
THE U-S- DEPARTMENT OF LABOR, EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING ADMINISTRATION RECENTLY RELEASED A LIST OF LABOR SURPLUS AREAS. ON THE LIST, WHICH BECAME EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1, 1984 AND REMAINS IN EFFECT THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 1985, WERE THE MAINE COUNTIES OF ANDROSCOGGIN, AROOSTOOK, OXFORD, SOMERSET, WALDO, AND WASHINGTON.


EMPLOYERS LOCATED IN LABOR SURPLUS AREAS CAN BE GIVEN PREFERENCE IN BIDDING ON FEDERAL PROCUREMENT CONTRACTS. THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING SUCH PREFERENCE IS TO HELP DIRECT THE GOVERNMENT'S PROCUREMENT DOLLARS INTO AREAS WHERE PEOPLE ARE IN MOST SEVERE ECONOMIC NEED, I.E., AREAS WITH THE HIGHEST UNEMPLOYMENT RATES.

THE CONCEPT OF CHANNELING FEDERAL PROCUREMENT CONTRACTS INTO HIGH UNEMPLOYMENT AREAS DATES BACK TO THE EARLY 1950s. AT THAT TIME, DURING THE KOREAN CONFLICT, THERE WAS CONCERN AMONG GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS THAT HIGH UNEMPLOYMENT RATES AND LOW UTILIZATION OF PLANTS AND EQUIPMENT IN SOME AREAS WOULD LEAD TO EROSION OF THE MOBILIZATION BASE AND ADVERSELY AFFECT THE NATION'S PRODUCTION CAPABILITY. THERE WAS ALSO CONCERN THAT THE COST OF CONSTRUCTING NEW PLANTS AND RELOCATING WORKERS WOULD CAUSE AN UNNECESSARY DRAIN ON THE NATION'S RESOURCES.

THE OFFICE OF DEFENSE MOBILIZATION STUDIED THIS PROBLEM AND IN FEBRUARY 1952 ISSUED DEFENSE MANPOWER POLICY NO. 4 (DMP-4). THIS POLICY IMPLEMENTED THE IDEA OF DIRECTING FEDERAL PROCUREMENT CONTRACTS TO EMPLOYERS IN LABOR SURPLUS AREAS. OVER THE YEARS THIS CONCEPT HAS BEEN CARRIED FORWARD IN SEVERAL PUBLIC LAWS AND/OR EXECUTIVE ORDERS TO INCLUDE PUBLIC LAW 96-302 (SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION) AND EXECUTIVE ORDER 10582 (THE BUY AMERICAN ACT). CURRENTLY, EXECUTIVE ORDER 12073 ASSIGNS THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR CLASSIFYING LABOR SURPLUS AREAS.

THE CLASSIFICATION PROCEDURES USED TO DESIGNATE LABOR SURPLUS AREAS REFLECT THE RELATIONSHIP OF AN AREA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE TO THE NATIONAL UNEMPLOYMENT RATE DURING A SPECIFIED REFERENCE PERIOD. THE REFERENCE PERIOD USED IN PREPARING THE CURRENT LIST OF LABOR SURPLUS AREAS WAS JANUARY 1982 THROUGH DECEMBER 1983. QUITE SIMPLY, A LABOR SURPLUS AREA HAD TO HAVE HAD AN UNEMPLOYMENT RATE THAT WAS AT LEAST 120 PERCENT OF THE NATIONAL RATE DURING THE REFERENCE PERIOD OR A "CEILING" UNEMPLOYMENT RATE OF 10 PERCENT OR MORE. THE SIX MAINE COUNTIES THAT WERE DESIGNATED WERE QUALIFIED UNDER THE "CEILING" CONCEPT.

THE CLASSIFICATION PROCEDURES ALSO PROVIDE FOR THE DESIGNATION OF LABOR SURPLUS AREAS UNDER "EXCEPTIONAL CIRCUMSTANCES" CRITERIA. THESE PROCEDURES PERMIT THE REGULAR CLASSIFICATION CRITERIA TO BE WAIVED WHEN AN AREA EXPERIENCES SIGNIFICANT INCREASES IN UNEMPLOYMENT WHICH IS NOT TEMPORARY OR SEASONAL AND WHICH WAS NOT ADEQUATELY REFLECTED IN THE DATA FOR THE 2-YEAR REFERENCE PERIOD. IN ORDER FOR AN AREA TO BE CLASSIFIED AS A LABOR SURPLUS AREA UNDER THE EXCEPTIONAL CIRCUMSTANCES CRITERIA, THE MAINE BUREAU OF EMPLOYMENT SECURITY WOULD HAVE TO SUBMIT A PETITION REQUESTING SUCH CLASSIFICATION TO THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR'S EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING ADMINISTRATION. IN THE PAST, BOTH ANDROSCOGGIN AND PENOBSCOT COUNTIES HAVE BEEN CLASSIFIED UNDER THESE PROVISIONS.





UI Benefit Payments


