MOUNTAIN DAY DANCE TONIGHT; OUTING TOMORROW HIGHLIGHT PJC ACTIVITIES X

The Portland Junior College Rump Council has urged the student body to support the Mountain Day activities today and tomorrow by the largest attendance since the annual affair was started.

Kenneth Taylor, president of the council said in a statement, "the Mountain Day functions offer an opportunity for the student body to become more intimately acquainted with the college faculty and their fellow students." "The support of this affair has greatly influenced student interests in college activities in the past, and have generally affected the entire college year."

Tonights dance will be held in the college auditorium and will start at 8 p.m. Don Doane and his orchestra will furnish the evening's music, and admission will be free for all students and their dates.

Tomorrow's activities will begin at the college shortly after 9 a.m. The day's schedule includes dinner cooked and served by the faculty; football, softball, basketball, volleyball, horseshoe pitching, mountain climbing, and others.

The outing will take place at Bradbury Mountain State Park. Any students desiring transportation are urged to appear at the college about 9 a.m. There will be ample transportation for everyone.

RESPONSIBLE AND CO-OPERATIVE PARTY CHIEFS ANNOUNCE PLATFORMS, SLATES

Harvey M. Jacobson and Peter H. Williams have declared their candidacy for president of the Freshman Class as leaders of their respective Responsible and Co-operative Parties.

Both candidates, running on the controversial "college party" system, said in separate statements they would attempt to present before the Freshman student body, a constructive and dignified two week campaign which they hope will benefit Portland Junior College regardless of the election outcome.

Jacobson has named William Angel as his running mate for vice president; Joel Craven, secretary and treasurer; Dick Turcotte and Robert Lund, student council representatives.

Williams' Co-operative Party ticket includes Peter Maroon, candidate for vice president; Phil Merrow, secretary and treasurer; Clifford Andreason and Ralph Lymbuner, student council representatives.

Williams said his party organization was based upon "equal representation for each individual, since the ticket includes graduates of Deering and South Portland High Schools; and representation from Cumberland Center, Waterville, and outlying districts.

He felt such representation would reflect the "individual aspects" of his ticket upon the campaign. ~~xxxxxxx~~ He emphasized his party's slogan of "We are working for you," was dependent upon this "wide-spread interests" factor. "The Co-operative Party candidates would be in a better position to poll student interests," he added.

Williams pointed out that the party's tentative platform includes projects representing such a variety of interests. The three main objectives of the platform are: more group social events; a date bureau to assure dates for students unfamiliar with Portland; (Page 2)

and at least one class project to benefit the college.

He said he would like to see a unified class project, but he was not going to "stress the issue" unless necessary. However he did mention new chairs for at least one class room or a new toaster for the cafeteria.

REPRESENTATION NOT IMPORTANT

Jacobson, in a separate statement, said his Responsible Party felt individual representation impractical and not in accordance with student needs. He added that his party considers group representation and group interests more important.

He said the Responsible Party would attempt to present to the student body constructive projects from student interests in the college. He went on to say the party could not heed individual whims when the need for projects and activities that would arouse group participation and interest was so great.

Jacobson stated his party's platform was focused upon organization and execution of projects and activities that would benefit both PJC and its students. The Responsible Party's tentative platform includes: the establishment of a council of clubs meeting periodically to organize more social functions; the establishment of an alumni fund to finance future projects without soliciting the student body or student council; and thirdly a review of student laws and by-laws.

Jacobson, more specific about the alumni fund, cited the Outing Clubs fund-raising now in progress. General campus improvements such as repaving the parking lot might be possible through solicitation of the successful alumni, he said.

Jacobson concluded that his party was organized with the intention of putting "responsible men in responsible offices."
