represent the number of people who occupied positions on the last day of the calendar month. Intermittent workers are counted if they performed any service during the month.

Nonfarm wage and salary employment data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; military personnel and employees of the Central Intelligence and National Security Agencies are excluded.

People on establishment payrolls who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday, on paid vacation, or who work during a part of the pay period even though they are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are people who are on layoff, on leave without pay, on strike for the entire period, or who were hired but have not yet reported during the period.

The nonfarm wage and salary tables in this section are designed to provide the most detailed level of industry employment possible. Consequently, because of this detailed level of reporting, the nonfarm wage and salary tables in the report may not agree precisely with other separate official employment estimates developed for the state and for the metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) of Bangor, Lewiston-Auburn and Portland-South Portland-Biddeford. Nonetheless, the data reported serve many useful purposes and are widely regarded as a leading barometer of the economic health of an area. These statistics have been used in guiding business decisions on plant locations, sales, and purchases; detecting and planning for swings in the business cycle; and providing for industry-wide employment comparisons.

Section III - Hours and Earnings for Production Workers in Manufacturing

Included in this section are the average work week and average hourly earnings of production workers employed in manufacturing industries. Statistics are produced on an annual basis as well as by month for the state and for the metropolitan statistical area (MSA) of Portland-South Portland-Biddeford.

Average hours and earnings estimates are derived from a representative sample of manufacturing establishments which report payrolls and hours worked. The reports are for production workers only, which include all nonsupervisory personnel and working supervisors who are directly engaged in the manufacture of the product(s) of the establishment and other closely-related activities.

The average hourly earnings are on a "gross" basis and reflect changes in basic hourly incentive wage rates as well as such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work differentials. Averages of hourly earnings differ from wage rates. Earnings are the actual return to the worker for a stated period of time; rates are the amount stipulated for a given unit of work or time. Fringe benefits are not included in determining wage rates.

The work week information relates to the average hours for which pay was actually received, and differs from standard or scheduled hours. Such factors as absenteeism, labor turnover, part-time work, and work stoppages cause average weekly hours to be lower than scheduled hours of work for an establishment.

Because the average hours and earnings data are developed in exactly the same manner in all states, these statistics provide benchmarks against which individual employers can compare their performance with that of the same industry within the state or across the nation. The data can also be used in salary setting, including collective bargaining and other labor-management negotiations. These statistics have broad application in assessing economic conditions, particularly with regard to determining wage trends. The information available on average work week is an important leading indicator of changes in business cycles since, traditionally, employers tend to reduce workers' hours prior to actual job layoffs.

Section IV - Covered Employment, Wages, and Contributions

All statistics compiled in this section are tabulated from the quarterly tax reports submitted by employers subject to the Maine Employment Security Law. Also included in certain tables are similar reports for employees of federal government installations within the state.

Employment coverage under the Employment Security Law has undergone various changes over the years. From January 1, 1972 to December 31, 1977, coverage applied to firms with one or more workers in each of 20 or more weeks of the year, or with a payroll of at least \$1,500 in any calendar quarter. Also in 1972, employees of state hospitals and state institutions of higher education were included, as were certain nonprofit organizations employing four or more workers in each of 20 or more weeks in a year. Effective January 1, 1978, coverage was expanded to include the following: (1) agricultural labor for employers with 10 or more workers in each of 20 weeks or who paid \$20,000 or more in wages in any calendar quarter; (2) domestics workers of employers who paid \$1,000 or more in any calendar quarter; (3) most employees of state and local governments, except elected officials; and (4) employees of nonprofit elementary and secondary schools. Aside from the above restrictions, the primary groups ex-

cluded from coverage after January 1, 1978 are nonprofit organizations with fewer than four employees; the self-employed; unpaid family members; railroad workers; and certain farm and domestic workers.

Coverage is extensive and comprises approximately 97 percent of the total nonfarm wage and salary employment series described in Section II. By industrial sector, covered employment encompasses all of the goods producing industries and over 96 percent of the service producing activities included in the nonfarm wage and salary employment series. The only nonfarm wage and salary employment activities excluded from covered employment are railroad workers, some domestic workers, and certain state and local government workers. The self-employed are excluded from both employment series.

Covered employment data represent the number of workers earning wages during the pay period including the 12th of the month. The data include all corporation officials, executives, supervisory personnel, wage earners, piece workers, and part-time workers. Excluded are people who earned no wages because of strikes, work stoppages, temporary layoffs, illnesses, or unpaid vacations.

Covered employment and wage data are distributed on an area basis, insofar as is possible, from information furnished by employers. Multi-area employers having fewer than six people employed within a county may assign such workers to the county in which they have their largest number of employees. Information pertaining to workers who regularly perform services in more than one county is included in the "inter-county" category, as are data reported by employers who fail to show the area in which they operate. Covered employment is also reported by gender, based on information provided by employers. Beginning in 1995, these data have been supplemented with statistics from other employment surveys.

Perhaps the most significant use of the covered employment and wage statistics is in the employment security program of the Department. These data accurately reflect the extent of coverage of the state Unemployment Insurance program and are used to measure revenues, disbursements, and total and taxable wage trends. The tables are a primary source of data for the unemployment program for actuarial studies, determinations of experience ratings, tax rates, insured unemployment rates, and maximum benefit levels. The data are also used in the preparation of workload forecasts and budget estimates.

Caution should be exercised in using average weekly wage data developed from these statistics. Average weekly wages are computed by dividing 1/52 of total wages for the year by average monthly employment. This procedure presupposes that wages are evenly distributed throughout each week of the year. It also assumes that average monthly employment is approximately the same as in an average week. These assumptions do not consider such variables as bonus or retroactive payments, strikes, and different payroll periods within each quarter. Average wages may also be affected by the influx of workers in various industries during seasonal periods, labor turnover, short-term jobs, job-sharing, overtime, and people paid on a commission basis. More extensive data on average wages can be obtained from other sources of per capita earnings and special wage surveys.

A more accurate picture of average wages is available in Section III—Hours and Earnings.

Section V - Unemployment Insurance Program

The Unemployment Insurance program provides short-term financial assistance to people who lose their jobs and are able to work, available for work, and actively seeking work. A worker's monetary eligibility for Unemployment Insurance benefits is based upon wages earned during a predefined prior period of employment covered under the Maine Employment Security Law.

The program is financed solely by employer contributions which are paid into the Unemployment Trust Fund in amounts determined by an employer's contribution rate applied against taxable wages. Some classes of employers are allowed to make payments based on actual benefits paid under the direct reimbursable provisions of the Law. Explanations of these provisions are contained in the list of Definitions (Appendix A).

Besides providing financial assistance to unemployed people, the program acts as a stabilizer for the economy during times of high unemployment by offsetting, to some extent, the lost purchasing power resulting from unemployment. The Unemployment Insurance statistics have many uses: budgetary and administrative planning; program volumes, costs, and evaluations; extent of protection; and benefit adequacy. The data are also used in calculating insured unemployment rates at both the state and federal levels, and in making reports to Congress.

The Unemployment Insurance program also provides weekly updated information for Maine's Mass Layoff Statistics program. This program is operated jointly by the Maine Department of Labor and the US Bureau of Labor Statistics. It identifies those employers against whom 20 or more claims for Unemployment Insurance are filed over a five-week period, thus triggering a potential mass layoff event. The system then tracks these establishments in order to determine the overall number of workers affected, the duration of the layoff and the reason for it.

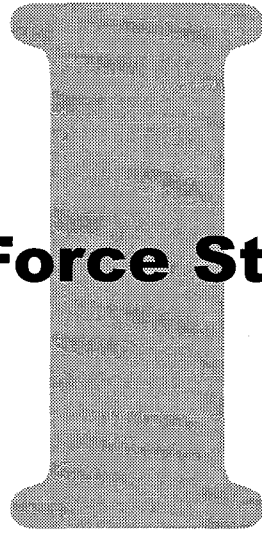
Section VI - Labor Exchange Program

The Maine Bureau of Employment Services is part of a nationwide network of public employment agencies. The primary function of the Bureau is to match people with jobs and employers with jobseekers. Several free services are provided to both employers and job applicants. The Bureau oversees implementation of the federal Workforce Investment Act. The Act establishes an integrated system of employment-related services to be delivered via one-stop offices, or CareerCenters in Maine. Located in 23 sites throughout the state, CareerCenters offer a comprehensive array of resources, workshops and individualized services for jobseekers and employers.

Among the primary services offered to employers are complete work registrations for applicants. Referral and placement assistance according to employer specifications is provided which includes a daily updated computerized Job Matching system of all applicant and job order information. Exclusive referral services are provided whereby employers list all of their job openings with the Bureau. In return, the Bureau registers applicants, screens them according to employer specifications, and refers per employer instructions. Positive recruitment services are provided in which new employers or employers with mass hiring needs receive personalized assistance in publicizing job openings and recruiting applicants. The Bureau regularly visits employers to become better acquainted with individual employer operations and needs. The Bureau participates in a nationwide clearance program to encourage and guide the movement of workers between geographical areas. Employers are aided in obtaining training and apprenticeship programs and in locating support services related to the labor exchange function. The Work Opportunities Tax Credit program is administered by the Bureau to provide tax credits to employers who hire workers from certain target groups. Finally, the Bureau provides access to labor market information at the local, state, and national levels to assist employers in understanding the economy and in planning and assessing operations.

The Bureau, in addition to serving employers and acting as a clearinghouse for labor market information, fulfills a series of special functions designed to assist people to enter or reenter employment. These activities include job-search assistance; job counseling and vocational guidance; individualized job development and preparation for employment; referral to training and supportive services; and occupational testing and assessment.

