CHARLIE HOWARD MEMORIAL DAY - HUMAN RIGHTS CELEBRATION

The Bangor Area Gay-Lesbian-Straight Coalition formed in July, 1984 in response to the violent death of Charlie Howard, a 23-year old man who was murdered in downtown Bangor on July 7, 1984, because he was gay. We welcome you to join us in remembering Charlie Howard on July 6th,

We welcome you to join us in remembering Charlie Howard on July 6th, as Bangor Area Gays and their friends commemorate the second anniversary of the young man's murder. His murder and the subsequent trial attracted world-wide attention and has served as a rallying point for gay activism in Bangor and throughout Maine. Organizers are hopeful that many people from Maine and New England will participate in remembering Charlie and enjoying that sense of community he often spoke of.

Events are under the sponsorship of the Unitarian Church of Bangor, Bangor Interweave and the Bangor Area Gay Lesbian Straight Coalition. The schedule of events begins Saturday and will continue all day Sunday, concluding with a reception for keynote speaker feminist Sonia Johnson.

DIALOGUE '86

We arrived at the 13th Maine Lesbian and Gaymen's Symposium at about 8:30 after a long wet journey from Bangor through Houlton to the University of Maine at Presque Isle. The long northern journey made me feel like I was on the top of the world; everything is downhill from Presque Isle. It will be a tough act to follow.

We were greeted warmly in the dormitory lounge by cordial LAMBS (affectionate name for the members of the host organization- Northern Lambda Nord) eager to get us situated for the evening. Next to the registration was a cozy lounge with soft tones emanating. Although I retired early, when I literally bumped into a fellow Bangorite at 3:00 am in the dormitory hallway on my way to the women's room, I realized the party had just begun for some.

Early the next morning, after complimentary coffee and donuts, the day's events kicked off by two eminent keynoters, one of our very own. Hal Hinds, founding member and past president of Fredericton Lesbian and Gays (FLAG), spoke of the trials and tribulations of starting a gay organization in a rural area. A notable quote I recall was that the lesbian of the group threatened, in jest, to withdraw from FLAG to leave the gay men with what they deserve (FAG). Well, you had to be there to appreciate the humor. It roused the some 150 warm bodies gathered in the room.

Following Hal's rather softspoken talk, our very own JoAnne Dauphinee, local hardcore feminist, gave a rousing address that enraptured the crowd with its "Imagine a world" she said imagery. "where almost all of the Premiers and Presidents and Vice Presidents and world leaders are women." Women, and men alike were moved by the stark realities faced by women in our society today. (JoAnne, we love

you).

The theme of the conference, Dialogue '86, promoting discussion between and among the various segments of our diverse communitywomen, men, urban, rural, whites, blacks, Canadian, Americans, Frenchspeaking, English-speaking . . - was animated through a panel discussion. Each of the panelist expressed some personal insights and a lively debate followed on separatism.

workshops were offered Numerous throughout the day- safe sex, christian schizophrenia, substance abuse, aspects of S&M, gay/lesbian Jews. Concurrent with the workshops were showings of films, 14 different films were offered in the course of the Symposium, Choosing Children, Silent Pioneers and The Times of Harvey Milk to name but a few. Dinner, a floor show and dance brought us to the end of the day and the start of the next, literally.

The next days' events were a little more sedate for me. A spiritual gathering, late brunch, MLGPA meeting, and a panel discussion of the health crisis affecting our community--AIDS, followed by more workshops and lots and lots of socializing with new and old friends. The separatists of the group even held a closeted "Lesbian Only" Workshop.
