Exciting start for statewide equal rights initiative

We are sending this newsletter out to an expanded mailing list with the intention of updating and energizing people. We hope you will want to get involved in a host of important activities and events. While we have been quiet on the local Common Circle front over the past few months, activity on the Statewide level has been buzzing. Since last summer a new organization, the Maine Coalition for Equal Rights, has been forming. This group's main goals are:

- to pass and defend an amendment to the Maine Human Rights Act prohibiting discrimination based upon sexual orientation;
- to educate the public at a grassroots level, creating increased safety for and understanding of the issues and needs of the Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgendered (LGBT) community.

During some thoughtful and lengthy discussions that took place at these monthly meetings, a large majority of those attending decided that this coalition would support the introduction of an equal-rights bill, which will likely be debated in next year's legislative session. If passed, it will almost certainly include a requirement that a referendum take place in November 2000; Gov. King has stated clearly that he will not sign into law any equal rights bill that does not go out to public vote. There is much that needs to be done before then.

We need to organize support, on all levels throughout the state, to ensure that people understand the common issues and needs of LGBT people, the very real need for passage of a non-discrimination bill and how continuing discrimination and silencing of LGBT issues affects and diminishes us all.

The Maine Coalition for Equal Rights (MCER) plan-

ning committee has been meeting to plan the monthly meetings, and has guided the group's initial formative process. Our own Mitzi is on this committee, and JaneA Kelley is active in Internal Communications. These and all committees are open to anyone who wants to participate.

CCHR to focus on campaign, speakout, book distribution

At a recent planning meeting we decided to forego our monthly discussions in order to spend our time preparing a solid base for work on the referendum campaign. Come to our Campaign Kickoff Common Circle meeting on Tuesday May 18, from 6:30 to 9 p.m. at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church Parish House (corner Court & Elm St., Belfast).

We are seeking people in Waldo County who are interested in acting as contact people or get out the vote organizers for their town, group of friends, or businesses. We need committed people or groups in each town to do outreach, update voter lists, and follow up with voters. This effort, combined with a strong education campaign from MCER, will bring about more positive outcome for this referendum.

We want to form coalitions with other human rights-oriented groups in the area. If we divide the campaign efforts between CCHR and other groups, it will help all of us avoid burnout and help us build a shared agenda to work together on. If you know anyone who would like to help us achieve legal equality or work together, please attend our meeting or contact Mitzi.

We would also like to speak to religious, business or social organizations in order to educate people on issues of sexual diversity. We have applied for a grant to help us with upgrading our internal communications and data entry skills so that we will be better prepared for the upcoming campaign.

We plan to work with Coastal AIDS Network in bringing a Speakout training to our area. If you want to take this day-long training, contact Marcy (589-4177 or change@midcoast.com). We also hope to obtain and distribute books on issues of sexual diversity and make these available to area school librarians. We are also considering forming a Political Action Committee so we can do this work and the necessary fund-raising on our own.

We have been asked to share our mailing list with the Maine Coalition for Equal Rights, and have decided not to do this without your permission. If you do *not* want your name shared with MCER, please contact Marcy as soon as possible. If we do not hear from you by April 20, we will assume we have your permission to share your name.

Maine LGBT Symposium XXV to take place in Presque Isle

Organizers seek suggestions for workshop topics, discussion leaders

The Maine Lesbian-Gay-Bi-Trans Symposium XXV will take place on Memorial Day Weekend, May 28-31, at the University of Maine at Presque Isle.

The keynote speaker at the event will be Diane Elze, a longtime activist who was involved with the early Symposium at Orono and was instrumental in the creation of the OUTRIGHT youth support group. A Canadian man will be the second keynote speaker; arrangements are pending.

A film presentation, *Tangible Fathers*, with filmmaker Bob Poirier of Portland, is another highlight of the event. On Saturday night, there will be a dance. It's party night, and a special DJ has been arranged for the occasion.

As of Feb. 8, Northern Lambda Nord, the Symposium's hosts, have confirmed discussion leaders for the following workshops:

- Monogamy vs. assorted non-monogamies;
- Rural Organizing, with the Maine Rural Network;
- Transgendered issues;
- Institutionalized homophobia/heterosexism; and
- A discussion of the book *Two Flutes Playing*, by Andrew Ramer.

The Symposium 25 organizing committee is requesting suggestions for more workshop topics, as well as facilitators to lead them. These workshops will be small group discussions with a presenter/discussion facilitator, offered throughout the Symposium weekend. Topics may range from legal or health issues, to how to get on-line, to being out on the job. The "traditional" Symposium workshops — which include "coming out" and "long-term relationships" — will also be offered. Any and all ideas are welcome; send your suggestions to symposium@mf.net.

This year's Symposium will be the 25th time that Maine's queer community has gathered to meet, discuss, learn, argue, dance, and play, and have a fun, empower-

ing, energizing and exciting and fabulous weekend. Symposium is for gays, lesbians, bisexuals, transgendered and our allies to gather for a long Spring weekend, this year in "The Crown of Maine."

The cost for the entire weekend is \$140 per person, which includes 6 meals, 3 nights lodging (double occupancy in the dorms — all linen provided), and admission to all Symposium events. You can register for the entire weekend or for just part of the weekend at reduced rates. A limited number of scholarships will be available. Legislative Update

There have been six civil rights bills (LR 41, LR 204, LR1156, LR 2285, LR 2920, LR 592) introduced this session, by both parties and in both houses. The sponsors, including our own Sen. Susan Longley, are currently in the process of seeing if they can agree on just one version of the bill. There have also been several significant HIV-related bills introduced, some of which appear to have significant negative consequences. Some of these bills will be heard in the judiciary committee on Wednesday, March 24, at 1:30 p.m.