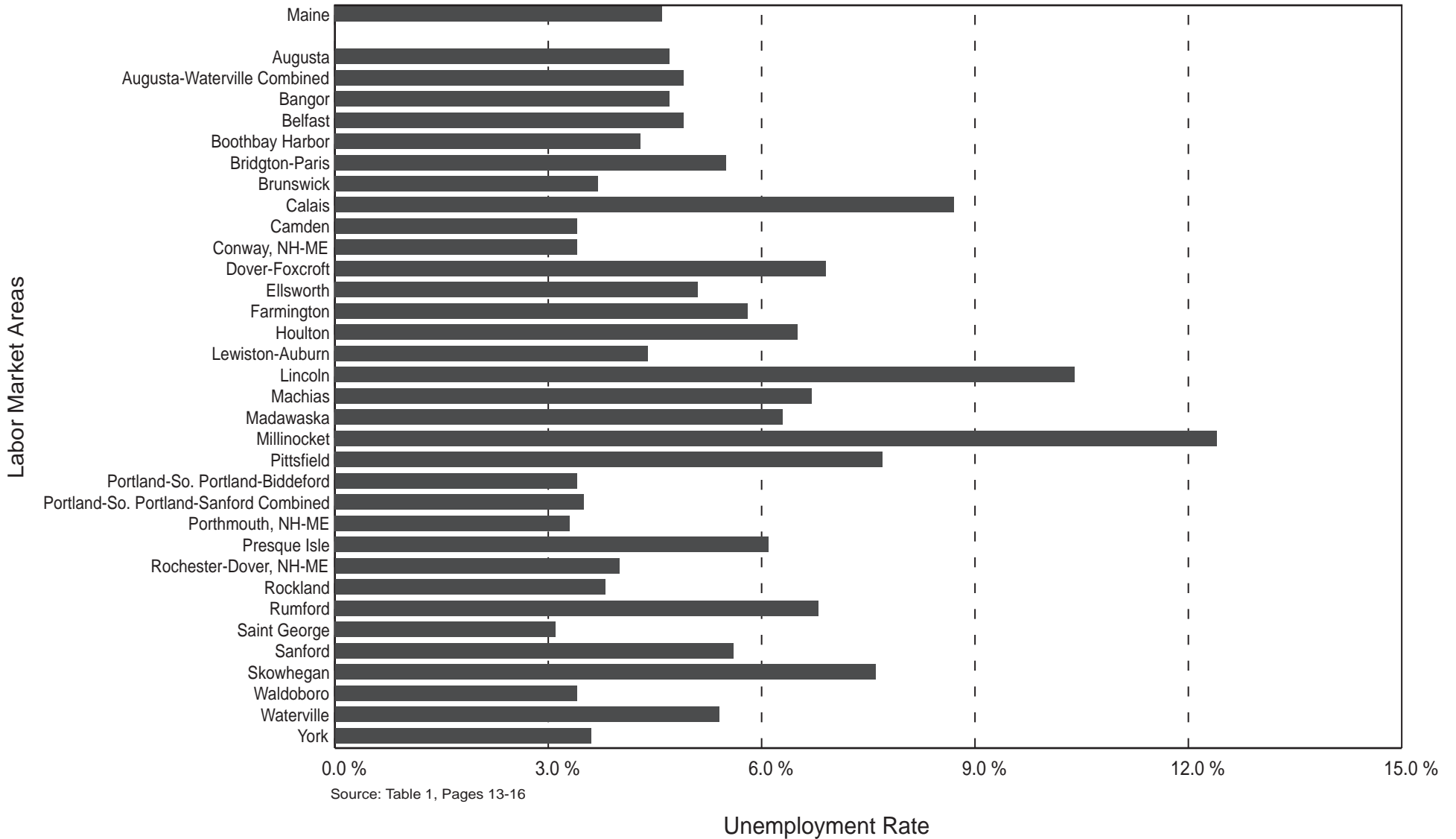

(2004 Annual Average)

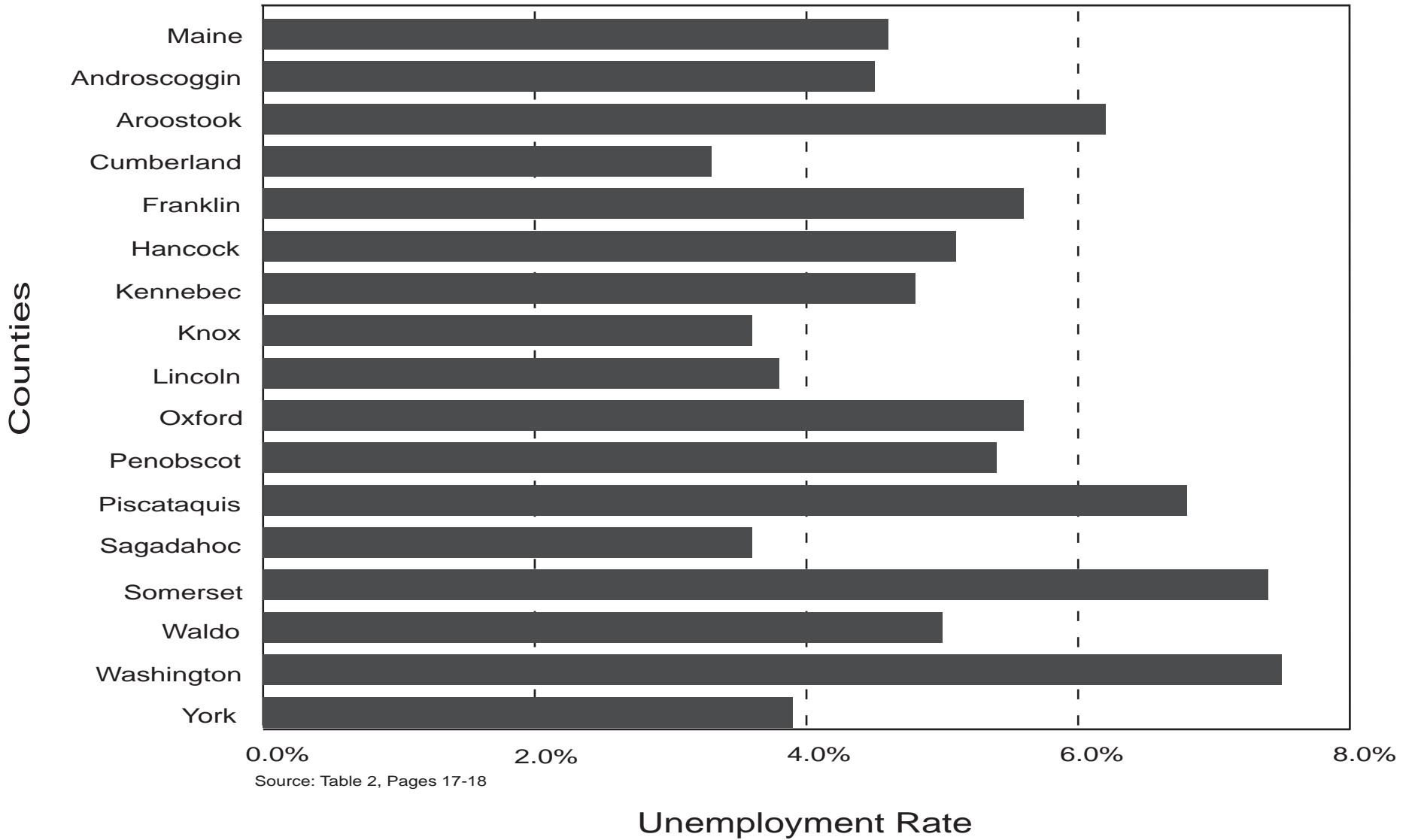

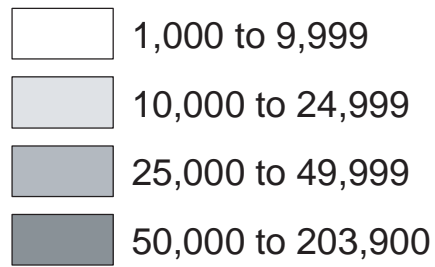
Unemployment Rate by County

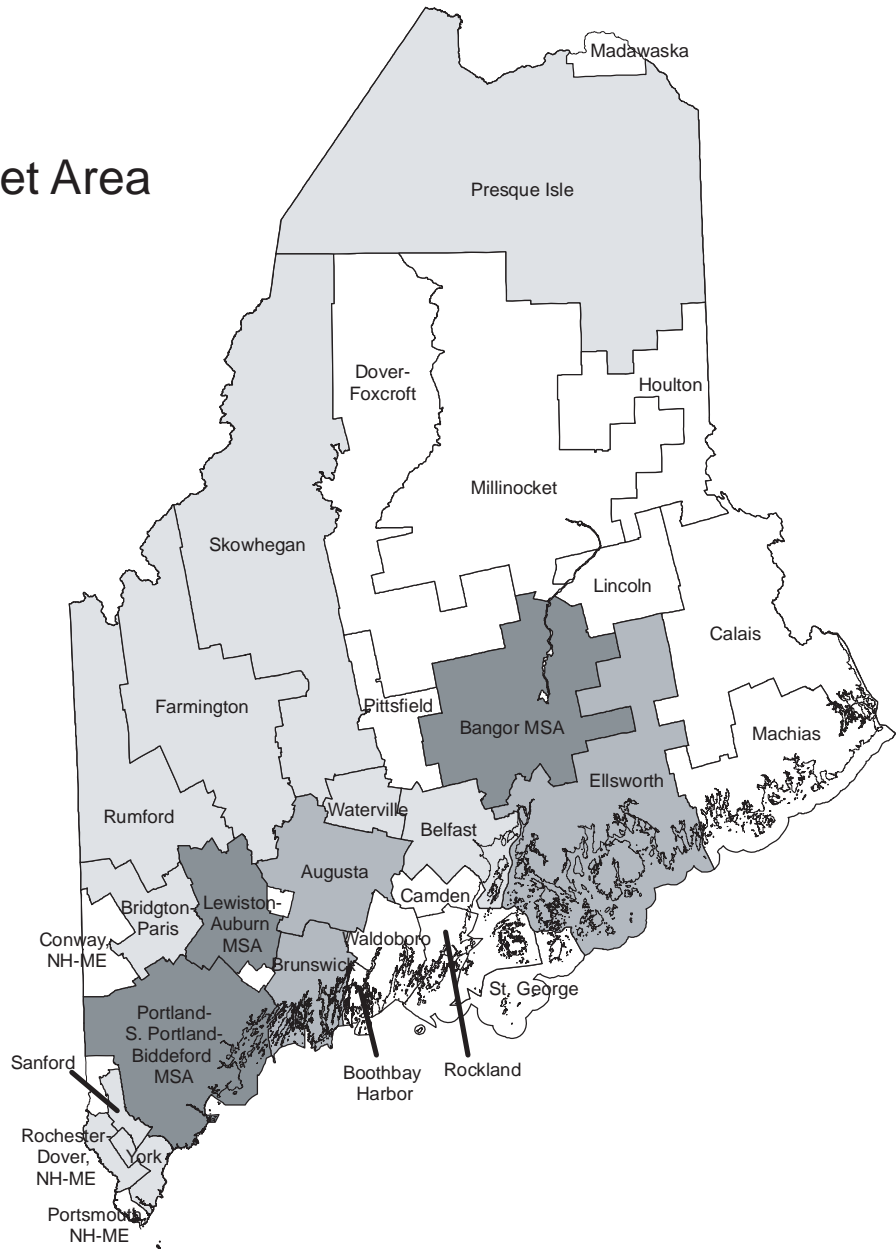
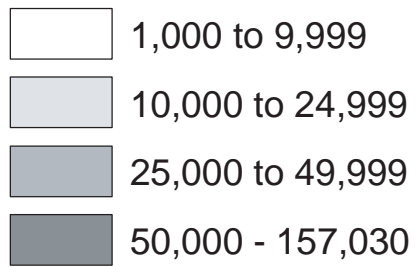
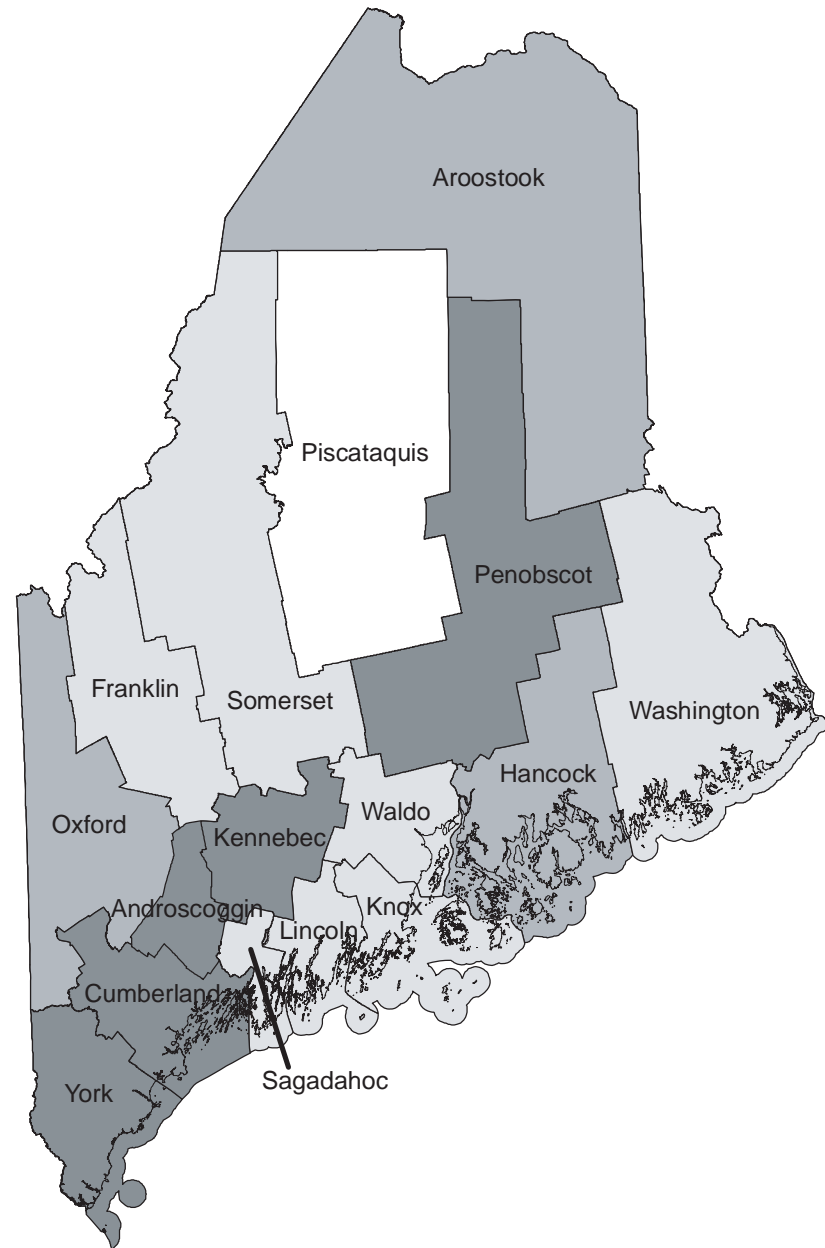

