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BATH-BRUNSWICK LABOR MARKET AREA

The opening of the new Topsham Fair Mall and the recall of several hundred workers in the shipbuilding industry helped to lessen the impact of the normal seasonal economic downturn in the Bath-Brunswick Labor Market Area in November. The area also experienced seasonal layoffs in eating and drinking places, hotels and other lodging places, and contract construction. The combination of expansions and seasonal layoffs resulted in an unusual increase in both employment and unemployment for this time of year. The local unemployment rate increased from 3.2 percent in October to 3.5 percent in November, as resident employment rose from 23,320 to 23,800, while unemployment climbed from 780 to 870. The local unemployment rate was the lowest November rate ever recorded in this area. Meanwhile, the state's unemployment rate jumped from 3.9 percent in October to 4.6 percent in November, while the national rate fell from 6.8 percent to 6.7 percent.

BIDDEFORD LABOR MARKET AREA

The unemployment rate in the Biddeford Labor Market Area rose from 3.3 percent in October to 3.7 percent in November. Resident employment fell from 23,330 to 22,690, while the number unemployed rose from 800 to 880. The slump in local economic conditions can be attributed in part to seasonal employment losses in retail trade, services, and contract construction. Manufacturing employment changed little. Despite this month's rise in the unemployment rate to 3.7 percent, the local rate remains below the state and national rates of 4.6 percent and 6.7 percent, respectively.

LEWISTON-AUBURN METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA

The unemployment rate in the Lewiston-Auburn Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) increased from 4.8 percent in October to 5.8 percent in November. The latest local unemployment rate compared favorably with the national rate of 6.7 percent, but was above the statewide rate of 4.6 percent. Between October and November, local resident employment declined from 39,400 to 38,800, with layoffs in services, shoes, nonelectrical machinery, and agriculture exceeding seasonal job gains in retail trade. This resulted in an increase of 400 in the ranks of the unemployed, which totaled 2,400 in November. Last year at this time, 39,300 local residents were employed, 2,700 were unemployed, and the unemployment rate was 6.4 percent.

PORTLAND METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA

Seasonal employment losses resulted in resident employment dropping in the Portland Metropolitan Statistical Area in November. Resident employment fell from 101,800 in October to 100,700 in November, while the number unemployed rose from 2,500 to 2,800. The unemployment rate increased from 2.4 percent in October to 2.7 percent in November. Last year at this time the unemployment rate was 3.4 percent and 3,600 were jobless. This November the local rate was well below state and national rates of 4.6 percent and 6.7 percent, respectively. Employment gains in the manufacture of transportation equipment were unable to offset seasonal losses in contract construction and services.

RUMFORD LABOR MARKET AREA

The unemployment rate in the Rumford Labor Market Area increased from 4.5 percent in October to 5.6 percent in November. The downturn in local economic conditions was mostly attributable to layoffs in lumber and wood products, shoes, and paper manufacturing, which continue to be affected by foreign competition. Between October and November, local resident employment fell from 9,130 to 8,780, while total joblessness increased from 430 to 520. Last year 710 persons were unemployed, and the unemployment rate was 7.3 percent.

WATERVILLE LABOR MARKET AREA

Resident employment declined slightly in the Waterville Labor Market Area during November. The number unemployed rose from 920 in October to 980 in November, while resident employment dipped from 20,580 to 20,480. The resultant unemployment rate of 4.6 percent was equal to the state's unemployment rate for the month but below the national rate of 6.7 percent. Additionally, the current unemployment rate remained below the rate of 4.9 percent recorded in the area a year ago. At that time, 21,310 residents were employed, while 1,100 were jobless. In the nonfarm sector between October and November, employment improved in paper and allied products and apparel. Although employment increased in trade and services, contract construction declined, thereby resulting in little change in the nonmanufacturing sector.

A BRIEF ANALYSIS COVERING SELECTED MAINE LABOR MARKET AREAS

AUGUSTA LABOR MARKET AREA

Resident employment changed very little in the Augusta Labor Market Area in November. The number unemployed rose from 1,280 in October to 1,330 in November, while employment followed historical trends and inched downward to 28,490 from 28,780 in October. This decline in resident employment, coupled with the increase in the number unemployed, resulted in the unemployment rate rising to 4.5 percent, or 0.2 percentage points above the rate recorded in October. This November the local unemployment rate was below the rate of 5.1 percent recorded a year ago. It was also below the current unemployment rates for both the state and nation of 4.6 percent and 6.7 percent, respectively. Employment in manufacturing rose slightly over-the-month, as employment losses in paper and allied products were offset by employment gains in apparel and leather and leather products. Employment in the nonmanufacturing sector declined following normal historical trends. Most of the employment losses occurred in construction and trade.

BANGOR METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA

An increase in the number of unemployed helped boost the Bangor Metropolitan Statistical Area unemployment rate from 3.3 percent in October to 4.0 percent in November. The number of unemployed rose 300 to 1,900 in November, while resident employment decreased 300 to 46,100. A year ago 2,200 residents were unemployed and the unemployment rate stood at 4.6 percent. Corresponding state and national unemployment rates for this November were 4.6 percent and 6.7 percent, respectively. Manufacturing employment remained relatively stable between October and November. Paper and allied products and printing and publishing industries recorded strong gains in employment, while modest losses were registered in lumber and wood products, textile mill products, and leather and leather products. All major industry groups contributed to higher employment levels in the nonmanufacturing sector with the exception of contract construction. The largest gains were noted in wholesale and retail trade and nondomestic services. Employment is expected to jump sharply in wholesale and retail trade in support of the holiday shopping season. A much improved local economy and a substantial increase in the number of retail businesses in the Bangor Mall complex have been major contributors to rapid growth in wholesale and retail trade. A new Shaw's Super Market now under construction located adjacent to the Bangor Mall complex is expected to create approximately 240 jobs by early 1986.
