





have open or will have open as the season approaches. In turn, the Job Service will assist in completing a simple job order form which identifies specific job descriptions. This information will be entered into a computerized job bank that will assist in matching qualified applicants with available jobs.




Selected Employment Security Activities MINISTER SELECTION OF THE PROPERTY OF




UI Benefit Payments