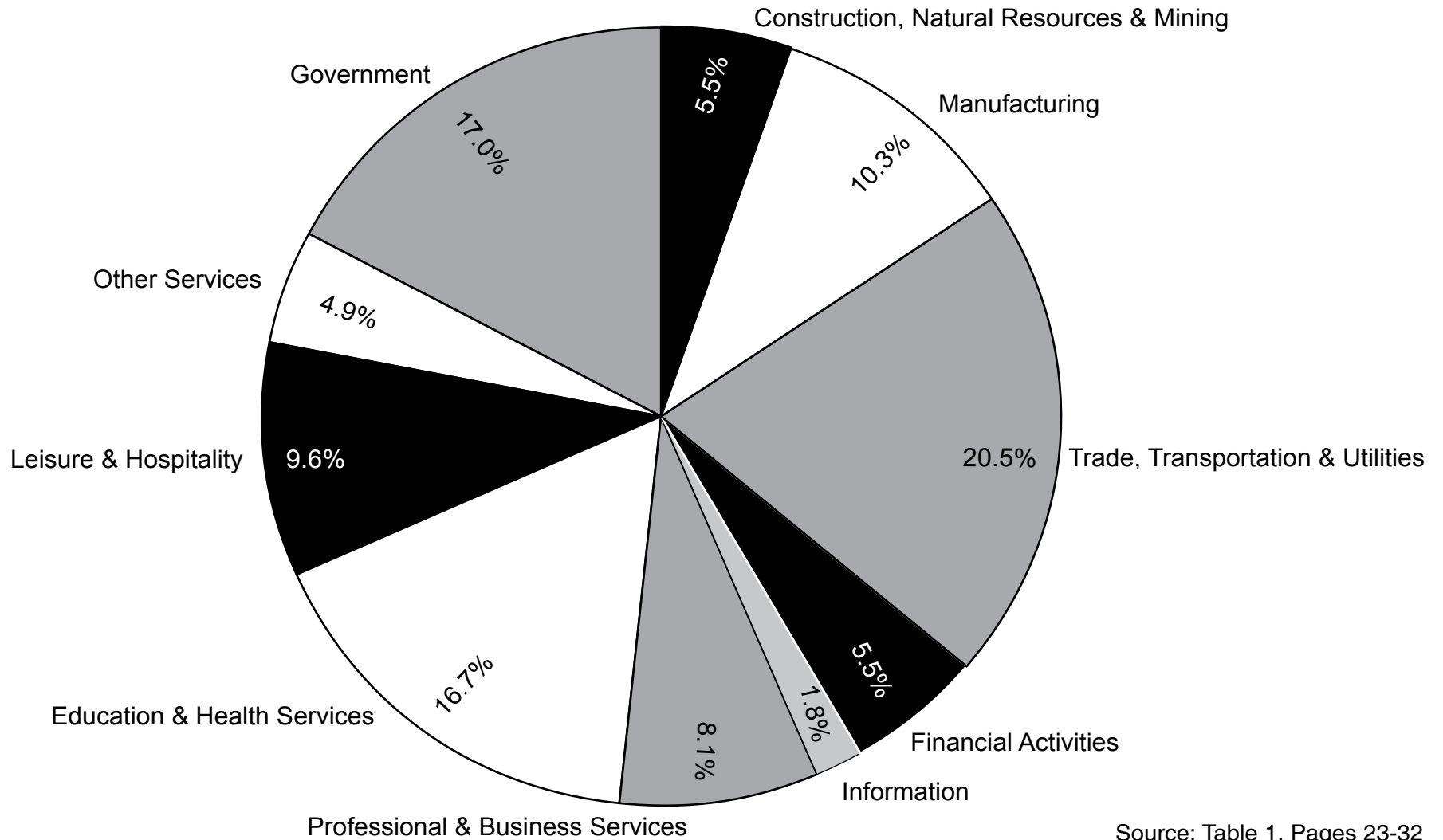

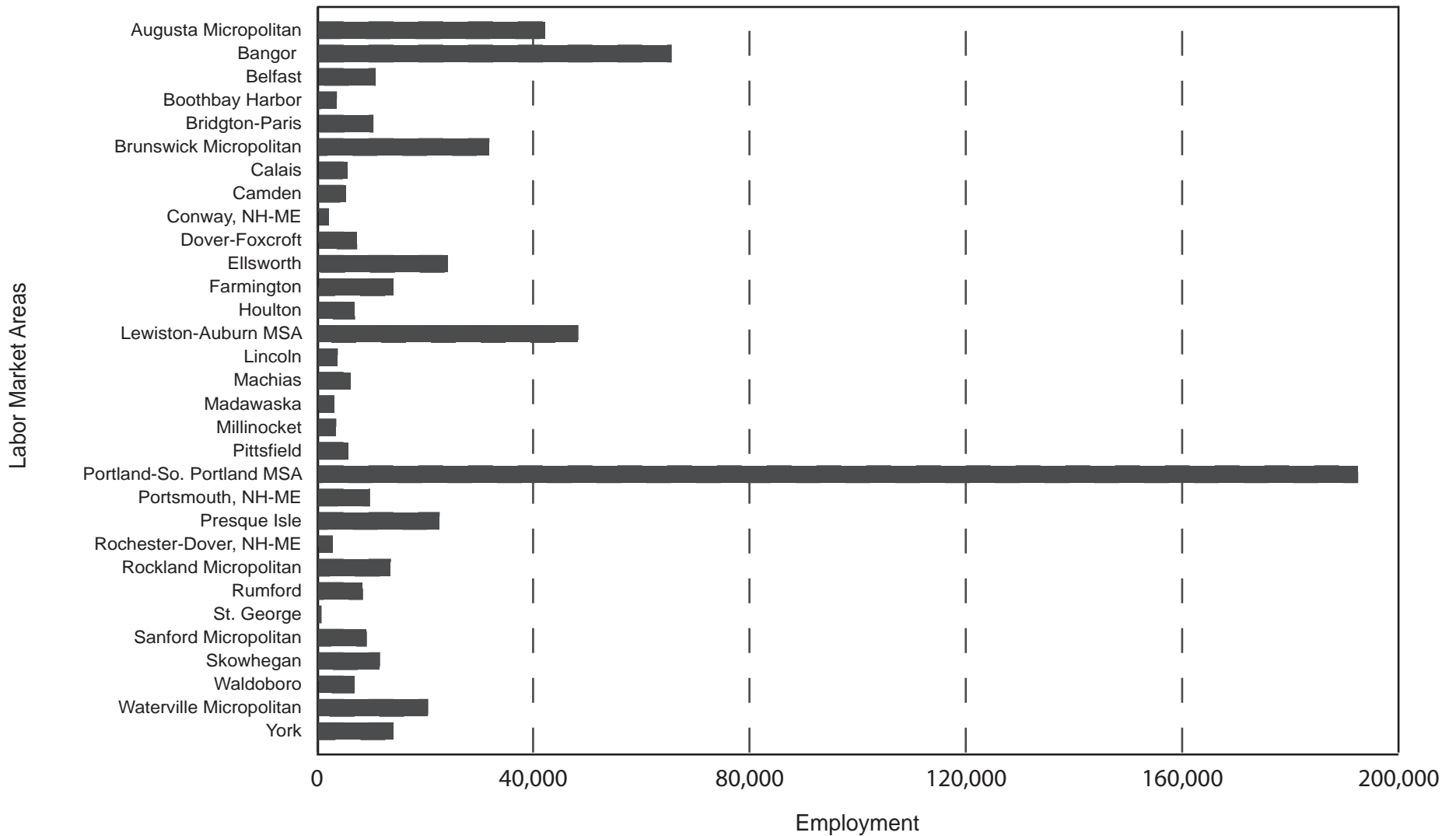

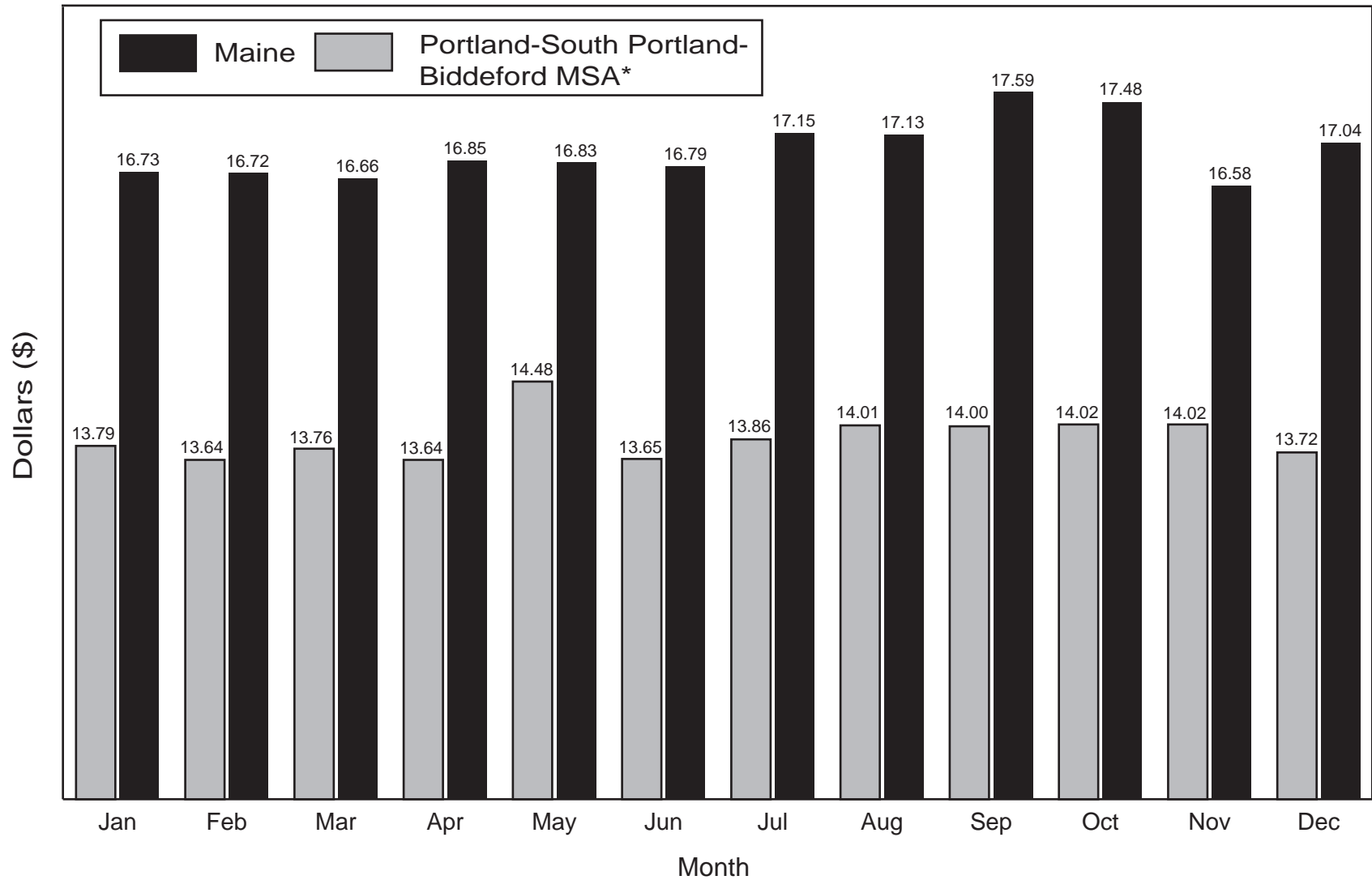

