# CLASS NOMINEE

PORTLAND JUNIOR EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM NEEDS SUPPORT.

The proposal to establish a permanent employment program to secure work for jobless Portland Junior College students recently was endorsed by the College's faculty and Rump Council and will be presented before the Board of Directors for consideration, Hollis Allen, spokesman for the committee, said today.

Allen reported that 42 students have already registered for employment aid and that more are expected. However, he said, the registration was not condusive to the actual need for jobs that exists.

He stated that there are many more students who could benefit from the program but they have failed to register.

Allon stressed that the program could only be successful if every student registered, since place—ment depended upon the students! adaptablity and ability to their particular job opportunity. The greater the registration, the better chance more students will have to secure jobs.

#### JOB OPENINGS IN DEMAND

Allon added that job openings are few and that only a small number of students will gets jobs unless the student body co-operates with the committee by informing it of job possibilities.

ing it of job possibilities.

The committee has already placed a few students, but to meet student needs more job opportunities must be uncovered.

The Christmas season would provide part-time employment for a good many students, but it would not meet domands, he added.
