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# LABOR RELATIONS IN MAINE 1985

During 1985, a total of 30 major contracts covering just over 16 thousand workers were negotiated. This was a much lighter schedule than in 1984 when just under 18 thousand workers got new contracts, a total of 42 agreements.

A major agreement is defined as one covering at least 100 workers. There were 87 such contracts in effect during 1985, involving over 42.3 thousand workers. The agreements negotiated in 1985 covered over one-third of all organized private sector workers. Paper Manufacture, with eight contracts involving 3,851 workers, was the industry with the most activity. Paper was followed by Construction (five with 1,209) and Textiles (five and 1,056). Lumber and Wood Products (four covering 1,484) was the only other industry with more than three contracts.

The new agreements had an average increase in wages of 2.8% for calendar year 1985. The average over the life of the contracts is slightly higher at 3.1% per year. This is a significant decrease from contracts negotiated in earlier years. New agreements in 1984 averaged 3.5%. Deferred adjustments from these earlier contracts averaged 4.5% for 1985 and 4.5% per year over the life of the contract.

Looking ahead to 1986, bargaining activity should remain light. There are only 26 contracts scheduled for renewal, involving around 11 thousand workers. Nearly one-quarter of the agreements are in the Construction indus-



tries, having six contracts involving 2,795 workers. In addition to these negotiations, two major wage reopeners are scheduled.



Wage Adjustments in Major Collective Bargaining Agreements in Private Industries, Maine, 1983-1986

During 1985, there were five work stoppages in effect, involving 5,780 workers with an estimated 544 thousand worker-days idle. All five of the stoppages began during the year and were related to major contracts being negotiated during the year. Although wage adjustments (including one request for a reduction) were involved in each case, contracting out, productivity rules and work schedules were all cited in at least two of the incidents.

National Labor Relations Board certification elections were down from the 1981-1984 average. There were 14 elections, with 1,218 eligible voters. In 11 cases, the union lost and was not certified; this is above the average of the previous five years (79% vs. 52%). There was only one decertification election which the union lost. In addition, there was a unilateral decertification that is now before the NLRB.

Union and association membership in 1985 was 82,621. This is a decrease of 3,519 (4.3%) from the 86,140 of 1984. Most of the decline was in unions which primarily cover the private sector, who lost 2,729 members, nearly 78% of the total loss. This continues a decline which appeared to have been reversed last year.

Since employment continues to rise, particularly in the private sector, the percent of organization continues to decline. The rate for non-Federal workers dropped by more than a percentage point (19.2% to 18.1%) as did the rate for private industry (14.2% down to 13.2%). The public sector rate was down, but this was primarily due to an unexpected increase in employment.

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#### Special Studies

The Research and Statistics Division of the Bureau of Labor Standards has the ability to produce special tabulations and studies of the data elements shown in this publication. #### Technical Notes

Wage Adjustments: Private sector contracts, excluding maritime and railroad agreements, covering more than 100 workers are collected by the Maine Bureau of Labor Standards for administrative as well as statistical purposes. Wage adjustments are calculated based on previous contracts and/or wage and hour data from other sources. This is the third year for which wage adjustment data is available.

National Labor Relations Board Elections: Results and details on elections held in Maine are transmitted to the Bureau by the National Labor Relations Board, Boston Regional Office at the close of each month. Data in this series goes back to 1962.

Work Stoppages:

Work stoppage activity is monitored through reports to the Maine Bureau of Employment Security and to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics as well as the media and other secondary sources. Information is verified by direct contact with union and/or management representatives. Data from this series is available back through 1959.

Union Membership:

Membership data is collected through the annual Survey of Labor Organizations, which inleudes information on union and local officials, elections, employers having agreements, and membership. Some of this information is also published in the Directory of Maine Labor Organizations. This information is available beginning with calendar year 1978.