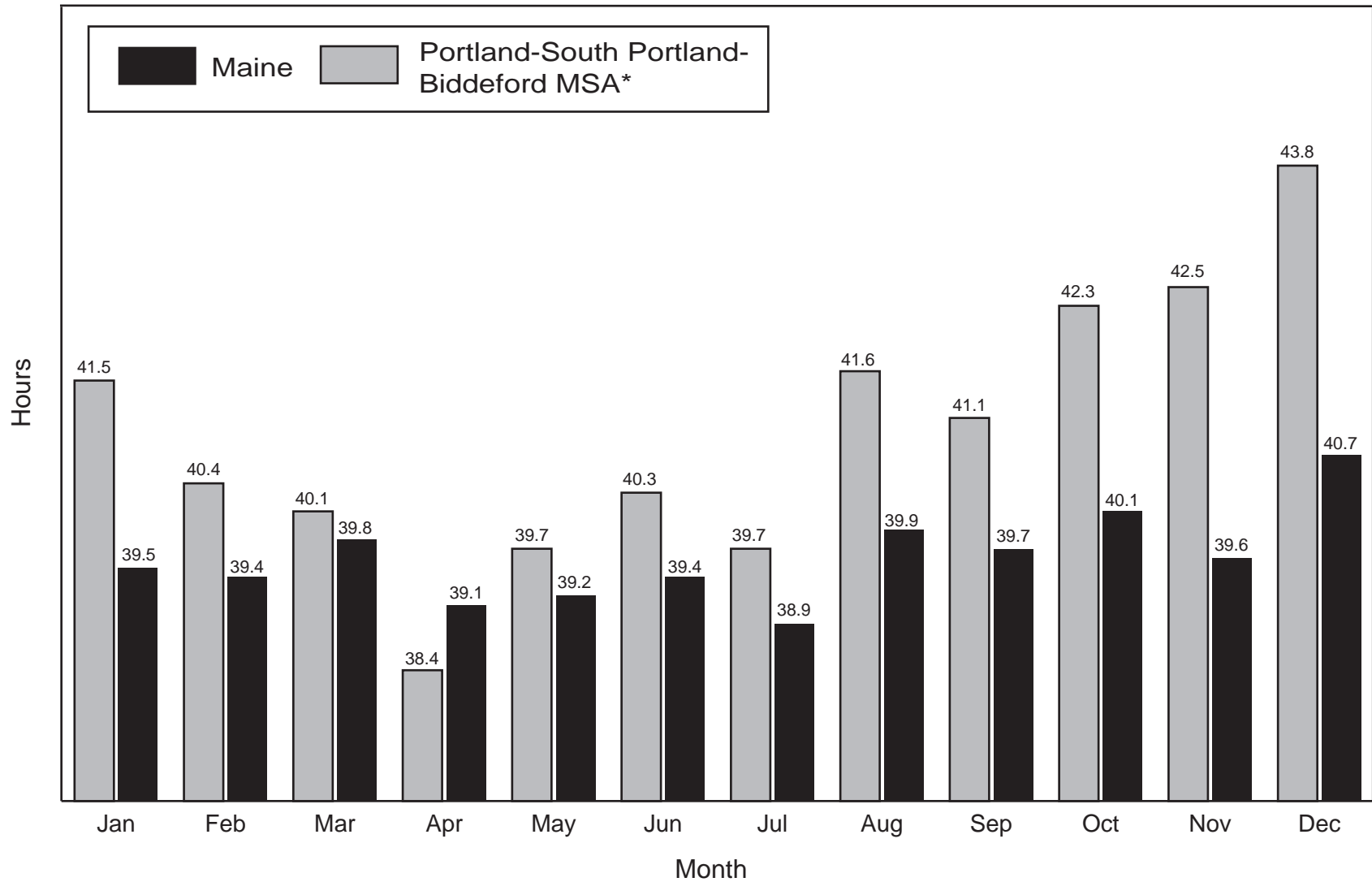

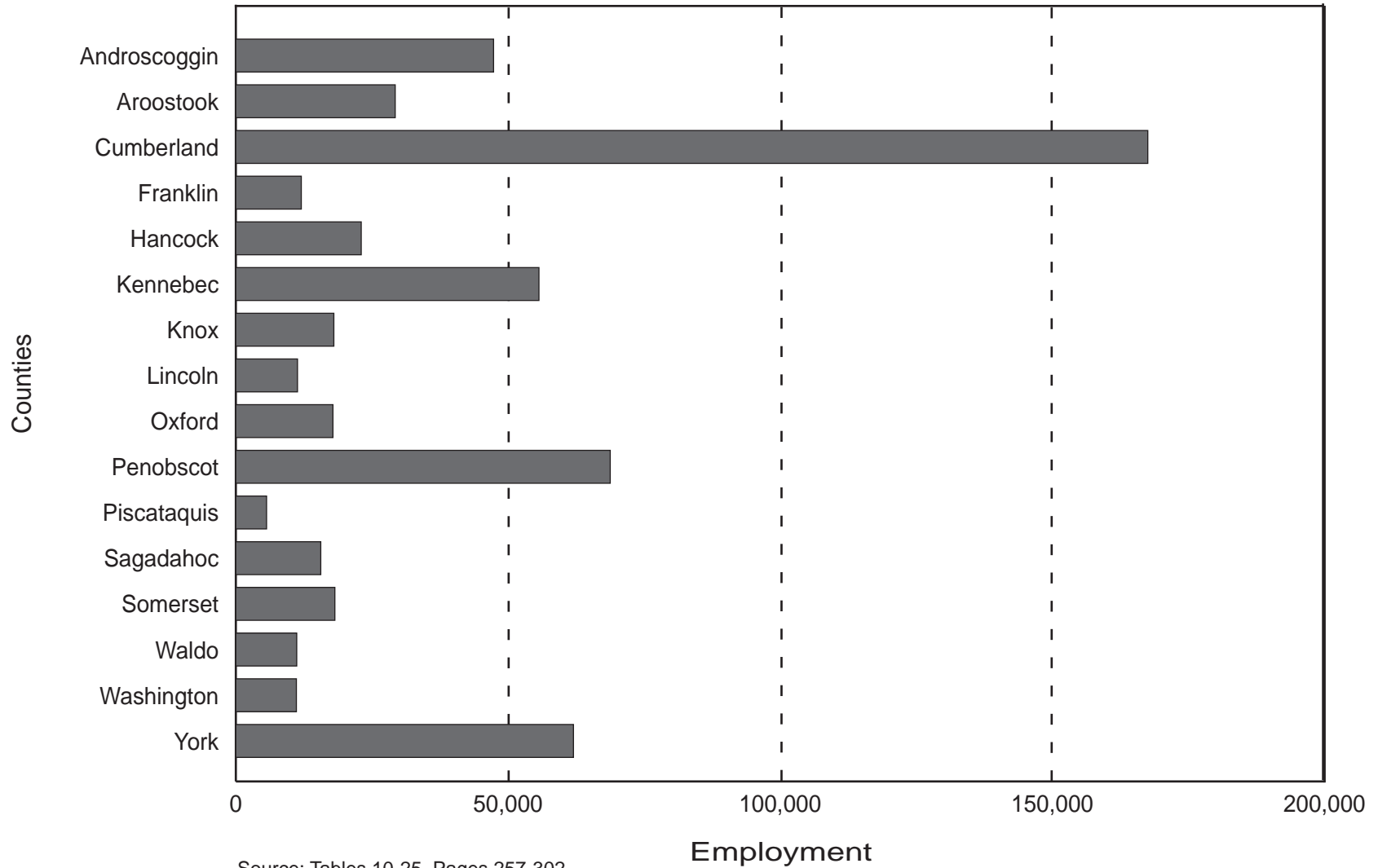

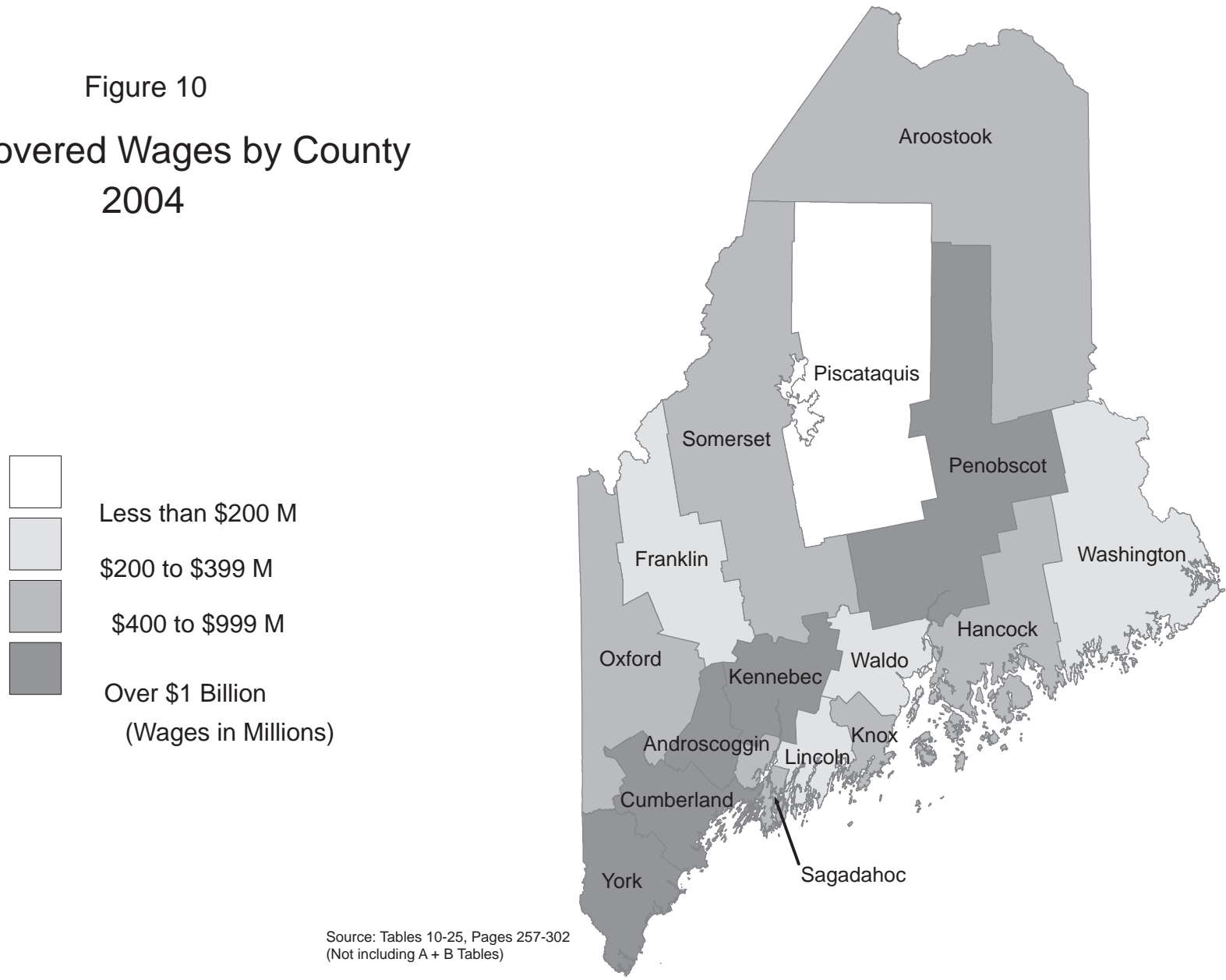

(2004 Annual Average)



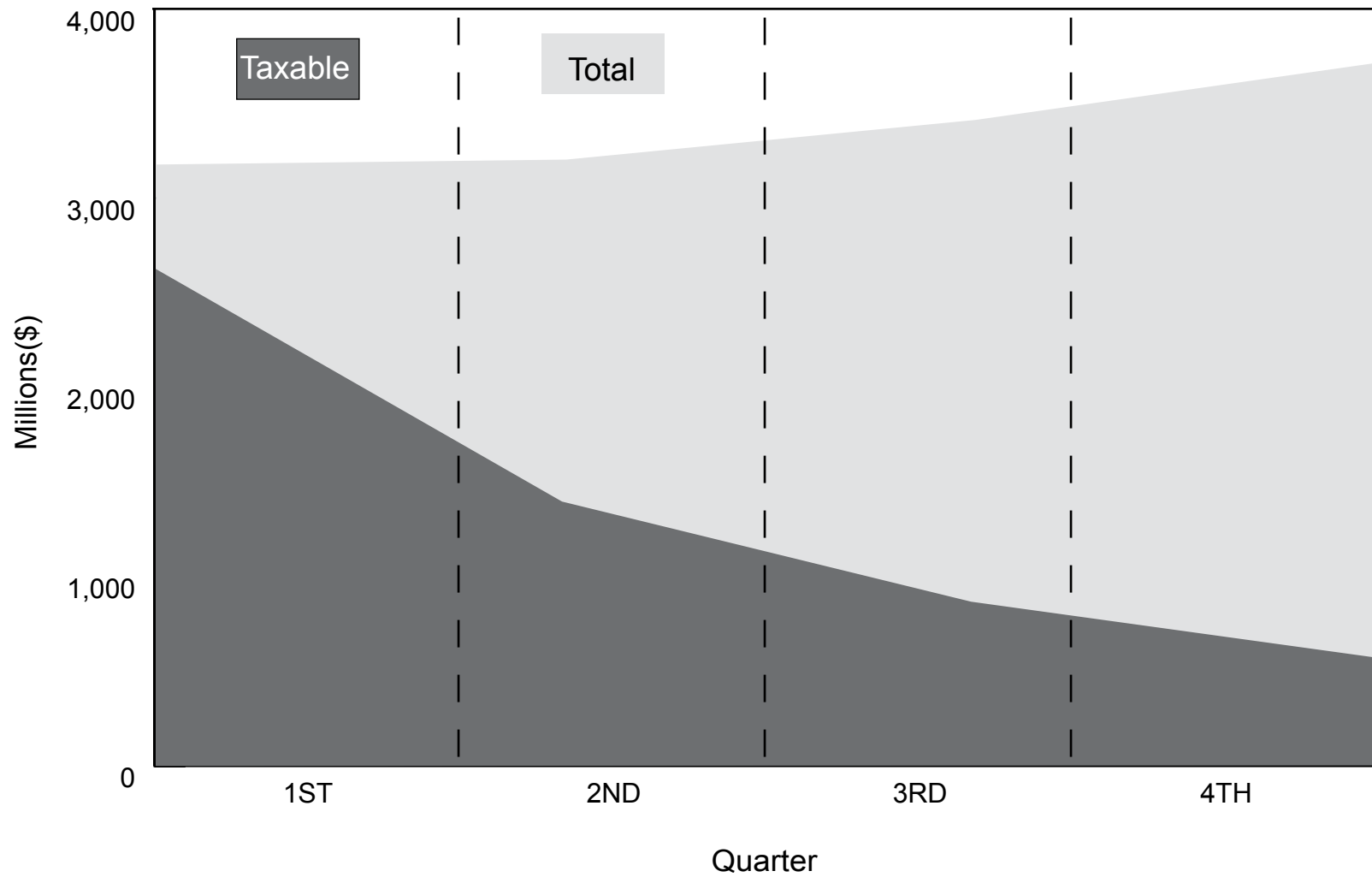

2004



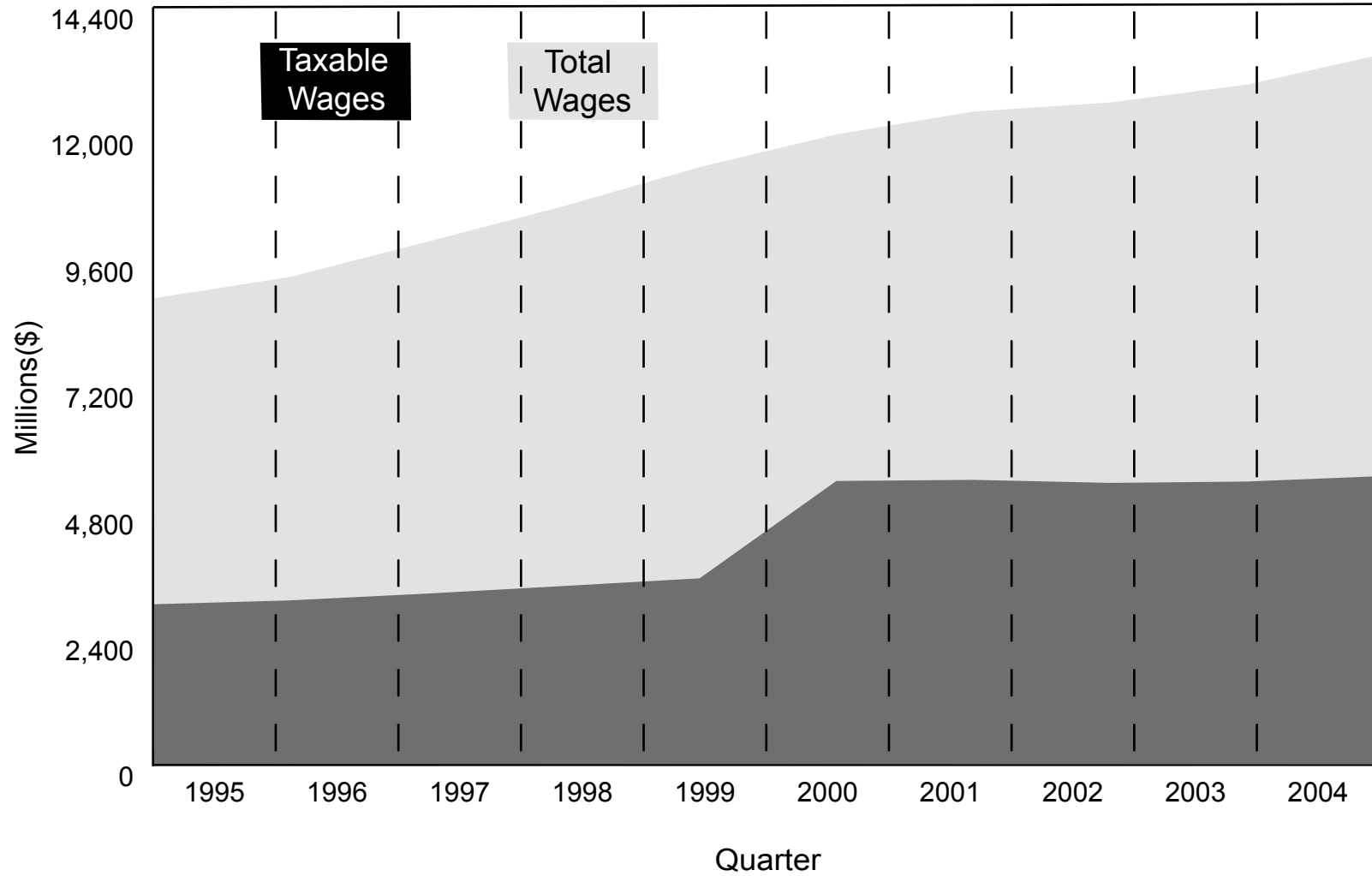

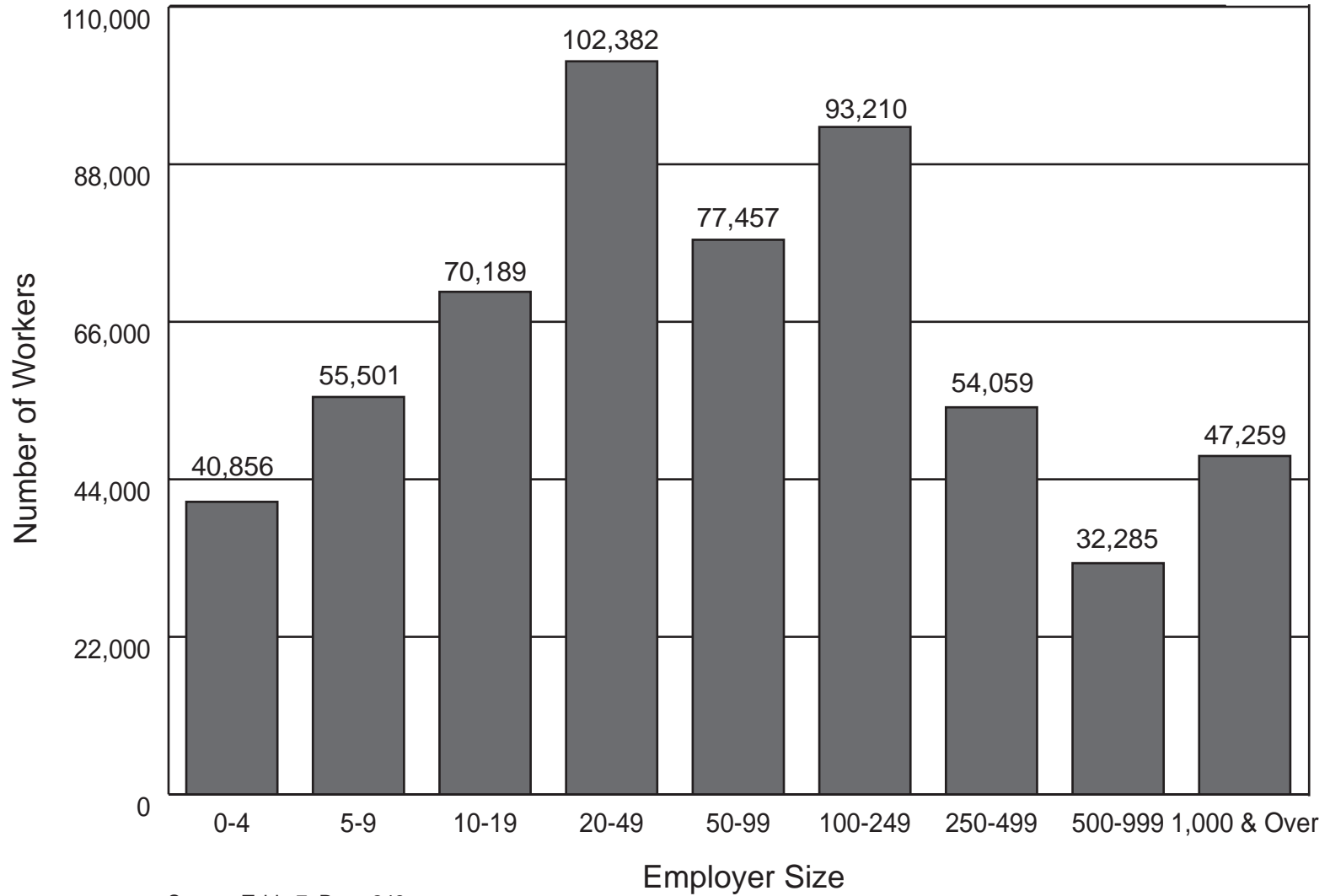

Note: Taxable Wage Base for 1995 to 1999 is \$7,000. Taxable Wage Base for 2000 to 2004 is \$12,000.

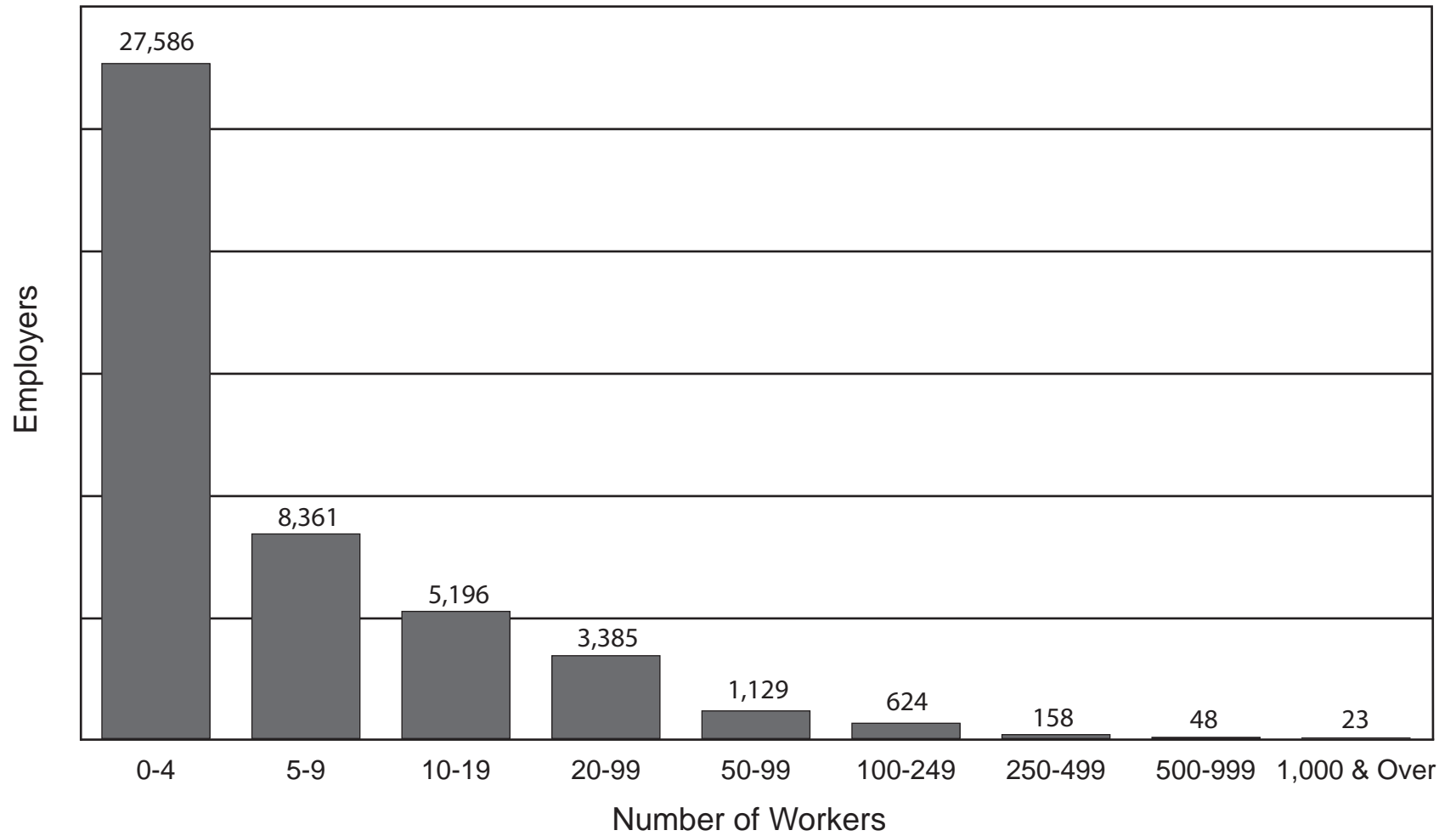

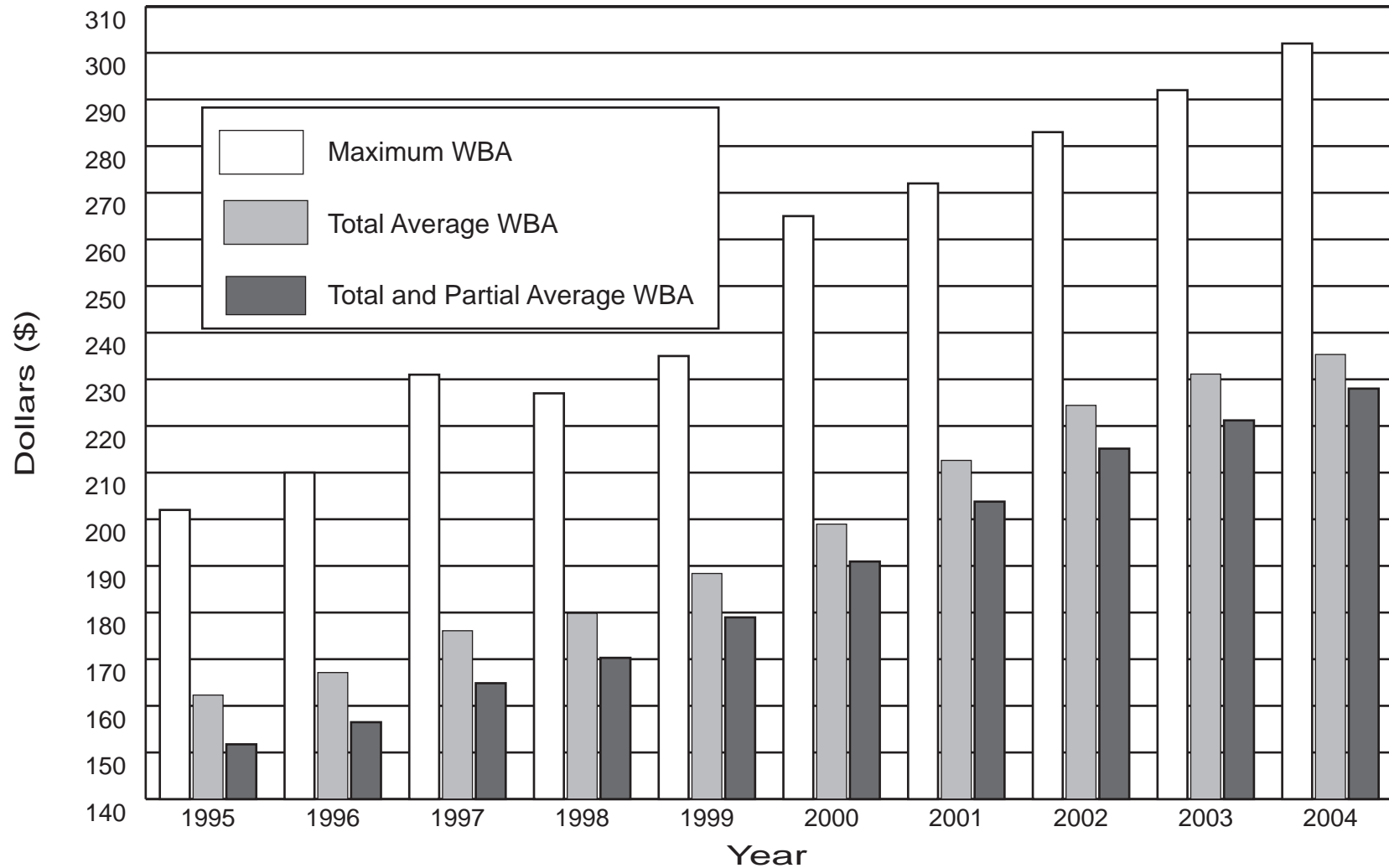

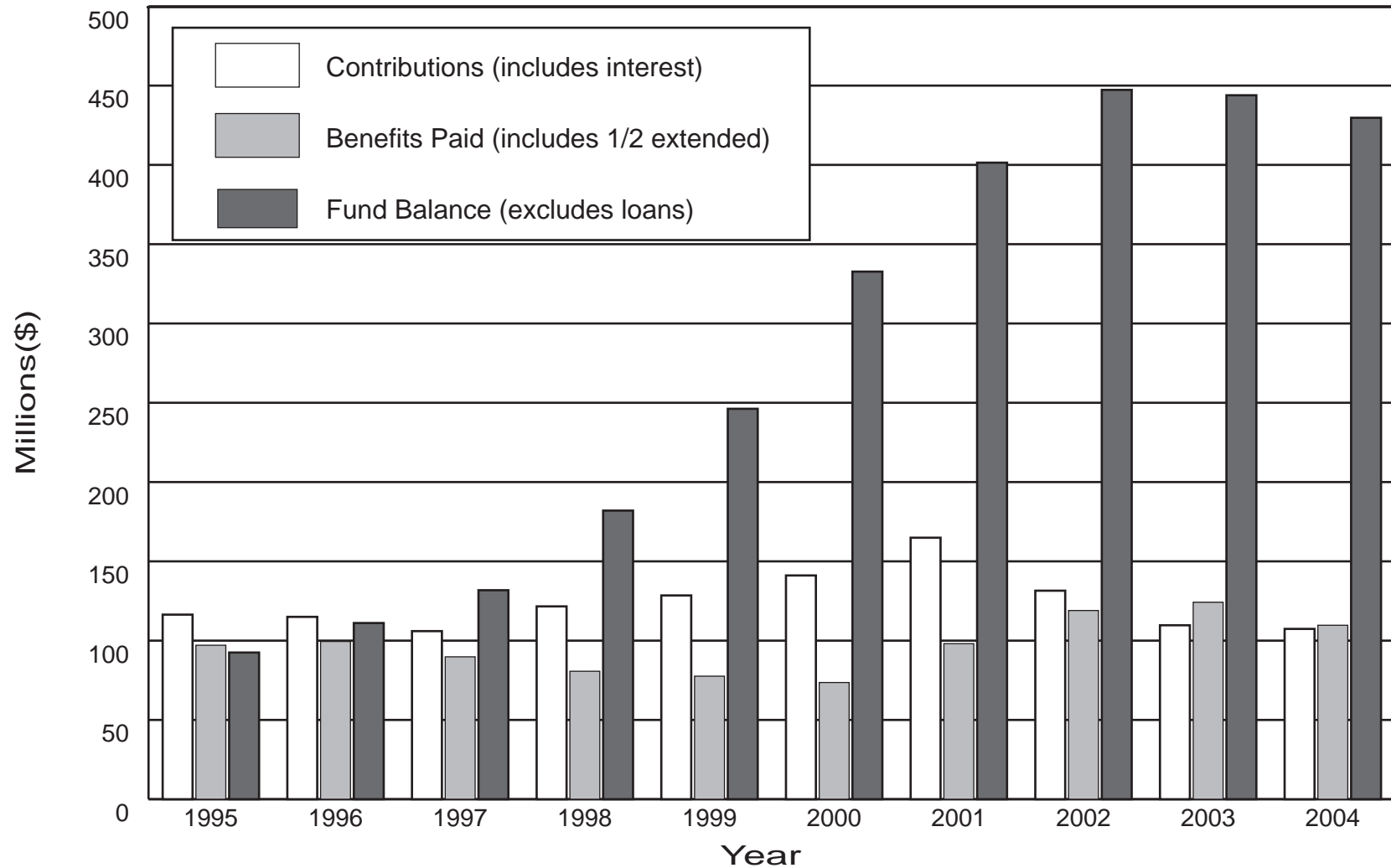

APPEAL A written request for a hearing to be held by an appeals authority regarding an unemployment insurance benefits eligibility decision, or a request for a higher authority review of a decision made by a lower authority.

LOWER AUTHORITY The first of two administrative authorities provided to review benefit decisions.

HIGHER AUTHORITY The second of two administrative authorities provided to review lower authority benefit decisions (as well as certain employer determinations which are not included in this report).

APPLICANTS AVAILABLE The total number of individuals considered as available, during one or more times throughout the program year, for referral by the BES to job openings or employment development services.

AVERAGE ACTUAL DURATION The total number of weeks of unemployment insurance benefits compensated during a year divided by the number of first payments for the same period.

AVERAGE CONTRIBUTION AMOUNT COLLECTED PER EMPLOYEE The result obtained by dividing total unemployment insurance tax contributions due for the year by average monthly employment.

AVERAGE WEEKLY BENEFIT AMOUNT (AWBA)

AWBA TOTAL The result obtained by dividing the dollar amount paid of Unemployment Compensation benefits, by the corresponding number of weeks paid, to individuals who received payment for *full* weeks of total unemployment during a year.

AWBA PARTIAL The result obtained by dividing the dollar amount paid of Unemployment Compensation benefits, by the corresponding number of weeks paid, to individuals who received payment for *less than full* weeks of total employment during a year.

AWBA ALL The amount of compensation paid for total and partial unemployment benefits during a year divided by the corresponding number of weeks for which total and partial unemployment was paid.

AVERAGE WEEKLY WAGES The results obtained by dividing 1/52nd of total wages for the year by average monthly number of employees. See Section IV for limitations of data.

BENEFITS PAID (EXCLUDING DIRECT REIMBURSABLE)

REGULAR The amount of unemployment insurance compensation paid during a year which is not recoverable by reimbursement from another source such as employer direct reimbursement or federal share of extended benefits.

EXTENDED (STATE SHARE) The amount of compensation paid during a year under the extended benefits program for which the state is liable (generally 50 percent of total extended benefits). Extended benefits is a federal-state program which provides compensation to certain claimants who have exhausted their rights to regular benefits during periods of high unemployment.

CAREER GUIDANCE The provision of information, materials, suggestions, or advice to assist the applicant in making occupation or career decisions.

CIVILIAN LABOR FORCE The number of persons by place of residence who were either employed or unemployed during the survey week which includes the 12th of the month. Labor force data and its components, employed and unemployed, are for civilians only.

CLAIMS

INITIAL CLAIM A notice of unemployment filed: (1) to request a determination of entitlement to and eligibility for compensation; or (2) to begin a second or subsequent period of unemployment within a benefit year or period of eligibility.

CONTINUED CLAIM A notice filed by mail for waiting period credit or payment for one or more weeks of unemployment.

CONTRIBUTION RATE The tax rate assigned to each employer under provisions of the Maine Employment Security Law. Rates are usually in effect for a calendar year and are applied to taxable wages to determine contribution due. An employer's contribution rate is generally based upon the specific rate schedule in effect and the firm's experience with unemployment. This experience is measured in terms of the benefits paid and contributions received from the employer in relation to his average taxable payroll. Rates are also based on total wages but these are for analytical purposes only and have no statutory basis.

CONTRIBUTIONS DUE The state unemployment taxes assessed to covered employers for payments made for deposit in the Unemployment Trust Fund. Contributions are based on a tax rate schedule that is applied to taxable wages. Contributions are due on or before the last day of the month following the close of each calendar quarter. Contributions due for a year are usually received during that same year except in the case of the October-December quarter when they are received in the following year.

CONTRIBUTIONS RECEIVED That portion of state unemployment taxes paid by employers during a calendar year. Not included as contributions are payments made in lieu of contributions by employers under the direct reimbursable provisions of the Maine Employment Security Law.

COVERED EMPLOYMENT The number of workers of those employers subject to the Maine Employment Security Law. The data relating to covered employment are for weekly pay periods which include the 12th of each month. Included are all corporation officials, executives, supervisory personnel, wage earners, piece workers, part-time workers, and people on the payroll but on paid vacations. Similar employment data for federal government installations within the state are also included. See Section IV for further explanation.

DEPENDENTS ALLOWANCES The supplemental amount payable for a week of total or partial unemployment insurance benefits to individuals with dependents.

DIRECT REIMBURSABLE PROVISIONS Refers to a method of financing benefit payments. Certain nonprofit employers or governmental entities are permitted, in lieu of paying contributions, the option of reimbursing the Unemployment Trust Fund on a dollar-for-dollar basis for benefits paid to their former workers.

DISLOCATED WORKER BENEFITS (DWB) An unemployment program for individuals who have been terminated from their job and are expected to be out of work for an extended period of time. It provides extra weekly unemployment benefits for eligible individuals who are in an “approved training” program.

ELIGIBLE CLAIMANTS The total number of registered job seekers who have filed a claim for unemployment compensation and who, during the registration year, have been determined monetarily eligible for benefit payments under one or more State or Federal unemployment compensation programs.

EMPLOYER VISIT A visit to an employer by a BES staff member to explain services available, discuss job orders, or help solve employment problems.

FINAL PAYMENTS The last unemployment insurance check paid to a claimant which exhausts the individual’s maximum benefit entitlement under a specific program.

FIRST PAYMENTS The first unemployment insurance check paid under a specific program to a claimant during the individual’s benefit year.

FUND BALANCE (EXCLUDING LOANS) The year-end reserves (excluding federal loans) available in the Unemployment Trust Fund, (unemployment insurance benefit fund), and clearing account available for unemployment insurance benefit payments.

INTEREST EARNED The amount credited to the state’s Unemployment Trust Fund during a year resulting from earnings on U.S. Treasury deposits.

JOB OPENING A job vacancy which an employer intends to fill.

JOB SEARCH ACTIVITIES Services designed to help applicants plan and carry out a successful job hunting strategy. These services include résumé preparation assistance, job search workshops, job finding clubs, provision of specific labor market information, and development of a job search plan.

LABOR MARKET AREAS (LMA) A central city or cities and the surrounding territory within commuting distance. It is an economically integrated geographical unit within which workers may readily change jobs without changing their place of residence.

LOANS Activities concerning amounts advanced to and repaid by the state under provisions of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

LOANS RECEIVED The amount of loans received (both during the year and cumulative) by the state from the federal unemployment account.

LOAN REPAYMENT ACTIVITIES The amount of loans repaid either through the FUTA process or from Unemployment Trust Fund Reserves. Under the FUTA process, repayments are made by employers via a federal tax of 0.3 percent of taxable wages for the first year loans are due. The federal tax rate increases by 0.3 percent each year until the loan is repaid in full.

MASS LAYOFF STATISTICS (MLS) PROGRAM

INDUSTRY DESCRIPTION All descriptions and totals are based on the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS). NAICS groups employers into industries based on the activities in which they are primarily engaged.

INITIAL CLAIM See Claims for definition. These initial claims only pertain to confirmed mass layoff events which were reported under MLS.

MASS LAYOFF EVENT A confirmed mass layoff event in MLS is defined as 50 or more initial claims (20 or more for a state event) filed against an establishment during a 5-week period, with separations lasting longer than 30 days as specified by the employer during the employer contact.

PRIMARY REASON FOR SEPARATION The principle reason for a layoff event, as reported during the employer contact.

SEPARATION/LAYOFF The number of individuals who have become permanently displaced during a particular layoff event, as provided by the employer during the employer contact. The number of separations, as reported by the employer, may exceed the number of initial claims shown for an event. Separations include only those that will be out for 30 days or more.

TOTAL ESTABLISHMENTS A subset of employers subject to the Maine Employment Security Law with 15 or more employees.

METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA (MSA) A large population nucleus, together with adjacent communities which have a high degree of economic and social integration with that nucleus. In New England, MSAs are composed of cities and towns rather than entire counties as in other areas of the United States. To qualify as an MSA in New England, an area (made up of a central core and outlying cities and towns) must contain a city of at least 50,000 people or have a total population of at least 75,000.

MICROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREAS A nonmetropolitan region or group of adjacent nonmetropolitan regions that contains an urban cluster of 10,000 to 49,999 persons. A micropolitan statistical area may include surrounding regions if there are strong economic ties between the regions, based on commuting patterns. In New England, cities and towns, rather than counties, are used to define micropolitan statistical areas. Nonmetropolitan cities and towns that are not classified as part of a micropolitan statistical area are considered nonmicropolitan.

MONETARY ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS The employment and wage requirements necessary to establish entitlement to compensation under the Unemployment Insurance program.

BASE PERIOD WAGES The minimum amount of wages that must be earned during a four consecutive calendar quarter period for benefit entitlement.

WAGES IN TWO QUARTERS The minimum amount of wages that must be earned during at least two of the four consecutive calendar quarter period for benefit entitlement.

- NEW APPLICANT** An individual who has not registered previously with BES, or whose previous registration has become obsolete or unusable.
- NONFARM WAGE AND SALARY EMPLOYMENT** All persons on nonfarm establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. It does not include proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, or domestic workers in households. See Section II for further explanation.
- NONMONETARY DETERMINATION** A written decision regarding a claimant's entitlement to benefits for a week of unemployment for other than monetary reasons.
- DISQUALIFICATIONS** Denials of benefits for other than monetary reasons.
- NORTH AMERICAN INDUSTRY CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM** The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is a six-digit code for classifying business establishments in the United States, Canada, and Mexico. Adopted in 1997 to replace the 4-digit Standard Industrial Classification (SIC), NAICS provides for newer industries and also reorganizes the categories based on how a product is created or a service is provided.
- OLDER WORKER** For purposes of employment and training programs, any applicant age 45 and over.
- PERCENT OF CIVILIAN LABOR FORCE** The number unemployed as a percent of the civilian labor force.
- PRODUCTION WORKERS IN MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES** The category of workers which includes nonsupervisory workers (and working supervisors) who are directly engaged in the manufacture of the establishment's product(s) and other closely-related activities.
- AVERAGE WORKWEEK** The average number of hours for which pay was received during the week including the 12th of the month. Workweek hours include regular hours worked; overtime hours; hours paid for standby or reporting time; and equivalent hours for which employees received pay from the employer for sick leave, holidays, vacations, and other leave.
- AVERAGE HOURLY EARNINGS** The result derived by dividing payrolls by total hours worked for the week including the 12th of the month. Payrolls refer to pay before normal payroll deductions such as insurance, taxes, etc. Payroll figures include, in addition to pay for regular hours worked, pay for overtime, shift premiums, holidays, vacations, and sick leave paid by the firm to the production workers for the pay period reported.
- RECEIVED STAFF-ASSISTED SERVICES** Includes: (1) job referrals, (2) training placement, (3) reemployment services, (4) assessment services, including an assessment interview, testing, counseling, or employability planning, (5) case management, (6) career guidance, (7) job search activities, (8) federal bonding program, (9) job development contacts, (10) tax credit eligibility determination, (11) referral to other services, including skills training, educational services, and supportive services, or (12) any other service requiring significant expenditure of staff time.
- REFERRED TO EMPLOYMENT** Referral of an applicant to a job opening listed with BES by an employer.

REFERRED TO SUPPORT SERVICES Number of registered job seekers referred to services designed to assist an individual to achieve physical, mental, social or economic well being and reduce or eliminate barriers to employment. These include health and medical services, child care, emergency financial services, relocation assistance, residential support, and nutritional and legal services.

REFERRED TO WIA (WORKFORCE INVESTMENT ACT) SERVICES The number of registered job seekers referred to a service delivery component funded under Title I of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998. WIA is a federally funded program designed to increase the employment, retention, earnings, and occupational skill attainment of adult and dislocated workers. The program provides three levels of service. 1) Core services: self-help and informational resources, e.g., job referrals, job announcements, newspaper listings, computer resources, fax and copy machines, interviewing and résumé workshops, and information handouts; 2) Intensive services: staff assisted services, e.g., assessment and counseling, case management, career guidance, and other more extensive workshops; and 3) Training services: training accounts and vouchers, on-the-job training, customized training and other occupational training.

REGISTERED JOB SEEKERS (1) Job seekers who registered with the labor exchange during the registration quarter, (2) job seekers who were re-registered after their registration year expired, or (3) job seekers who were not formally re-registered, but who engaged in a labor exchange activity after their registration year expired.

RENEWAL An individual whose BES registration application has been transferred from the inactive to the active file in order to be available for services.

RESIDENT EMPLOYED The number of persons by place of residence who:

- (1) Did any work for pay or profit; or
- (2) Did at least 15 hours of unpaid work in a family-oriented enterprise; or
- (3) Were temporarily absent from their regular job because of illness, vacation, bad weather, industrial dispute, or various personal reasons.

SUPPORTIVE SERVICE Any service which contributes to the employability of an applicant or is supplemental to employment or training.

TAXABLE WAGE BASE That part of total wages paid to an individual per year which is subject to the state unemployment tax provisions.

From 1972 through 1977, the taxable wage base constituted the first \$4,200 of an employee's annual wage. From 1978 through 1982, the taxable wage base was the first \$6,000 in annual wages. From 1983 through 1999, the taxable wage base was the first \$7,000 in annual wages. Effective January 1, 2000, the taxable wage base is \$12,000.

TAXABLE WAGES That portion of total wages which is subject to the state unemployment tax provisions.

TOTAL WAGES All wages paid to persons in covered employment including salaries, commissions, bonuses, gratuities and the cash value of board, rent, housing, lodging, or similar remuneration.

UI CLAIMANT An individual who files either an initial claim or a continued claim under any unemployment insurance program.

UNEMPLOYED The number of persons by place of residence who:

- (1) Did not have a job, made specific efforts to find a job in the prior four weeks, and were available for work during the survey week; or
- (2) Were not working and were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off; or
- (3) Were not working and were waiting to report to a new job within 30 days.

VETERANS AND ELIGIBLE PERSONS A veteran is an individual who (1) served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days and was discharged or released with other than a dishonorable discharge, or (2) was discharged from or released from active duty because of a service-connected disability. An eligible person is (1) the spouse of any person who died on active duty or of a service-connected disability, (2) the spouse of any member of the Armed Forces serving on active duty who at the time of application for assistance is listed as (a) missing in action, (b) captured in the line of duty by a hostile force, or (c) forcibly detained or interned in the line of duty by a foreign government or power, or (3) the spouse of any person who has a total permanent service-connected disability or the spouse of a veteran who died while such a disability was in existence.

WEEKLY BENEFIT AMOUNT (WBA) The amount payable to a claimant for a compensable week of total unemployment.

MINIMUM WBA The lowest amount payable to a claimant for a compensable week of total unemployment.

MAXIMUM WBA The highest amount payable to a claimant for a compensable week of total unemployment.

WEEKS COMPENSATED The number of weeks claimed for unemployment in which benefits are paid.

TOTAL UNEMPLOYMENT A week in which an individual is eligible for the full benefit amount because of no earnings deductions.

PARTIAL UNEMPLOYMENT A week in which an individual is eligible for less than the full benefit amount because of earnings or other remuneration in excess of the amount allowable for any deductions

APPENDIX C. NORTH AMERICAN INDUSTRY CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

The North American Industry Classification System, more generally referred to as NAICS, has replaced the Standard Industrial Classification System (SIC). NAICS is an outgrowth of the North American Free Trade Agreement of 1993 and was designed to standardize the industrial classification of establishments in the United States, Canada and Mexico. Beyond this objective, NAICS allows for the inclusion of more new industries and production techniques than does the SIC. It is based on how a product is created or a service is provided. SIC stresses final products and services and thus has not kept pace with the structure of the contemporary economy and the "high tech" industrial base.

Code	Title	Industry Description
11	Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing, and Hunting	The Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting sector comprises establishments primarily engaged in growing crops, raising animals, harvesting timber, and harvesting fish and other animals from a farm, ranch, or their natural habitats.
21	Mining	The Mining sector comprises establishments that extract naturally occurring mineral solids, such as coal and ores; liquid minerals, such as crude petroleum; and gases, such as natural gas. The term mining is used in the broad sense to include quarrying, well operations, beneficiating (e.g., crushing, screening, washing, and flotation), and other preparation customarily performed at the mine site, or as a part of mining activity.
22	Utilities	The Utilities sector comprises establishments engaged in the provision of the following utility services: electric power, natural gas, steam supply, water supply, and sewage removal. Within this sector, the specific activities associated with the utility services provided vary by utility: electric power includes generation, transmission, and distribution; natural gas includes distribution; steam supply includes provision and/or distribution; water supply includes treatment and distribution; and sewage removal includes collection, treatment, and disposal of waste through sewer systems and sewage treatment facilities.
23	Construction	The Construction sector comprises establishments primarily engaged in the construction of buildings and other structures, heavy construction (except buildings), additions, alterations, re-construction, installation, and maintenance and repairs. Establishments engaged in demolition or wrecking of buildings and other structures, clearing of building sites, and sale of materials from demolished structures are also included.

31-33	Manufacturing	The Manufacturing sector comprises establishments engaged in the mechanical, physical or chemical transformation of materials, substances or components into new products. The assembling of component parts of manufactured products is considered manufacturing, except in cases where the activity is appropriately classified in Sector 23, Construction.
42	Wholesale Trade	The wholesaling process is an intermediate step in the distribution of merchandise.
44-45	Retail Trade	The Retail Trade sector comprises establishments engaged in retailing merchandise, generally without transformation, and rendering services incidental to the sale of merchandise. The Wholesale Trade sector comprises establishments engaged in wholesaling merchandise, generally without transformation, and rendering services incidental to the sale of merchandise.
48-49	Transportation and Warehousing	The Transportation and Warehousing sector includes industries providing transportation of passengers and cargo, warehousing and storage for goods, scenic and sightseeing transportation, and support activities related to modes of transportation. The type of equipment depends on the mode of transportation. The modes of transportation are air, rail, water, road and pipeline.
51	Information	The Information sector comprises establishments engaged in the following processes: (a) producing and distributing information and cultural products, (b) providing the means to transmit or distribute these products as well as data or communications, and (c) processing data.
52	Finance and Insurance	The Finance and Insurance sector comprises establishments primarily engaged in financial transactions (transactions involving the creation, liquidation, or change in ownership of financial assets) and/or in facilitating financial transactions.

53	Real Estate and Rental and Leasing	The Real Estate and Rental and Leasing sector comprises establishments primarily engaged in renting, leasing, or otherwise allowing the use of tangible or intangible assets, and establishments providing related services. 54	Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services	The Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services sector comprises establishments that specialize in performing professional, scientific, and technical activities for others. These activities require a high degree of expertise and training.
55	Management of Companies and Enterprises	The Management of Companies and Enterprises sector comprises (1) establishments that hold the securities of (or other equity interests in) companies and enterprises for the purpose of owning a controlling interest or influencing management decisions or (2) establishments (except government) that administer, oversee and manage establishments of the company or enterprise and that normally undertake the strategic or organizational planning and decisionmaking role of the company or enterprise.
56	Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services	The Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services sector comprises establishments performing routine support activities for the day-to-day operations of other organizations.
61	Educational Services	The Educational Services sector comprises establishments that provide instruction and training in a wide variety of subjects. This instruction and training is provided by specialized establishments, such as schools, colleges, universities and training centers.

72	Accommodation and Food Services	The Accommodation and Food Services sector comprises establishments providing customers with lodging and/or preparing meals, snacks, and beverages for immediate consumption. Excluded from this sector are civic and social organizations; amusement and recreation parks; theaters; and other recreation or entertainment facilities providing food and beverage services.
81	Other services (except Public Administration)	The Other Services (except Public Administration) sector comprises establishments engaged in providing services not specifically provided for elsewhere in the classification system. Establishments in this sector are primarily engaged in activities such as equipment and machinery repairing, promoting or administering religious activities, grant making, advocacy and providing dry-cleaning and laundry services, personal-care services, death-care services, pet-care services, photo-finishing services, temporary-parking services and dating services.
92	Public Administration	The Public Administration sector consists of establishments of federal, state, and local government agencies that administer, oversee, and manage public programs and have executive, legislative, or judicial authority over other institutions within a given area.
